The Bay Area group has been busy learning new things. In January, we learned how to use Quikwood to make features on a gourd. Working with this two-part epoxy product brought on a lot of ideas among the group.

At the February meeting, we started a Tree of Life project. We cut the front hole, drilled holes, stained and applied finish to the gourd.

At the March and April meetings, we used wire and stones to make our trees. In May, we will use closed coiling to finish the rim of the gourd. The next Gourdzette will have pictures of some finished products.







Diary of a Suburban Gourd Farmer

Oh how I yearn to be a gourd farmer. I dream at night of laying in a field of dried gourds waiting to be harvested and turned into a work of art. But then I wake up and have to check for bugs and dirt in my hair.

Unfortunately for a gourd farmer wanna be, I live in a subdivision and to make matters worse I live in Katy, Tx which is humid and very, very hot in the summer. However these minor setbacks have not dimmed my ambition to grow my own gourds. Several years ago I had a volunteer gourd sprout up in my side yard where I sometimes cleaned gourds. I was so excited. I fed the little plant, I watered the little plant, I talked to the little plant, I even sang to the little plant which may have been a mistake as my neighbor called animal control thinking there was an injured feral cat in my backyard. Soon I had a couple of gourds on the vine. I continued to water my plant religiously until around July when the vines started drying out. Once they did dry I was left with about 10 dried small bottle gourds. Most of them survived but unfortunately the walls were very thin. They were useful for painting and for wood burning but not for carving.

For those who read my post in the last issue, I had much better luck in 2023 and I was able to grow three Tennessee Spinner Gourd plants and got 30-40 spinner gourds. So this year, learning from my past mistakes, I am planting three varieties of small gourds. Small gourds seem to be what work best in my area. I am planting banana gourds, egg gourds, and some more spinner gourds. I planted the seeds and they germinated. In April, I transferred them to appropriate flower beds in my backyard where all gourd farmers plant.

To support them I called my handyman brother who can always be counted on to overkill any household project, and he came out and built me two small trellises from cattle panels. It was definitely overkill but they are great and I love them. Tune in next time to for our next edition of "As the Gourd Grows" and see if anything sprouts.
