

## Community Presbyterian Church May 2020 Newsletter

Dear Members and Friends of Community Presbyterian Church,

It is fair to say we are all looking forward to the day when we can be back in our sanctuary and worshiping together. We miss not seeing each other. However, it will be a while before 'being back' is a reality. Brad Munroe, our presbytery pastor, has likened our return more to a 'rheostat' rather than a 'light switch'. We will gradually take steps to reopen the office and our sanctuary as we come out of our current situation, **but it will happen!** 

The Session (Board of Elders) met Thursday, April 30<sup>th</sup> to discuss a number of issues that are reported in this issue of the newsletter. However, a very focused conversation took place about re-gathering for worship and what steps are needed before we can be together again. It was decided...

- Because of the average age of our congregation (large percentage of higher risk category attenders) we will be extremely cautious about opening too soon. We will probably open later than some other congregations in the area.
- At least for the month of May, we will continue with our 'virtual' worship services.
- A working group was formed to oversee, with Drs. Yost and Traeger advising, the implementation of the Grand Canyon Presbytery's "**Guidelines for Reopening Checklist**". This checklist includes the following categories to be considered:
  - 1. Congregational Makeup and Risk Factors
  - 2. Physical Plant and Equipment
  - 3. Worship Options
  - 4. Sanitation and Cleaning
  - 5. Staff Management
  - 6. Community Connections and Outreach

To reopen in a safe and measured way is going to take time and patience. Please be praying for your congregational leadership as we strive to accomplish this mutual goal. In the Apostle John's vision recorded in Revelation 21:5, God says, "Behold I make all things new." From this time of closure, new and refreshing times will come. God has not forgotten us, rather God is 're-forming' us – in a sense we are living a faith adventure. Don't lose heart or get discouraged, God is with us – and that is 'Good News'.

<u>- White Mountain Apache Community</u> – Because of the overwhelming support of the presbytery churches to the call to assist the Navajo Nation Relief Effort, our Session was asked to divert our donations to the White Mountain Apache Community. The Elders concurred with this request. We are still collecting food and cleaning items for our neighbors in White River, so please stop by with your donations. Thank you!

<u>- On-line Donations</u> – The Session also approved the establishment of a way to make online donations through our website. The application forms are being filled this week and we hope to have a 'donate' button on our homepage in the near future. We will be working through the **Presbyterian Foundation** of the PCUSA.



## The "ROADMAP" TO A NEW INSTALLED PASTOR


The 'Roadmap' To A New Installed Pastor: Don't forget to continue praying for your Pastor Nominating Committee. Just as a reminder, below is the 'roadmap' to securing a new installed pastor:

- February ~ May 2019 - Spend time getting to know congregation (Completed)
- June ~ July 2019 - Complete congregational mission study (Completed)
- October 2019 - Elect a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) (Completed)
- Oct ~ Nov 2019 - Complete Ministry Information Form (MIF)(resume of the church) (Completed)
- December 2019 - Submit MIF for circulation (Completed)

January ~ August 2020 - - Review Personal Information Forms (PIF) - Interviews - (Partly completed) Neutral Pulpit presentation - present candidate to congregation for vote (in Process)

#### Did You Know That You Can Donate To The Church By Using Your IRA?

Because of changes in the tax laws there is now a tax-friendly way to contribute to qualifying charities (like a church). In general, distributions from a traditional IRA are taxable in the year you receive them. But one exception to this rule is the **Q**ualified **C**haritable **D**istribution (QCD). A QCD generally is a nontaxable distribution made directly by the trustee of your IRA to an organization eligible to receive tax-deductible contributions. You must be at least age 701/2 when the distribution is made. Also, you must have the same type of acknowledgment of your contribution as you would need to claim a deduction for a charitable contribution. (You can't claim a charitable contribution deduction for an QCD not included in your income.)

This provision of the tax code may be of interest to taxpayers who are at least age 701/2 and have a traditional IRA. These individuals must take required minimum distributions from their IRA each year. Seniors in this position can now make charitable contributions while at the same time reducing their taxable income by directing the trustee of their IRA to make qualified charitable distributions (QCD), which count towards their minimum distribution.

<u>Updates on Website:</u> If you haven't checked out our website (<u>www.cpcpinetop.org</u>) recently, please do. You will see many updates containing different types of material. Some of the information is directed toward folks seeking a church to attend, others is information that you as a member/attender may need to know. The biggest change you will see is the addition of videos of the anthem and sermon from our Sunday services. So if you miss a Sunday and wanted to hear the message, no worries, you can watch it wherever you are!
