Hill Country Gathering Patch


Do you live in Burnet County or the surrounding area? If so, you are in luck.

AUTUMN AT THE ARBORETUM

The Dallas Arboretum is known as a top tourist site in the Dallas area and the State of Texas. The arboretum is known as one of the top botanical gardens in the world. Each season the Arboretum has a themed display that celebrates the colors, flora, and spirit of that season. This fall, the Dallas Arboretum transformed its Pumpkin Village into <code>iMundo México!</code>—an celebration of Mexican culture, contemporary art, and the harvest season. More than **110,000** <code>pumpkins</code>, <code>gourds</code>, <code>and squash</code> were used to create this year's display. The display contained brightly colored Mexican folk art sculptures called <code>alebrijes</code> created by Jacobo and María Ángeles. The Dallas Gourd patch does a great job every year with Community Outreach by partnering with the Dallas Arboretum to show gourd art during their fall exhibition and provide opportunities for the public to have "hands on" activities. Thank you to the Dallas Gourd Patch for your commitment to help TGS with our community outreach.

Dallas Gourd Patch Artists Harvest Blue Ribbons at Texas State Fair Creative Arts Competition

As the dust settles on another triumphant run of the State Fair of Texas, one local group is basking in the glow of hard-earned accolades: the Dallas Gourd Patch. Members of this vibrant community of gourd artisans scooped up multiple winning entries in the Fair's renowned Creative Arts competitions, showcasing the transformative power of humble gourds into stunning works of art.

The Texas State Fair, which drew nearly 2.4 million visitors to Fair Park from September 26 to October 19, is as much a celebration of culinary excess as it is a showcase for Texan craftsmanship. The Creative Arts Building hummed with impressive feats of creativity. Over 12,000 entries flooded categories ranging from quilting and photography to folk art and, of course, decorated gourds. It was in this verdant niche that the Dallas Gourd Patch truly flourished.

Founded as a haven for artists passionate about turning dried gourds into functional and decorative masterpieces, the Dallas Gourd Patch has long been a fixture at the Fair. Their entries this year dominated the Decorated Gourds category, blending intricate carving, painting, and theming to earn blue ribbons and honorable mentions. Standouts included whimsical pieces inspired by Texas icons—think longhorn silhouettes etched into vessel gourds and bluebonnet motifs adorning birdhouse varieties—reflecting the group's signature blend of regional pride and meticulous technique.

These victories aren't just about ribbons; they're a testament to the Patch's ethos of education and camaraderie. Monthly meetings at the Mesquite Elk Lodge features demos on everything from woodburning to dyeing, fostering a "patch" where novices rub shoulders with pros. Their Fair presence extends beyond competition—members volunteered at craft demos, delighting fairgoers with live gourd-carving sessions and tips on sourcing sustainable materials from local farms.

As the 2025 Fair wraps (with whispers of even bigger crowds next year), the Dallas Gourd Patch is already plotting ahead. It's not just about winning, it's about planting seeds—literally and figuratively—for the next generation of artists. For those inspired to join the harvest, the group's next meeting is November 15. Who knows? Your gourd could be the next Fair sensation.














GOURD SIGHTINGSubmitted By Becky Klix
