Listen to live music all weekend long starting Thursday evening. Seven bands are scheduled to perform so grab your favorite lawn chair or take a seat under the tent in our chairs, and come on out!

We'll have some new activities and food choices this year. Our Kid's Zone will have more inflatables for the kids to play on, there will be face painting and a balloon artist on Saturday, and a stilt walker on Sunday. And new this year is interactive NASCAR style racing on Saturday, which you won't want to miss!

We're excited about our "Taste of Winfield" this year with some of our local restaurants participating:

- KOC concessions' pub burgers, cheeseburgers, hot dogs, fresh brats, Italian and Polish sausages, fried pork chops, pizza from Caliendo's, and pop & water.
- La India will be back this year with funnel cakes, deep fried Oreos, curly chips, fried mozzarella sticks, cheese curds, chicken tenders, corn dogs, and elotes.

- · Somsri Thai Cuisine will be serving up chicken satay, egg rolls, crab Rangoon, mango sticky rice, spring rolls, and papaya salad.
- Kool Kat will be providing cold sweet ice cream and custard.

Fire District Voters Approve Referendum

Residents of the Winfield Fire Protection District voted on Tuesday, June 28 to increase their taxes to provide additional needed resources for their first responders. Voters approved ambulance service

in 1985, but this is the first approval to increase the fire district's budget. Trustees' referenda requests have previously been rejected 13 times since 1993.

Eighty percent of the nearly 2,400 annual 9-1-1 calls are for medical assistance, so trustees sought a budget increase to ensure adequate medical re-

sponse capability as call volumes grow every year. New funds will be used for three things:

- Hire one additional ambulance crew (two new staff positions)
- Ambulance replacement
- Station renovations
- Chief Evans estimated the timeline for imple-

WIA – Winfield **Giants capture** Pony League Championship

The Winfield Giants were road warriors during this year's Pony League Play-offs. The play-offs began with a tight 9-8 victory over the Lombard Orioles and loss to the Lombard Red Sox. Working now with one loss, the Giants needed to sweep the rest of their games to stay alive. On June 17th the run began with a 15-8 win over the Wheatland Cubs. This game was the third in row the Giants played shorthanded (eight players instead of nine) due to injury. The Giants got their "big inning" in the top of the third scoring 5 runs on three hits and two walks. The "big inning" became a theme.

June 20th back in Lombard, and back with nine players, the Giants won 15-2 against the Lombard Giants with the big inning coming in the third where they scored 8 runs behind six hits and three walks. June 22nd back in Wheatland against the White Sox, the Giants won 10-8 with the big inning coming in the 6th where they scored 5 runs on five hits and one walk. June 23rd – Finally a home game, at Glasshagel Field, under the lights, the Wheaton Rays and Giants had a fantastic game. Well played with tons of action, the Giants jumped out to an early lead powered by their big inning in the 3rd where they scored 7 runs behind four hits and three walks. The Rays mounted a furious comeback in the top of the seventh tying the game at 12 -12 as the Giants held on. In dramatic fashion, Giants won the game in the bottom of the 7th after two outs and with a full count - Dylan Mason hit a walk off double giving the Giants a 13-12 victory. June 24th back in Lombard, the Giants won 9-8 against the Indians with the big inning again in the third where the Giants scored 4 runs behind four hits and three walks. Leading to the Championship Game on Saturday June 25th in Lombard against the Red Sox. The Giants were back to being shorthanded, playing with eight. After falling behind by three at the end of the first, starting pitcher Jeff Syme settled in and found his groove. After a scoreless second inning, the Giants bats came alive inspired by Manny Figueroa, unable to play, but in full uniform supporting his team. Three big innings followed. 



American Scenic Byways: A Day Trip Away

Text and Photos by Ellen Manyon In 1991, Congress created the National Scenic Byways Program to recognize American roads that are symbolic of history, culture, natural beauty, archeological richness and/or recreational adventures. We are fortunate to have six National Scenic Byways running through Illinois, and two are within a short driving distance from Winfield: the Illinois sections of Historic Route 66 and the Lincoln Highway.

