Let's Back the Blue was founded in Auglaize County in the spring of 2020 as a way to encourage support and appreciation for our local law enforcement. Starting out with a one page list of examples of how residents, businesses and organizations could support our men and women in blue, we have grown - both in numbers and in ideas. We have a commitment to the safety and well-being of our youth and our communities, and thus believe in the importance of supporting those who work tirelessly to protect us.

Because of county-wide support over the past four years we have:

- ✓ **Approved over \$175,200 in grants** to our law enforcement agencies throughout the county for equipment and outreach needs;
- ☑ Provided scholarships to Auglaize County residents attending area Peace Officers Training Academies at Apollo Career Center, Rhodes State University, or Wright State University - Lake Campus;
- ☑ Supported National Night Out, D.A.R.E., and Shop With the Blue;
- ✓ Promoted our "Blue Lights For Canned Goods" campaign to restock local food pantries while encouraging visible signs of support for law enforcement through the display of blue lights;
- ✓ Worked to supply "Lambi Learns About Addiction" kits for officers to leave with caregivers of children to help them cope and understand when a parent is removed from the home due to substance abuse;
- ☑ Plans to **supply trauma kits and/or needle resistant gloves** used for conducting searches for each officer in Auglaize County that currently does not have these vital safety necessities;
- ✓ Instituted a Benevolent Fund for line-of-duty deaths and critical injuries;
- ✓ And much more!

Thank you for your past and your future support. As always, we encourage you to change out your exterior lights to blue in your home and/or business as a show of support to those committed to keeping our county a safe place to live and raise our families, and to honor those law enforcement officers who have died in the line of duty across the United States and its territories.



Since our inception, *Let's Back the Blue* has strived to be responsible stewards of all funds. We are proud to be able to **consistently allocate more than 97% of proceeds directly to our mission.** The continued response from our communities has enabled us to continue to grow our funds, increase community outreach and participation, and benefit our law enforcement as needed.

Our largest fundraiser of the year, the "Got Their Six!" raffle is a great show of community support for our law enforcement. With 2,000 tickets up for sale at \$50 each, 100% of the proceeds from this annual raffle go directly into our Law **Enforcement Grant Fund and** police training academy scholarships. We are deeply indebted to and thankful for all of the thirty six prize partners from Auglaize County whose full or partial sponsorship allows us to offer so many great prizes, each valued between \$500 and \$5,000. We are also grateful for our growing team of ticket sellers and purchasers who continue to find more and more ways to spread our vision and mission throughout our county.





New this year were TWO "Taste of the Auglaize" gift card packages. **Twenty six** different restaurants across the county provided gift cards ranging in price from \$50-\$100 each, with each package worth \$950.

Law Enforcement Grant Fund

As with most public service agencies, our law enforcement agencies frequently rely on grants to purchase items which make their jobs - and our communities - safer. Originally begun to help our local agencies during budget reductions due to COVID, our Law Enforcement Grant Fund continues to provide needed equipment, especially to those local agencies whose budgets remain extremely tight. During 2023, \$48,721 was approved for law enforcement needs through the grant. Since its inception in December of 2020, we have been able to award \$1725,200 for local law enforcement needs.

Although there are additional grant resources from various sources utilized by our agencies, we are proud the Law Enforcement Grant Fund is funded by Auglaize County residents to help Auglaize County Law Enforcement. Each item purchased through our grant fulfilled a specific need and resulted in safer conditions for our officers and their communities.



Police Academy Scholarships







It has always been our hope scholarships could help attract men and women who are qualified candidates excited by and committed to protecting their communities. With three Peace Officer Training Academies immediately adjacent to Auglaize County, *Let's Back the Blue* instituted scholarships for Auglaize County residents who enroll in a training academy at Apollo Career Center, Rhodes State College, or Wright State University Lake Campus. Because cadets living in Auglaize County and attending one of those three training academies are frequently hired by our Auglaize County law enforcement agencies, it benefits not only the cadet but the local communities in which they will serve.

In 2023, we were able to offer two \$1,000 scholarships at both Rhodes State College and Wright State University - Lake Campus, while offering two \$500 scholarships for Apollo Career Center. In the future we hope to also offer a \$1,000 scholarship at Edison State Community College.

