Winfield Prepares for Nation's 250th Anniversary

As preparations ramp up for the 250th anniversary of the founding of the United States, plans are being made all around Winfield to celebrate.

The Winfield Historical Society's official history book, *Winfield's Good Old Days: A History*, was last published during the nation's Bicentennial in 1976. The Society has enlisted local residents to contribute updates and additions to the original chapters. The revised edition will be available for purchase in Summer 2026. See press release on page 2 for more details.

"The Village has gone all in to support the Historical Society and Library with a litany of programming," said Village Manager Evan Summers. "The two major areas are sponsorship of the reprinting of *Winfield's Good Old Days: A History* and a lecture series to commemorate the Semiquincentennial."

The Village of Winfield has allocated \$5,000 to partner with the Winfield Historical Society and the Winfield Public Library on a yearlong slate of commemorative events, including hosting a variety of speakers covering both national and local history topics as part of the anniversary programming.

The following programs will be held:

Tuesday, February 10, 7:00 p.m. *Abraham Lincoln: A New Birth of Freedom.* Featuring Kevin Wood as Abraham Lincoln.

Tuesday, March 24, 7:00 p.m. *Revolutionary American.* Featuring Becky Tulloch as Abigail Adams.



Tuesday, May 19, 7:00 p.m. *The Uniform of a Continental Soldier.* Featuring Jack Tison, American Revolutionary War reenactor and educator

Tuesday, July 21, 7:00 p.m. *Defining US: The 250th Anniversary of the United States.* Featuring a historian from the DuPage County History Museum.

Tuesday, September 22, 7:00 p.m. *Flappers, Floozies and Feminists – Chicago Women and the Roaring Twenties.* Featuring historian Laurie Russell.

Tuesday, November, 17, 7:00 p.m. *Relics of the Chicago, Aurora, and Elgin Railway.* Featuring local historians Joyce and Brian Ostberg.

The programs are free to attend. Registration is required to attend the programs via the Winfield Public Library website event calendar at the following link: winfield.librarycalendar.com/events/month.

The Village is also planning to assist in expanding the Good Old Days Parade. According to Village Manager Summers, the village will be working to find additional parade entries such as bands and historical portrayals, and other ways to incorporate the Semiquincentennial into the celebration.

Officials at DuPage County are also participating in Semiquincentennial activities. The County Recorder has begun using a new commemorative seal which honors the anniversary. 'Built Like a Tank': New Water Truck Delivered in Winfield

If someone visited the Winfield Fire Protection District headquarters station in 2021 and didn't return until Spring 2026, they would have missed a LOT of change in five years. Additional firefighter/paramedics have been hired, new ambulances and a fire engine have been put into service, a new headquarters fire station was built, and staff turnover is no longer a constant challenge. Where Winfield crew had to occasionally borrow neighboring agency vehicles because theirs broke down, twice neighboring agencies have borrowed Winfield's spare vehicles.

"Things are really great right now at Winfield Fire Protection District," said Fire Chief Steve Evans. "Thanks to the dedication of the board, the hard work of the crew, and our community for providing the resources through the passage of the referendum in 2022, we are delivering all of our promised outcomes. The referendum was about three things: adding additional crew members, upgrading the fleet, and providing a place to put those things. And all of those promises have been delivered: Additional crew has been hired, the new headquarters station on County Farm Road is up and running, and new vehicles are reliably getting first responders to emergencies."

One of the last pieces of equipment that needed to be replaced was the aging water tender, a truck that carries 2500 gallons of water. It was built in 2010 and has reached the end of its reliable life in front-line service. It will be sent for refurbishment to serve for the next ten years as a reserve (backup) vehicle. Interestingly, Winfield has never had a backup water truck- despite more than 2/3 of

the properties served do not have access to water hydrants.

"Through discussions about our needs, we were fortunate enough to receive a grant from Northwestern Medicine/CDH to replace our aging water tender," said Chief Evans. The 2025 International was manufactured by Alexis Fire Equipment

Company (located in western Illinois) and holds 2,000 gallons of water. The design was chosen to be as simple as possible- both to keep the cost down and to increase reliability. "This truck has no extra options. We wanted a simple vehicle that would be reliable and easy to work on. This truck is built like a tank," said Evans.

