Apartment Community to Transform Winfield Fuel & Material Site

Saying goodbye can be difficult, but turning the page and seeing new opportunities can also be fulfilling. Winfield's downtown corridor, which used to be defined by the likes of the original Brach's service station, Ace Hardware, Winfield Flower Shop, John's Restaurant and Tavern and White Hen Pantry, has been undergoing transformational

change over the past few years. What was once "John's Buffet" is currently an open lot, waiting for a new mixed use building as part of the pending Town Center development. The Ace Hardware building was converted into an antique store more than a decade ago. The Winfield Flower Shop is now the Shamrock Garden Florist, and the landmark, two-story red building has been revitalized with a crisp grey and white paint job. And for many years, the 7-11 convenience store has occupied the space that was once the White Hen.

Another longtime, respected Winfield business, Winfield Fuel and Material, closed its doors in 2013. Tom Saylor, who owned Winfield Fuel, made the difficult decision to close his business and retire in the aftermath of the 2008-09 recession. "After the economy fell apart and most of our commercial customers and builders went out of business, we decided it was time to shut down the company." For several years the Winfield Fuel and Material building sat vacant, with a "For Sale" sign displayed at the property entrance, south of the railroad tracks on Winfield Road, waiting for a buyer.

In its heyday, spanning several decades, customers could go to Winfield Fuel to purchase top soil, mulch, firewood, gravel and other landscape and construction materials. The brown brick building and Americana-themed signage greeted visitors

to the business. Patriotic displays were frequently seen in the large, east facing windows of the building, including a black text window display that still reads: "May God Bless & Protect Our Troops & Their Leaders."

Opened in conjunction with the Higgins General Store by Barbara Higgins, the oldest deed associated with Winfield Fuel shows a coal shed from

1895. Part of the family took over the store and the coal business end of it was taken over by George Higgins, Tom Saylor's grandfather. Coal was sold to farmers for their threshing machines. Tom Saylor's mother, Laurene Higgins started doing bookwork and his uncle took over from George Higgins around the 1940s. Laurene Higgins married Tom Saylor, Sr., who began his involvement in the family company. Winfield Coal Company later started selling sewer pipe to contractors, and, gradually got involved in masonry and bricklayer supplies, as well as fuel

oil for residential/commercial needs. In 1956 the company's name was changed to Winfield Fuel and Material and during that period it employed upwards of 20 people, many of them volunteer firefighters.

Demolition of the Winfield Fuel site has been underway for several weeks, with construction vehicles positioned along the property and a temporary access road established along Beecher Avenue.

> Mounds of dirt and debris are accumulating on the land for what is said to be about a 14-month build. The Winfield Fuel building itself will be one of the last things to be razed, as it is functioning as a makeshift office for the demolition and construction crews. Once demolition and land prep are completed, Synergy Construction will be building a \$35 million luxury apartment community on the five-plus acres of land. More than 160 apartments will be built in the five-story complex, including 90 one-bedroom apartments and 58 two-bedroom apartments. The apartment community will include a high quality clubhouse, fitness center and swimming pool.

> As Tom Saylor reflects on his family's legacy and contribution to the Winfield community, he recalls the many customers with whom

he developed lasting friendships. "During those final days, as we were moving the last of our inventory, I had so many customers come in, sit down and talk to me. These customers, a lot of times, they would be the first ones to get emotional about what happened to our business as a result of the bad economy. It was quite an emotional and, maybe, rewarding time to hear people say those things about our family business."

One can only hope the upcoming apartment community on the Winfield Fuel site will make a similar, enduring impression on the village.

COVID-19 Pandemic's Impact on Winfield Finances

If government projections hold, the State of Illinois faces budget shortfalls in the billions of dollars in what remains of 2020, and well into 2021. Governor Pritzker announced the alarming shortages during an April Coronavirus response press briefing. Local governments are also anticipating declines in revenue, and Winfield is examining possible economic scenarios that may result from the state's shelter-in-place order.

The village government has developed a Budget Contingency Plan that examines different scenarios that account for "potential unknown impacts" due to the COVID-19 Pandemic. In the plan, which includes two different financial scenarios modeled, in part, on what happened during the Great Recession of 2008-09, impacts to Fiscal Year 2020-21 General Fund tax revenue changes are considered across three of the biggest revenue categories: real estate taxes (20%), income tax (20%), and sales tax (12%). According to the analysis provided in the April 15 version of this plan, "the Village could see an overall decline of 6% to 12% for the FY 2020-21 budget. The largest impact would be on tax revenues, which could decline as much as 13% from the original budget."

from the COVID-19 crisis, but, according to Village President Erik Spande, "The Village board has taken a proactive approach to COVID-19 budget impacts, and we will work with village staff to take necessary steps to ensure the continued fiscal health of the Village." This includes being prepared for different possible revenue outcomes. Real estate tax payments may be delayed as some households deal with their own economic challenges. Income tax revenue to the Village dropped 15% during the

Page County Stormwater Management Department, so projected sales tax revenue from this new business has been reduced to take the delay into account.

