

When to Refer: A Guide for Providers

Knowing when to refer a patient for AAC services can ensure timely intervention.

Refer if the Child Has
Limited speech development or no spoken language
Unclear speech that impacts functional communication
Difficulty making their wants/needs known
Frequent frustration due to communication breakdowns
A degenerative condition affecting speech
Speech that is inconsistent or unreliable
A history of unsuccessful speech therapy progress
A history of language regression

Medical Diagnoses That Often Benefit from AAC

- Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD)
- Global Developmental Delay
- Cerebral Palsy (CP)
- Down Syndrome
- Apraxia of Speech
- Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI)
- Progressive Neurological Disorder

How to Refer a Patient

- Write a prescription for 'Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC)
 Evaluation'
- Provide relevant medical history that impacts communication
- Direct families to Speech Tech or another AAC service provider for assessment