The HOW Committee is currently collaborating with the publisher on a price point for the book, once the final manuscript is delivered. Those inter-

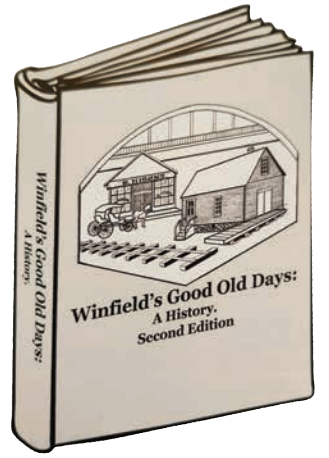
ested in purchasing the book will receive information this spring on the cost of book.

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Cleaner Streets, Stronger Community: The SBC Difference

On February 19, Jennie Fleming and I had the pleasure of sitting down with SBC President Shawn Flood to talk about waste, recycling, and what it really means to serve a community like Winfield.

In a town like ours, you notice the little things. You notice when the same driver waves each week. You notice when a question gets answered by a real person instead of an automated system. And you definitely notice when something goes wrong – and how quickly it gets fixed. That kind of reliability doesn't happen by accident. It's built over time through consistency, customer service, and a genuine commitment to the people being served.

That's the story behind SBC, Winfield's long-time waste and recycling partner. As the company approaches its ninth anniversary – officially incorporated just before St. Patrick's Day nine years ago – SBC has grown steadily throughout the region. But as Shawn made clear, growth has never meant losing their "partnership mindset." If anything, it has reinforced it.

Winfield was one of SBC's early municipal partners, and that history still matters. Shawn spoke openly about the trust the Village placed in SBC in its early days. That support helped the company grow, and it's something they haven't forgotten. Today, the relationship goes well beyond a service contract.

SBC participates in community traditions like Good Old Days, donating time and providing waste services for events. They sponsor local initiatives and support organizations throughout town. It's not flashy – but it's consistent. And in a community like Winfield, that consistency counts.

Beyond community involvement, much of our conversation focused on services many residents may not even realize are available.

One of the biggest takeaways? Several programs people assume are limited or costly are actually free and available year-round.

Take paint and e-waste, for example. Instead of waiting for a once-a-year collection event, residents can call SBC to schedule pickup of leftover paint

or electronics at any time. The key is scheduling through the office rather than placing items out on a regular pickup day, since these materials are handled separately. There's no strict "one box" rule

processed properly.

Another program that stood out is SBC's backdoor service for seniors and residents with disabilities. In winter especially, moving heavy carts through snow and ice can be more than inconvenient – it can be dangerous. For qualified residents, SBC drivers will bring the carts to the curb, empty them, and return them. It's a simple accommodation that can make a significant difference for those trying to remain independent in their homes.

That mindset – neighbors taking care of neighbors – came up repeatedly in our conversation.

We also discussed recycling contamination, an issue communities across the country are facing.

When non-recyclable materials end up in recycling

carts, it drives up costs and can compromise entire loads. SBC drivers are trained to identify obvious contamination at the curb and leave tags or notices when there's a problem. It's not about punishment – it's about education and keeping the system working for everyone.

SBC trucks are equipped with cameras as well. Shawn explained that the cameras are primarily used to resolve customer service questions – confirming whether a cart was out, documenting timing issues, or clarifying concerns about missed pickups. They also provide an added layer of accountability and, in some cases, have assisted law enforcement when footage was requested.

Seasonal recycling initiatives are another example of SBC's partnership with the Village.

either – Shawn emphasized that the goal is to make proper disposal easy so these items stay out of landfills.

During our conversation, it was obvious that Shawn genuinely cares about the environmental side of the work. He mentioned the battery collection bin at Village Hall, which allows residents to drop off household batteries for proper disposal. (Car batteries, he noted, should be scheduled directly through SBC.) These details may seem small, but they add up to meaningful environmental impact over time.

