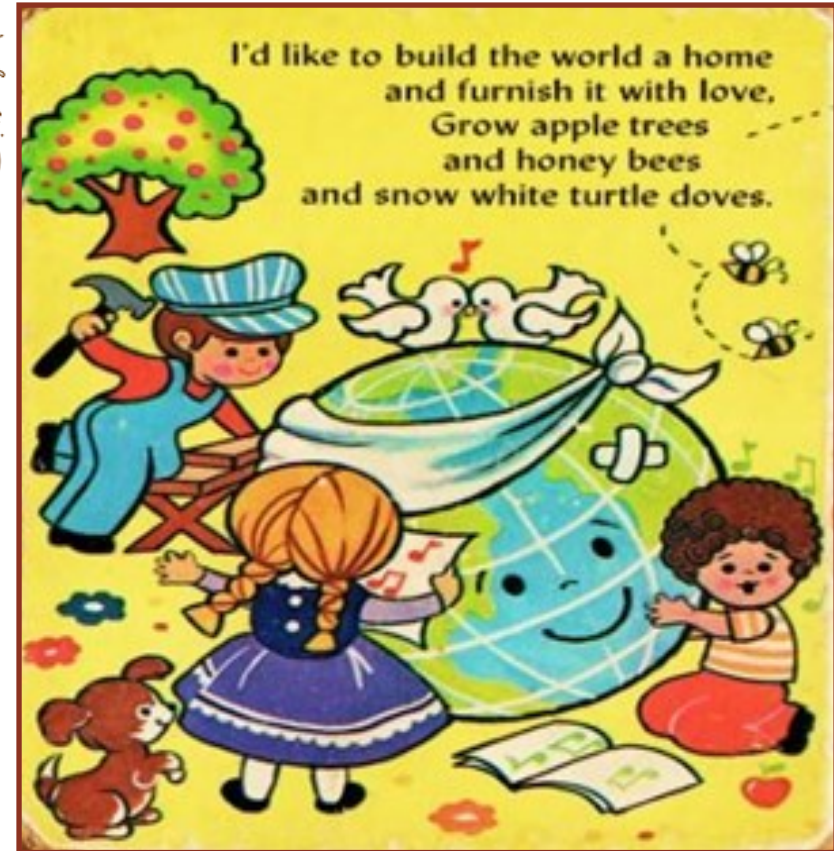

THANK YOU, LORD...

*Be careful for nothing; but in everything by prayer and supplication
with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God.*

~Philippians 4:6

When you pray, how much of your prayer is spent praising and thanking God, and how much is spent making requests? What's wrong with having too little gratitude in your prayers?

We should take advantage of every opportunity we get to say "Thank You" to God in prayer. That's good advice whether we're feeling incredibly happy or incredibly down. If we're happy, our joy will be multiplied by sharing our gratitude with the One who made it possible. If we're down, we'll feel better when we focus on the good things God is doing in our life.

Too often our prayers, even during our family devotions, sound like a fast food order: "I'd like good grades for my math test, a successful surgery for my grandmother and a way to make \$250 before spring break. Amen."

The problem with that approach is that it's one-sided. Prayer should be a conversation, a way of exercising and celebrating our relationship with God. Constant asking does not make for a good relationship.

If we're serious about having a relationship with God, a good rule of thumb is to begin our prayers with praise and thanksgiving. That way, if we run out of time, we will have gotten to the important, relationship-building part.

God will take care of our needs and honor our requests. He proves that every day. So, will we honor him with our thanks?

LET US PRAY: Dear God, thank You for our family and for time to come together in devotion. Forgive us for the times we forget to tell You how much we appreciate what You've done. Please help us remember Your work in our lives. Amen.

For the past six+ weeks, the Woman's Bible Study group has been gathering to explore the book of Acts and its teachings. This New Testament book was believed to have been written by Luke, the physician who traveled as a missionary with Paul. Acts tells us how Christian faith and the early church was born, spreading the good news to the world after Jesus returned to heaven. As the word of God spread, and miracles occurred to reinforce God's power and strength, many obstacles had to be addressed as people learned a new way of believing in the one true God.

