Dear Members and Friends of Community Presbyterian Church,



He started and served a church in Maryland for 30 years, but is most noted for being the translator of **The Message** version of the Bible. He knew <u>As Kingfisher Catch Fire</u> would be his last work and wanted to make sure Presbyterian pastors got complimentary copies. I received mine as I attended a conference at Whitworth College (Presbyterian school) in Spokane. His son, Eric, was speaking at this conference and made sure we each received a copy of his dad's book. (Certainly a generous gift to given a hardback book and someone secured the funds for this to happen ~ thank you!)

The book is a collection of Rev. Peterson's sermons from his years in the pastorate. The theme (glue) that hangs all of these sermons together is the concept of *congruence*. His desire was to assist his fellow disciples of Jesus in his congregation to live a life of congruence. He says, "A life of congruence (is a life) with no slippage between what a person is saying and the way they are living." As modern day disciples of Jesus, as apprentices of Jesus, this should be our goal. Think about it. I ask myself a lot about congruence in my life ~ is what you see what is really within me, if not what needs changed?

May our New Year together be one of personal growth and enjoying the adventure of following God with our lives.

October 2019 - - Elect a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) (Completed)




Oct ~ Nov 2019 - - Complete Ministry Information Form (MIF)(resume of the church) (Completed)



December 2019 - - Submit MIF for circulation (Completed)



January ~ August 2020 - - Review Personal Information Forms (PIF) - Interviews - Neutral
Pulpit presentation - present candidate to congregation for vote

Youth Sunday School Schedule

We are trying to rebuild our youth Sunday School program. The plan is to start small and expand as we can. In order to accomplish this, we need to establish a regular schedule when the families with children can count on there being a class. Thus, the Christian Education Committee decided to start with a very limited schedule. The first Sunday of each month, the students will remain in worship to celebrate communion with the whole church. Then on the third Sunday of the month, there will be a class offered for the second half of worship. It is hoped that a regular schedule will be helpful to families with numerous other commitments. Did You Know That You Can Donate To The Church By Using Your IRA?

Because of changes in the tax laws there is now a tax-friendly way to contribute to qualifying charities (like a church). In general, distributions from a traditional IRA are taxable in the year you receive them. But one exception to this rule is the **Q**ualified **C**haritable **D**istribution (QCD). A QCD generally is a nontaxable distribution made directly by the trustee of your IRA to an organization eligible to receive tax-deductible contributions. You must be at least age 70½ when the distribution is made. Also, you must have the same type of acknowledgment of your contribution as you would need to claim a deduction for a charitable contribution. (You can't claim a charitable contribution deduction for an QCD not included in your income.)

This provision of the tax code may be of interest to taxpayers who are at least age 70_{1/2} and have a traditional IRA. These individuals must take required minimum distributions from their IRA each year. Seniors in this position can now make charitable contributions while at the same time reducing their taxable income by directing the trustee of their IRA to make qualified charitable distributions (QCD), which count towards their minimum distribution.
