Thank you for your greatly appreciated support throughout 2021! This endorsement enabled us to achieve many goals established at the beginning of the year, while adding new ventures during the year. Those include:

- Our second annual "Got Their Six" (Got Their Back) raffle, every penny going to grants for local law enforcement use and our training academy scholarships;
- The approval of nearly \$50,000 in local agency grant requests through our Law Enforcement Grant Fund;
- Instituting **scholarships** for <u>Auglaize County residents</u> attending Peace Officer Training Academies at Wright State University Lake Campus, Rhodes State University, and Apollo Career Center;



Light Anglaize County Blue

Encouraging our communities to display visible signs of support for law enforcement is a major priority, and one of the most noticeable and best recognized signs of support among law enforcement is the blue light. *Light Ohio Blue*, a central Ohio based organization dedicated to honoring Ohio's law enforcement personnel, works with Ohio businesses to light skylines blue across the state in support of law enforcement, as well as to encourage every citizen to change their home exterior lights to blue. Partnering with *Light Ohio Blue* in early 2020, *Let's Back the Blue* encouraged businesses and individuals to Light Auglaize County Blue by illuminating blue lights at their homes and businesses, especially during National Police Week in May. Our communities responded, and even more encouraging to us is the number of blue lights that still continue to shine, night and day throughout the year, in full support of our local law enforcement!


Financial Summary

The financial support given by our communities and beyond to further the mission of *Let's Back the Blue* has been tremendous. Businesses, community foundations, and individuals bought chicken dinners, bought and sold raffle tickets, took part in the 5K, and/or donated time and money. Encouraged by this wonderful response by so many we remain committed to being good fiscal stewards to assure sustainability, enabling us to continue to grow our funds and initiate programs designed to benefit law enforcement and increase community participation.

Law Enforcement Grant Fund

Because COVID-19 initially dealt a financial blow to our law enforcement agencies with many of them experiencing budget cuts of at least 10%, *Let's Back the Blue* established a Law Enforcement Grant Fund to which our local law enforcement agencies could apply for wants and needs not covered by their budgets. Applications are submitted by agencies for purchase of equipment, and once approved *Let's Back the Blue* pays the invoice. During 2021, **\$53,544 was awarded for law enforcement needs through the grant,** including rebuilding one agency's training budget which had been deleted.

Grants funded such equipment as body cameras, moveable speed detection signs, tasers, shotguns, a radar unit, active shooter protection kits with special vests designed to withstand high velocity rifle fire, outer vest covers, night vision goggles, cameras, and more. There are other grant sources available to our agencies which may or may not approve requests, but what makes this grant unique is the fact it is funded by Auglaize County residents for use by Auglaize County law enforcement. Each item purchased through our grant fulfilled a distinct need, resulting in safer conditions for officers and their

Police Academy Scholarships









A well documented **recruiting crisis** exists across the nation at every level of law enforcement, and many of our local agencies are feeling its negative effects. Unfortunately, it's not just the department that is affected - it is also the community. When too few take a civil service exam as the first step toward law enforcement employment, an agency is forced to accept those who may not be a good fit.

Offering scholarships could help attract men and women who are excited by and committed to a career in law enforcement. Because cadets living in Auglaize County and attending the three area training academies are frequently hired by Auglaize County law enforcement agencies, it benefits not only the cadet, but also the local communities in which they will serve.

In 2021, multiple scholarships were established for Auglaize County residents attending the three area Peace Officer Training Academies. *Let's Back the Blue* financed two \$1,000 scholarships at Wright State University-Lake Campus, one \$1,000 scholarship at Rhodes State University, and one \$500 scholarship at Apollo Career Center. Looking ahead to 2022, our intention is to finance two \$1,000 scholarships at each institution, helping to pave the way for better recruits for our communities.

Special Community Partnerships

Because of our belief in proper, consistent, and repetitive law enforcement training, *Let's Back the Blue* approved a request by the Wright State University-Lake Campus Peace Officer Training Academy to purchase a DART firearms simulator. Our Law Enforcement agencies in Auglaize County hire many recruits from the training academies at WSU-Lake Campus, Rhodes State, and Apollo Career Center, and it is in the best interest of residents of Auglaize County to ensure new recruits are well trained. Because Commander Mark Ernst is commander of both WSU and Rhodes State academies, the simulator will be used by both academies.