Hazardous waste collection is also available at no additional charge. Items like old gasoline can be picked up with advance scheduling. SBC uses separate trucks for materials like paint and e-waste to prevent contamination and ensure everything is

Ginger Apricot Glazed Chicken

- 3/4 cup apricot preserves
- 1/4 cup rice vinegar
- 2 tbsp low sodium soy sauce
- 1 tsp sesame oil
- 1 tbsp grated ginger
- 1-2 tsp minced garlic
- **Red pepper flakes (optional)
- 2 lbs chicken breasts – whole or cut into chunks
- salt and pepper

Mix: apricot preserve, rice vinegar, soy sauce, sesame oil, ginger, garlic, red pepper flakes, salt and pepper to taste

Combine chicken with marinade and keep in refrigerator for at least 3 hours.

**Or add chicken and marinade to a freezer safe bag and freeze contents for safe longer-term storage. take out at any time, thaw under refrigeration, and follow next instructions.

Heat up 1 tbsp extra virgin olive oil in a pan, put chicken along with extra marinade into pan and cook chicken until internal temperature is 165 degrees F.

Serve over brown rice with any vegetable! I recommend sautéed zucchini or asparagus.

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No Will, No Plan: What Happens When the Court Decides for You

Before we dive in, I want to take a moment to thank you for welcoming me into your home. Through A Legal Moment with Eron, my goal is to provide practical, easy-to-understand information to help you and your family make informed decisions about legal issues that matter most.

Years ago, I met with a family after the sudden loss of a loved one. He was a devoted parent, owned a home, and had young children. Like many families, they assumed his spouse would automatically inherit everything and continue raising the children without any legal hurdles. Unfortunately, that's not how Illinois law works.

Because there was no will in place, the family had to go through probate court. What followed were delays, unexpected legal costs, and difficult conversations — all during a time when the family should have been focused on grieving and healing. Much of that stress could have been avoided with a simple estate plan.

In Illinois, dying without a will doesn't mean things just "work themselves out." Instead, a judge and state law makes decisions on your behalf — decisions that may not reflect your values, wishes, or what you would have wanted for your family.

When someone dies without a valid will, Illinois law considers them to have died intestate. In these situations, the law — not your family — determines who receives your property, who manages your estate, and who is responsible for caring for your minor children. Probate often takes a year or longer to complete and uses financial resources that could otherwise have gone directly to your loved ones or charitable causes.

If you are married and have children, your spouse does not automatically receive everything. Instead, your spouse receives one-half of the estate, and your children divide the other half. If you are married with no children, your spouse generally inherits everything. If you are unmarried with children, your children inherit your estate. If you have no spouse or children, a judge will look to your family tree. By operation of law your real and personal property may pass to parents, siblings, or even more distant relatives — regardless of how close those relationships may be. If no living relatives can be found, your estate will "escheat" to the State of Illinois (this almost never happens). This means the State becomes the owner of your property. Your assets do not go to friends, long-time partners, charities, or people you may have intended to benefit — they go to the government simply because no legal

heirs were located.

Many people are surprised by how property is divided when there is no will. Illinois law looks at your family tree, whether you are married, and the ages of your children to determine who will act on behalf of the estate. If you have minor children, this often adds an additional layer of expense, and probate may remain open until those children reach the age of majority. Once a child turns eighteen, any funds being held for them by a guardian or conservator are typically distributed outright.

For parents, this is often the most troubling issue. If you pass away without a will and have children under the age of 18 and have not legally named a guardian, a judge will decide who raises your children. Your children could become part of the DCFS system and move around from foster parent to foster parent. While the court does its best to act in a child's best interest, that decision may not reflect your wishes, values, or family dynamics.

A properly drafted Illinois will allows you to make these decisions yourself. You can determine who receives your property, name guardians for your children, and significantly reduce stress, expense, and confusion for the people you love.

Estate planning isn't about being wealthy. It's about being prepared and protecting your family. Taking the time to put a will in place is one of the simplest and most meaningful steps you can take to ensure your family is taken care of when you are no longer around to take care of them.

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Rolling Up His Sleeves for Winfield

"Serving my community is all I know," says Evan Summers, Village Manager of Winfield.

I met with Summers on a very cold January morning at Sweet Reserve, where we talked over lattes by a sunny window about his role in Winfield as he approached nearly one year on the job.

