Each of the entries was unique and very

well done. The 3rd annual North Texas Gourd Festival will be April 17-18-19 and will be held again at the Lake Granbury Conference Center in Granbury, Tx. Set up will be on April 16, 2026.



WAY OUT WUERTZ

As many of you may know, I love to go to Gourd Festivals. I have written several articles for the Gourdzette about festivals in other states. Earlier this year as I was sitting here in Katy, Texas feeling cold and everything outside was wet and gloomy, so I decided a trip to Arizona would be just the thing to brighten my spirits. I made reservations to attend the Wuertz Gourd Festival in Casa Grande, Arizona from January 31 to February 2, 2025.

Wuertz is one of my favorite gourd shows for many reasons. They have exquisite sunshine when you're suffering from the winter blues. Wuertz Gourd Farm has been sponsoring this festival for twenty years. Being a commercial working farm, they have lots of raw gourds for sale and farm animals for petting. Wuertz also has many unique contests like a mini gourdster car race and gourd boat races. You'll probably also spot a gourdman marathon runner. It has activities for the gourd enthusiasts and visitors alike.

Of course, if I go to a gourd show I have a take a couple of classes so I can add to my collection of "almost completed gourds started in a class", which I must say is growing exponentially. I took a class on pyrography which was very helpful as everything I know about pyrography is from trial and error. I also took a class called "Butterflies and Burlap" where we did filagree, created a burlap rim, and did a butterfly image on the gourd with dye. All the classes were very helpful and most important they were much fun.

The Arizona Gourd Society has it's annual competition in conjunction with the festival where you can view some of the best gourd art anywhere in the world. The competition draws entries from everywhere in the US. The Texas Gourd Society was well represented with our own Marla Garber and Shelly Garber taking home ribbons for their entries.