Besides helping to **improve confidence** and offering **frequent repetitive training**, the system comes with a series of de-escalation techniques that provide additional training. Time spent with the **simulator de-escalation techniques will help both academies to achieve STAR certification**, a certification offered by the state for academies that meet additional hours, certifications, and other requirements. STAR Certification also requires exposure to advanced police technology, and the DART system will help both academies meet this requirement as well. An added bonus is the unit's portability, and when not in use by the academies, **may be shared with law enforcement agencies in Auglaize County.**

Satellite Chapters

One goal for 2021 was to be able to develop satellite chapters in each municipality in Auglaize County. Building core support in each area ensures growth in support and appreciation for local law enforcement agencies, as well as sustainability for *Let's Back the Blue*. Each satellite chapter can operate in a manner that uniquely serves their own agency the best while operating under the *Let's Back the Blue* umbrella. **Currently, we have coordinators in Waynesfield, Cridersville, Minster, St. Marys, and Wapakoneta**. We will continue our focus of securing a coordinator for each agency by the end of 2022.

Our Auglaize County Law Enforcement Agencies

AUGLAIZE COUNTY SHERIFF



Since the establishment of Auglaize County in 1848, Sheriff Michael Vorhees is our county's 30th Sheriff. Possessing jurisdiction throughout the county, including all municipalities, the department manages the county jail, runs the DARE program, issues CCW licenses, conducts National WebChecks, and processes court paperwork. The 78 employees who are a vital part of the Sheriff's Office include administrative employees, full and part-time Corrections Officers, food service employees, a jail nurse, and a mental health and substance abuse counselor. Eleven Dispatchers are on the line with you in an emergency, while 24 Deputies and 10 Auxiliary Deputies attend court proceedings, serve subpoenas, manage eSORN, and preserve the peace we all enjoy. The Sheriff's Office is active in schools and community, watches over our homes when we are away, and is a true partner in assuring our safety.



WAPAKONETA POST - OHIO STATE HIGHWAY PATROL


The mission of the Wapakoneta Post of the Ohio State Highway Patrol is to protect life and property, promote traffic safety, and provide professional public services with respect, compassion, and professionalism. The Wapakoneta Post helps with driver's education classes, conducts vehicle inspections, and takes part in the Auglaize County Shop With A Cop program. Under the leadership of Lt. John Westerfield, the post includes four sergeants, 13 troopers, and one administrative assistant.

CRIDERSVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT



The Cridersville Police Department provides 24 hour a day, 7 days a week police protection and services to the Village Of Cridersville. Staffing includes Chief Paul A. Robbins, four additional full-time officers, three part-time officers, and one part-time clerk.

The CPD pledge to enhance the quality of life throughout the village is that of excellence, initiative, and integrity. It is their goal to continue being a responsive, proactive and caring department making Cridersville a safe place to live, work, and visit.







MINSTER POLICE DEPARTMENT

With seven well trained professionals providing full-time protection, the Minster Police Department, under the leadership of Chief David Friend, focuses on preventing crime before it happens. Partnering with the Minster Local Schools, MPD officers can be found in school classrooms educating students on topics ranging from bicycle safety, drug awareness, and more. In keeping with their focus on crime prevention, the MPD utilizes a new communications service that allows important, valuable community information sent directly to residents, helping to keep crime low and relationships strong.

The New Bremen Police Department provides law enforcement in the village with seven full-time officers and up to five part-time officers, overseen by Chief Michael Skinner. All officers have completed mandatory training at the Ohio Peace Officers Training Academy. The department has three fully equipped cruisers and a sports utility vehicle utilized by the K-9 unit.

Going out of town? If you notify the department that you will be on vacation and your home will be unoccupied, the department will keep an eye on your house for you. The department also offers safety talks to schools and organizations about traffic and pedestrian safety and related topics.



NEW KNOXVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT



Recently named Chief of the New Knoxville Police Department, Chief Chris McKinney's primary focus is to maintain bonds with residents the department serves while ensuring the locally low crime rate continues to drop.