"I grew up in Northwest Indiana," recalls Summers. "I came to Winfield after serving as the Village Manager in Bensenville for 8 years, and Assistant Village Manager in Berwyn before that."

Summers began serving as Winfield's interim Village Manager on March 1, 2025, working alongside retiring Village Manager Curt Barrett for two months. That overlap allowed for a seamless transition—an opportunity Summers says is rare in municipal government.

"You just don't often get that chance in this profession," Summers reflected. "Communities are rarely willing to invest in an overlap transition. It really demonstrated to me that this Village Board was committed to success, and that was the kind of place I wanted to work."

That transition allowed Summers to step fully into the role more quickly than would otherwise have been possible. "We're a very small staff," he explained. "In Winfield, the Village Manager doesn't have the same level of staff support that I've had in other places. I make my own PowerPoint presentations for board meetings, and I even do the graphic design for some of our social media posts."

For Summers, that hands-on approach has been energizing. "Coming to Winfield was great for me," he said. "I got to roll up my sleeves and do the technical work that inspired me to go into municipal government in the first place."

Public service, Summers noted, has always been part of his life. "I grew up learning about this business," he said. "My father was the budget director in San Antonio, Texas. I went with him to city council meetings in the evenings and watched him present budgets and work to improve economic conditions for residents. Serving the public through economic development was all I knew."

When asked what he enjoys most about working in Winfield, Summers pointed to the community's character and involvement.

"Winfield is unique in many ways," he said. "Residents are committed to preserving the feel of a

small town. Compared to other villages our size, we have fewer streetlights, curbs, and gutters. People care deeply about the community—they'll call Village Hall when a tree branch is down on a trail. That matters, because we don't have the staff to inspect every space regularly. It's clear that Winfield residents love spending time outdoors."

Looking ahead, Summers said his focus is on improving efficiency as demand for village services grows. "We only have 38 employees," he explained. "Many of our technology platforms date back to the 1990s and require a lot of staff time to process requests."

Among the improvements he's exploring are electronic permit applications to speed up turn-around times and GPS tracking systems for snow-plow trucks to ensure all streets are cleared during

winter storms. "We can do more by using our existing staff time more efficiently," he said.

Public safety is also a priority. "We're in the process of hiring one additional police officer, which will bring the department to full staffing for the first time in quite a while," Summers said. He also noted that the upcoming retirement of Police Chief Schar will require careful planning. "I'm hoping to work with the Village Board to develop a strong succession plan. A smooth transition in leadership is critical for our police department."

I wrapped up my conversation with Village Manager Evan Summers with a few lighter questions—the same ones I ask our firefighters and police officers.

Get to Know a Winfield First Responder

Firefighter/Paramedic Jeff Littledale

Where are you from and what brought you to Winfield?

I grew up in Elgin and worked in both Pin-gree Grove and Hampshire as a part time firefighter/paramedic. One of my co-workers found out that Winfield was hiring, so we both applied and tested here together. I started working in Winfield in 2013, and I still work here with my friend.

Why did you become a Firefighter/Paramedic?

My uncle is a mechanical engineer. In school I had an affinity for math, and thought I wanted to be a mechanical engineer like him. However, one of my high school dual credit classes did not transfer to college correctly, and I didn't want to spend a year re-taking classes I had already proved myself in. That made me question if M.E. was what I really wanted to do. Meanwhile, a friend enrolled in a Fire Science class so I joined him because it sounded interesting, and that's when I fell in love with the fire service. I liked spending time with other firefighters, hearing their stories, and I was intrigued by the sense of community and brotherhood that comes with this career. I enjoy learning through mentors, and that led me to take EMT classes, where I started to really appreciate the challenge of the medical side of the job. Now I enjoy the medical side of my job even more than firefighting- which is great, because 75% of our calls are for medical assistance.

What's the best part of your job in Winfield?

What attracted me to Winfield over other departments, and why I stay in Winfield, is the "old-fashioned" feeling of working in this fire house. Working here has a similar culture to the small rural towns where I first started working. Coming to work every day feels like I'm coming "home" to my work family- we work hard, joke around, and support each other.