Imagine how people, who had been worshipping a variety of many gods and goddesses, must have felt now being told there was only one God who would take care of them. It was something radical to say the least!

The ancient Greeks and Romans who worshipped the gods and goddesses, believed these deities controlled different aspects of life and the natural world. The responsibility of the worshipper was to believe these deities and make sacrifices and do certain rituals to please them.

For instance, Zeus was the chief god, the father of many gods who ruled the clouds and rain, hurled thunderbolts, and decided the outcomes of battles. Apollo was the god of music, poetry, prophesy and healing. This must be why the club in Harlem, NY, is called the Apollo! Athena, the daughter of Zeus (known as the Roman goddess Minerva) was the goddess of war and the symbol of discipline and self-control. And Demeter, the Roman goddess known as Ceres, was the goddess of agriculture.

These are just a sample of the gods that Paul, Barnabas and the rest of the new religious teachers had to convince the people to turn away from to worship our God: the all-encompassing, all-powerful one. And unlike the ancient Romans and Greeks, we are blessed to be able to worship with no need for sacrifices or other outward signs of worship. Any and all can choose to be a part of God's kingdom! How awesome is God's unconditional love that it is poured out to everyone who believes!

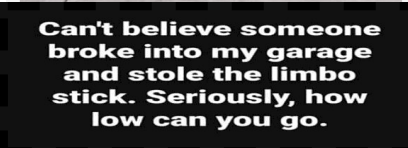
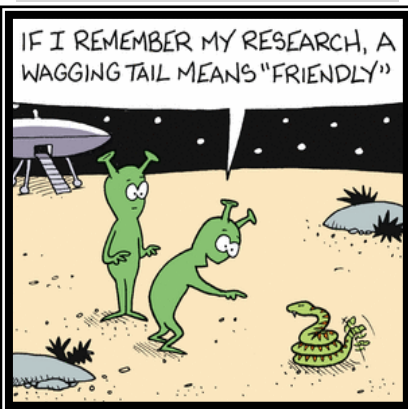

CHAPEL STAINED GLASS WINDOWS

1. ROBERT BROWNE

Thanks to the efforts of Martin Luther and others, the Church of England, the Anglican Church, was the Established Church. It was supposed to be a compromise between Catholic and Protestant religious based beliefs and practices; however many English Protestants (separatists) felt that the Church of England was still entirely too Catholic and were known as Puritans. Prominent among these was Robert Brown, born in the 1550's. Graduating in 1572 from Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, he was influenced by Puritan theologian Thomas Cartwright, considered to be the father of English Presbyterianism. Cartwright opposed the Act of Supremacy and believed the Church of England, ruled by the monarch and the appointed bishops, was top heavy. He believed in a decentralized church government ruled by the presbytery (Greek for elder). Browne became one of the original proponents of the Separatist, or Free Church, movement. He was among the first to secede from the Church of England and to found a church of his own on Congregational principles. In 1582, Browne and his followers (Brownists) fled to the Netherlands. In his, "A Treatise of Reformation without Tarrying for Anie," he asserted the right of the church to affect necessary reforms without the authorization of the civil magistrate; and in "A Book with Sheweth the Life and Manners of all True Christians," he set out the theory of Congregational independency. Both were published in Middleburg, Netherland in 1582. Browne returned to the Church of England in 1585. However, his influence on the Congregationalist Church was profound. To this day, Browne is considered the father of the Congregational body in the English speaking world, and "The Father of the Pilgrims" due to many of the Mayflower passengers in 1620 being part of the Brownist movement.

STAVES CHAPEL STAINED GLASS WINDOWS

Ground for the Chapel was broken on March 22, 1951....less than 12 months from that first Sunday service in the Encino Theatre! Eleven months later in February 1952, the completed Chapel was dedicated. At that time, the windows were of plain glass. Over the years, they have all been replaced, through designated memorial gifts, with stained glass windows depicting the history of Congregationalism from our roots in England to the founding of Church of the Chimes.
