### Community Outreach Events

From Sue Harberer with the Dallas Gourd Patch

In May I gave a speech to the Masters Garden Club in Dallas about growing gourds and also how they can be made into instruments. They were very interested in the history of gourds and how they have evolved into our use of them today. As a result, Marla and I have been asked to do programs for the Newhaven Gardens in the Fall and upcoming year, maybe even giving classes.

About 2 weeks ago, several of our members gave a class on gourds to 27 kids at the A.H. Library in Midlothian, Texas. We explained what gourds were and how they grew, telling them about uses in the past and how we use them today. We then helped them make a rattle on a stick with gourds. Even the parents and library got so enthused that they participated in making rattles. They were all very excited when we gave them some seeds to grow their own gourds.

In September we will start our annual Arboretum Demonstrations where we can go to the Dallas Arboretum every Thursday through October and give the public demonstrations, educate them about gourds and even sell our own art. As a result, we gain new members and often get requests to give programs.

### First Annual North Texas Gourd Festival

The first annual North Texas Gourd Festival was held on April 19 – 20, 2024 at the Lake Granbury Conference Center in Granbury, Texas. The venue was modern and airconditioned which offered a great venue for our show. The festival held classes on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. There were "Make and Take" booths where attendees could sit down and make a gourd project for a small fee and take it with them. Vendors booths sold out quickly before the festival and there was a nice selection of raw and finished gourds for sale as well as supplies for both the beginner and experienced gourd artist. A competition with the theme "Critters" was held and some really creative pieces were entered. The best part of the festival was the fellowship and sharing among members and attendees. The Texas Gourd Society held it's Spring Meeting at Spring Creek Barbeque where discussion was held about the Spring Festival and the upcoming Lone Star Festival in October.

A huge thank you goes out to Marla Garber, Sue Harberer, and everyone in the Dallas and Cowtown Gourd Patch. They all worked really hard to bring this inaugural show to fruition and make it the huge success it was.

One of the negotiations that the show committee did as part of our contract was with the venue. They tracked the number of hotel rooms that were booked in the Granbury area by people who attended the festival and based on the number of rooms booked TGS received a discount off the venue rental fee. I am happy to report that we reached the maximum needed number of rooms and received a 100% refund of our venue rental fee. This along with the hard work by the Dallas Gourd Patch made the festival both a huge success not only for attendees but also financially. TGS has already scheduled the next years festival for April 4-5, 2025. So mark your calendars for next year, because you don't want to miss it. It will be even bigger.

# A Trip to the "Gourd Gathering" By Cathy West

I love to go to Gourd shows! I love our own Lone Star Gourd Festival and our new Spring Gourd Show. I also love to travel to other state shows and experience their love of gourds. I have been to the Wuertz show in Casa Grande several times and I'm always impressed with the show they put on.

This summer I decided to try another well-known show and that was *The Gourd Gathering* held on June 5-9, 2024, in Waynesville, North Carolina. When I was researching this show, I noticed on the website they headlined the show as "It's More Than Gourds: It's A Reunion/A Tradition/ A Destination/ An Experience". They weren't kidding. I was impressed early on by how many classes were offered. There were classes on four different days of the show; Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. The variety of classes was great and included gourds, weaving, wet felting, and other techniques. I signed up for two classes. The first class was how to scupt a Betta fish using a banana gourd, Quikwood, and crafting plastic taught by Cara Bevan. (If you haven't heard of Cara Bevan check out her website) The second class was weaving Indian Corn. We each were able to weave three Indian corns in three separate colors using variegated and solid reed. Both classes were really fun, and I learned some new skills to use at home.





To really get into the mood of the show, I volunteered to staff a "Make and Take" booth on Thursday morning. The show offered some medium bottle gourds with a hole cut into the top. The artists decoupaged the bottom part of the gourd using colorful napkins, then they decorated a face for the gourd using sharpies or plastic eyes, fake eyelashes, etc. There were several tubs of costume jewelry to choose necklaces, earrings, and other jewelry. Finally the "Gourd Gal" got a beautiful succulent placed in the top for her beautiful hair.







It was a lot of fun and the public really enjoyed it.

The Gathering had a competition with the theme Oh Dang It, Just Hang It! The description being "Does it hang? Then it is an entry!" The competition was judged, then the entries were auctioned off in a silent auction to raise money for the show. There were a lot of great entries. I did submit an entry and won a second place ribbon. I was so happy!!

The Gourd Gathering had a gourd exchange with the theme being *Get Tropical*. Participants brought a gourd designed with a tropical theme. Attendees voted on their favorite. Then on Saturday night at a dinner held at the venue all the gourd makers danced through the hall with their gourds. I missed it but heard it was a delight.





Texas was well represented at the gathering with several members of TGS. Besides myself. Marla Garber and the Garber Gang had booths with tools and finished gourds. Shelly Garber had customized t-shirts, mugs, and other items. Sue Haberer taught several classes including a beautiful butterfly and a crackled grape leaf bowl.







The one unique feature about The Gourd Gathering that really couldn't be matched by any other shows I've been to was how beautiful the countryside was around Waynesville, North Carolina, The mountains, forests, wildlife, sunsets, and temperatures were a real treat to escape the Texas heat in June. I actually saw a black bear!





So next June if you're contemplating a trip to visit a gourd show with beautiful surroundings, as well as great artistry keep The Gourd Gathering on your radar.