Benevolent Fund

In 2022, after careful study and deliberation, Let's Back the Blue endowed a Benevolent Fund with specific guidelines, allowing us to send memorial donations to funds set up for Ohio officers killed in the line of duty. Additionally, donations will be made for any Auglaize County officers suffering critical injuries in the line of duty. Within one month of setting up the fund, the first donation was sent in memory of Bluffton Officer Dominic Francis. Sadly, since its inception, there have been seven Line of Duty deaths in Ohio.



Police Officer Timothy James Unwin Springfield Township Police Dept. EOW: Friday, March 31, 2023 Cause of Death: Automobile crash

Police Officer Tim Unwin was killed in a vehicle crash at the intersection of Hamilton Avenue and Center Ridge Avenue in North College Hill.

He was responding to an "officer needs assistance" call when his patrol car collided with another vehicle shortly after midnight. Officers from multiple jurisdictions were responding to the call when the crash occurred. The driver of the other vehicle was also killed in the crash.

Officer Unwin had served with the Springfield Township Police Department for two years. He had previously served with the Hamilton Police Department for two years and the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office for five years. He is survived by his parents and grandparents.

Deputy Sheriff Marcus Zeigler Hamilton County Sheriff's Office EOW: Friday, May 26, 2023

Cause of Death: Duty related illness

Deputy Sheriff Marcus Zeigler passed away after suffering a medical emergency during participation in mandatory running activities at the Great Oaks Police Academy in Sharonville.

He was transported to a local hospital where he

passed away two days later.

Deputy Zeigler had served with the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office for nine months as a corrections deputy and was assigned to the Patrol Academy. He is survived by his wife and five children.

Cause of Death: Automobile crash

Deputy Sheriff Joshua Hamilton died in a vehicle crash on Ohio State Route 503 at 4:00 a.m.

Deputy Hamilton, traveling southbound, and a vehicle traveling northbound collided head-on. He was transported to the Kettering Preble ER Campus, where he was pronounced dead. The driver of the other car was also killed.

Deputy Joshua Hamilton had been with the Preble County Sheriff's Office since May of 2022. He began his law enforcement career working in the jail before he being promoted to road patrol in June. Deputy Hamilton leaves behind a 10-year-old daughter, both parents and a sister. Josh also proudly served his country in the U.S. Navy from 2009 until the beginning of 2023, then enlisted in the U.S. Army National Guard. Deputy Hamilton is the first deputy with the Preble County Sheriff's Office to be killed in the line of duty.

HONOR, RESPECT, REMEMBER

National Police Week is a time to not only pay tribute our men and women who are tasked with the job of keeping their communities safe, but also a time to honor those in law enforcement who suffered line of duty deaths. In 1962, President John F. Kennedy signed a proclamation which designated May 15 as Peace Officers Memorial Day and the week in which that date falls as Police Week. *Light Ohio Blue* works with Ohioans across the state to light up skylines and homes BLUE to honor, respect, and especially remember those fallen. Working with *Light Ohio Blue*, *Let's Back the Blue* has encouraged Auglaize Countians to illuminate blue lights at their homes and businesses for each of the last four years. Encouraging is the number of blue lights that still continue to shine, night and day throughout the year, in full support of our local law enforcement!

Other Ways We Support

AUGLAIZE COUNTY SHERIFF



Since the establishment of Auglaize County in 1848, Sheriff Michael Vorhees is our county's 30th Sheriff. Possessing jurisdiction throughout the county, including all municipalities, the department manages the county jail, runs the DARE program, issues CCW licenses, conducts National WebChecks, and processes court paperwork. The 73 employees who are a vital part of the Sheriff's Office include administrative employees, 25 full and part-time Corrections Officers, food service employees, jail nurses, and a mental health and substance abuse counselor. 12 Dispatchers are on the line with you in an emergency, while 29 Deputies and 23 Auxiliary Deputies attend court proceedings, serve subpoenas, manage eSORN, and preserve the peace we all enjoy. The Sheriff's Office is active in schools and community, watches over our homes when we are away, and is a true partner in assuring our safety.







CRIDERSVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT



It is the mission of the Cridersville Police Department to safeguard the lives and property of our community. We are committed to reducing crime as well as the fear of crime. We accomplish this by investing in our people and building strong community partnerships. Our mandate is to serve with honor and integrity, while always conducting ourselves with the highest ethical standards to maintain public confidence.

The CPD provides 24 hour per day, 7 days per week, police protection and services to the Village of Cridersville. Staffing includes Chief Nathan Fried, four additional full-time officers, one part time officer, and one full-time clerk.



MINSTER POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Minster Police Department consists of seven full-time officers that deliver exceptional service and protection with a focus on preventing crime before it happens. To accomplish this, the department, led by Chief Eric Morris, collaborates closely with local schools and officials to foster community engagement, promote safety initiatives, and implement proactive measures.





NEW BREMEN POLICE DEPARTMENT

The New Bremen Police Department provides law enforcement in the village with eight full-time officers and four part-time officers, overseen by Chief Michael Skinner. All officers have completed mandatory training at the Ohio Peace Officers Training Academy. The department has three fully equipped cruisers and a sports utility vehicle utilized by the K-9 unit.

Going out of town? If you notify the department that you will be on vacation and your home will be unoccupied, the department will keep an eye on your house for you. The department also offers safety talks to schools and organizations about traffic and pedestrian safety and related topics.



Chief Chris McKinney of the New Knoxville Police Department has made his primary focus maintaining bonds with residents the department serves while ensuring the locally low crime rate continues to drop. A priority of Chief McKinney's is providing beneficial in-service to his officers as well as others with a focus on utilizing appropriate tactics when encountering special needs individuals. Serving a community of 870 residents who strongly value education, the Knoxville Police Department is also active in the local school. Being part of a community with a strong appreciation of fiscal responsibility, the NKPD aims to be fiscally responsible while obtaining the necessary equipment to keep the department and the community safe.





WAPAKONETA POST OHIO STATE HIGHWAY PATROL

The mission of the Wapakoneta Post of the Ohio State Highway Patrol is to protect life and property, promote traffic safety, and provide professional public services with respect, compassion, and professionalism. marked 90 years of providing their service with a purpose: to positively impact the quality of life and safety throughout the State of Ohio. One of 59 posts throughout the state, the Wapakoneta Post, under the leadership of Lieutenant John Westerfield, performs a variety of responsibilities, including driver's education classes and vehicle inspections. Post Troopers have taken part in our blood drives, National Night Out and the Auglaize County Shop With the Blue program.

OHIO WILDLIFE OFFICER AUGLAIZE COUNTY

The Division of Wildlife is the oldest state agency with law enforcement officers. Its mission is "to conserve and improve fish and wildlife resources and their habitats for sustainable use and appreciation by all." One wildlife officer is assigned to each county, with Officer Mark Schemmel assigned to Auglaize County. Wildlife law enforcement is unique in that it blends criminal justice and law enforcement duties with wildlife conservation, education, and public service. Therefore, each

Therefore, each wildlife officer completes basic peace officer training for state law enforcement certification then completes approximately 8 more weeks of advanced training in wildlife officer specific instruction.





The mission of the St. Marys Police Department is to protect life, preserve property, and provide a safe environment for residents and visitors to live, work, and visit. Adhering to the core values of honesty, integrity, professionalism, fairness and accountability, the SMPD, under the leadership of Chief Jacob Sutton, provides 24-hour protection with 16 officers, one full time detective, 4 dispatchers, one K-9 officer, and a Code Enforcement Officer. Believing their word is their bond, the SMPD strives to do the right thing, even when no one is watching.



WAPAKONETA POLICE DEPARTMENT

Under the leadership of Chief Calvin Schneider, the Wapakoneta Police Department strives to ensure their community is provided with the best law enforcement and public safety possible. Serving a community of just under 10,000 people, the department has 18 full-time officers including one K-9 officer, 5 dispatchers, and 3 auxiliary officers. In 2023, there were **129 line of duty deaths** across the US and its territories (not including COVID deaths), as well as **25 K-9 LODDs**, a number that reflects a welcome decrease over each of the previous four years. According to an FOP year-end report, however, **378** officers were shot in the line of duty in 2023, **the highest number ever recorded**. Thankfully, most likely due to improvements in medical trauma science and anti-ballistic technology, there were fewer deaths.