I like the residential and "small town" feeling of most of our calls, but some of our calls are more like a large city experience because of the high traffic areas, large apartment complexes and two large hospital campuses. Every crew member has to learn every job- from paramedic to firefighting to water rescues. I like doing a little bit of everything.

What are your professional goals, or are there any skills/certifications you'd like to learn?

I've already accomplished a lot of the goals I set for myself. I still want to take classes for Advanced Fire Officer certification, which will allow me to work on my goal to become a Lieutenant. I have been training to prepare as a Lieutenant for the last couple of years and look forward to that opportunity.

Since the summer of 1993, Winfield residents, as well as those in surrounding communities, have had the good fortune of having fresh fruit and vegetables available from Illinois and Michigan farmers right here in town, every Wednesday, 7am to 1pm, for five months, June 3rd through October 28th, 2026.

“The only difference is that back then there were only five farmers that made up the entire market,” says the market manager of the past 31 years, Rich Bysina. “Today we have close to 40 vendors each week offering a variety of food products, including oven-fresh bread and bakery goods, frozen meats, cheese, honey, roasted nuts, kettle corn, sauces, coffee, plants, health and beauty items, hand-crafted jewelry, fabric and ceramic craft ware, food and stuff for pets, even professional services for the homeowner.”

“To help celebrate America’s Semiquincentennial, we’re adding something new for the opening month of June – big 11x17-inch paper placemats (inspired by those offered for sale by the America

250 organization) -- for parents to take home for their kids to color, then return them to receive five vendor bucks to spend at any vendor. It’s just what we do to celebrate Bugs Bunny’s birthday in July.”

Bysina’s ultimate goal for Bugs? To get Warner Bros. to approve this “wascally wabbit” as mascot at the farmers market here in Winfield, then in Illinois, then for farmers markets across America.

Winfield Farmers Market is located at the SW corner of Geneva and County Farm Roads in the Prairie Trail shopping plaza. There is always plenty of parking, and handy vendor directories listing every business vendor are displayed in the wide shopper’s aisle.

The pumpkin recycling program continues to grow each year as more residents participate. After the holidays, natural Christmas trees can be placed out for recycling during the designated period. These efforts may seem modest individually, but collectively they reduce landfill waste and offer simple, practical ways for residents to make environmentally responsible choices.

As SBC has expanded into additional communities, including significant new municipal partnerships, Shawn emphasized that customer service remains central to their approach. Waste management has been his career since he was 16 years old, starting on the back of a truck. It's not just an industry to him – it's a profession he takes pride in.

That pride shows in small but telling ways. Keeping familiar drivers on the same routes year after year helps build trust. Drivers get to know families. Kids look forward to seeing the truck each week. Some drivers even carry small safety vests or coloring books to hand out to young fans. It's not required – but it reflects a company culture that values relationships.

Looking ahead, residents will soon hear more about a new composting option being developed in coordination with the Village. The proposed program would allow residents to add a third cart specifically for food scraps and organic materials. Final details are still being prepared, and official information will be shared through village-approved communications in the coming weeks. For now, residents are encouraged to watch for those announcements rather than rely on partial information.

We also touched on bulk items, an area that can sometimes cause confusion. Stickers are still required for certain large items such as furniture. Stickers can be purchased at Village Hall, Jewel-Osco, Caputo's on North Avenue, and Winfield Tobacco & Liquor on Geneva Road. When in doubt, a quick call to SBC's office can prevent misunderstandings and ensure everything is handled smoothly.

Waste haulers don't often get headlines. Usu-

ally, they're noticed only when something goes wrong. But in Winfield, the more accurate story is about what happens when things go right – week after week, year after year.



It's about a company that answers the phone. A team that shows up consistently. A driver who knows your street. Programs that make responsible disposal easier. Services that support seniors. Partnerships that support community events. And a steady effort to balance growth with local accountability.

Winfield takes pride in being a connected, neighborly community. From our conversation with Shawn Flood, it's clear that SBC takes pride in being part of that story.

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Declaration 1776 Exhibit

The League created the eighth panel to introduce itself and note its sponsorship. The League of Women Voters of Wheaton includes Carol Stream, Warrenville, West Chicago, Wheaton and Winfield and is a nonpartisan political organization working to ensure everyone is represented in our democracy through advocacy and education.