After running analyses that compare the original budget to the two pandemic-related scenarios, the Budget Contingency Plan outlines "Opportunities" and "Next Steps" as part of their "proactive... management of the crisis." This includes a set of "Immediate Response" measures, such as delaying \$690,000 in use of reserve funds for future road projects, and a "Temporary Suspension of Capital Expenditures" section of the Plan that notes that some capital projects can be delayed "until a time when the economic situation becomes less volatile." For general information about Winfield's CO-VID response, the Village's website contains a COVID-19 Update page, which was most recently updated on May 1. An Emergency Declaration that was approved by the Village Board on March 19, 2020 is available on the website. And there is information about social distancing guidelines, the steps being taken to safely reopen Winfield businesses and other practices related to the pandemic response. While restaurants in the village have been allowed to provide takeout and delivery services for some time, other Winfield businesses that were told to temporarily closed will be allowed to reopen on Friday, May 29, with certain restrictions.

Much remains unclear about the specific financial impacts to Winfield's General Fund resulting

Great Recession and one of the scenarios being examined takes a similar decline into account for the current recession, though their planning does consider that the two economic crises are not identical. Because sales tax revenues represent a smaller share of General Fund revenues, Winfield may not be as negatively impacted as other municipalities. Winfield Farmers Market Opens for 25th Season...With Changes

It's the beginning of the Farmers Market season, but in this COVID-19 world, things will be a little different, like they are with all businesses these days.

Shoppers who visit the Winfield Farmers Market for the first time will notice plenty of signage they've never seen before. These shopping "guidelines" are similar to what they now see every day at supermarkets, hardware stores, gas stations – any retail business that needs to serve its customers, but must adapt in certain ways to insure the health and safety of customers and employees alike.

The most visible "sign of the times" is a face mask, which every vendor must wear throughout the day, from 7am to 1pm. Customers will also be required to wear a face covering when entering the market area. Those not wearing one will be reminded by the market manager, or even other vendors, where they can immediately buy one at a crafts vendor on the premises who makes them. Hand sanitizers will also be available for use by anyone at various points within the market shopping area.

Market manager Rich Bysina wants to remind everyone, "The main thing going for us here in

We're All in this Together

This pandemic has changed all our lives. We live in a very different world now. Many things will be different forever, but we will adapt. I would like to give everyone a snapshot of status of the DuPage County Sheriff's Office during this pandemic.

First, we have a plan. The plan is what it is today, it might change tomorrow, and it will certainly be different next week. We are continually evolving our plan to match the patterns of a virus and infected people. We have a 500-person, indoor environment called the DuPage

County Correctional Facility. We have employed every possible measure to create scientific barriers to COVID-19. We have modified the entire ventilation system to remove all recycled air to remove any particulate matter from the air system. We have 16, negative pressure cells where we could contain virus positive inmates. We have a vacant 4th floor where any new person to our environment does a 15-day observation period prior to touching our general population. We are using an ammonia solution on our shoes prior to entry. We are using masks, temperatures for anyone coming in and we have a dedicated contagion cleaning crew working hard every day to cre-

ate a sterile environment. All these strategies together have kept this large indoor environment contagion free. We have a courthouse that will re-open soon and expect many challenges when that happens. Out on patrol, we

We are working extremely hard to keep everyone safe and working with our



social distancing. Sunday was one of the first truly warm and beautiful Spring days and people came out from their homes or drove to open spaces along the published route to see the passage of Father Matt and staff, dressed in their vestments carrying



Christ through the Eucharist, praying and allowing us to renew, restore, and rejuvenate our faith by encouraging our prayers and commitment to our Lord.

While for those of us who are Catholic, this was a very specific and unique experience and the message of faith carried through the streets refreshed us and brought back the community we have been so thirsting for with the prayers and renewed sense of spirituality in this time of challenge. These days, we're spending less elsewhere, and eating out more feels like a justifiable expense. I am grateful to be able to support our local business and


Winfield Library Offers Summer Fun