Dedicated in 1913, the Lincoln Highway runs east-west from New York City to San Francisco. Commissioned in 1926, Route 66 runs from Chicago to Los Angeles. Both roads saw an increase in cross country travel from the 1930s through the 1950s. Beginning in 1956, the Interstate Highway System eventually became the road of choice for motorists, and Route 66 and the Lincoln Highway fell into disuse and disrepair.

Over time the historic value of these decommissioned roads increased and the Illinois sections of the Lincoln Highway and Historic Route 66 became part of the National Scenic Byways program. Even more exciting to motorheads, both roads intersect ONLY in Illinois: at Plainfield and at Joliet. So, let's begin our adventure by avoiding the toll roads, relaxing with some good music and hitting the road!

From Winfield, I took Roosevelt Road east to IL-53 south. It's a crowded 4-lane highway through Glen Ellyn, Lisle, Woodridge, Romeoville and Crest Hill. Heading further south, IL-53 becomes Historic Illinois Route 66 as it intersects with Joliet Road, near a sprawling logistics park. If you turn left here, you can have a delicious chicken dinner at White Fence Farm, just up the road on Historic Route 66.

I turned right, however, to follow Historic Route 66 to Joliet, along the Des Plaines River, past the Stateville Correctional Facility, Lewis University, nature preserves and heavy industry. Driving closer to Joliet the road became very rough and the houses appear scrappy and care-worn. Soon, though, on the right appears the delightful garage "Dicks on Route 66" with a fun display of vehicles on the roof and a section of the old brick paved Route 66 that you can stand on. Next stop is the Rich & Creamy ice cream shop, open only in the summer, with "Jake and Elwood Blues" performing on the rooftop.



of two important American Scenic Byways, Historic Illinois Route 66 and the Illinois Lincoln Highway at Joliet Road and Route 59.

I traveled north on Route 59 to Lockport Street, which led me to Plainfield's historic district with its distinctively paved cross walks, beautiful curbside landscaping and historic buildings with a fresh coat of paint.

For lunch and refreshments, I stopped at NWB or Next Whiskey Bar, a few blocks from the Masonic Block. The restaurant showcases a vast array of whiskey bottles from around the world. The labels, bottle decorations and stoppers are fascinating to behold!

Next stop would have been the Joliet Area Historical Society and Route 66 Welcome Center and then onto the Joliet intersection of Historic Route 66 and the Illinois Lincoln Highway at IL-53 and U.S. Route 30, but the bridges were up over the Des Plaines River. I proceeded south to U. S. Route 30, and drove to Plainfield on the Lincoln Highway.

Soon I arrived at my destination: the intersection

TIF #2 Lawsuit Recent Updates

In November of last year, the Village of Winfield's plan for a second TIF district came to a halt when School District 34 filed a lawsuit against the Village to block it. School District 34 filed the suit after walking away from negotiations with the Village over revenue sharing agreements with all the

taxing bodies. Since then, School District 94 has also joined the lawsuit.

Of the two issues raised in the D34 lawsuit, the Village has managed to dismiss the first one. The first argument was a procedural one in which D34 argued that under the state TIF Act, the Village could not remove properties from first TIF district and place them into the second TIF. The Village denied that their plan circumvented the existing TIF laws. On June 22, the court agreed that the Village had complied with the provisions of the TIF Act and dismissed that argument.

Unfortunately, that doesn't mean the lawsuit is over. The remaining issue in the D34 complaint, that the area within TIF #2 is not actually blighted and does not need a TIF to support new development, has not yet been addressed by the court. The Village answers that they have produced

evidence that the area is blighted, or run-down, and the lots do not support modern and effective land use.

D34 also argues that of the 51 parcels, CDH owns 31 of them, the Village owns 10, and the small, irregular lots could be easily consolidated. The District maintains that a developer is currently interested in Town Center because CDH is already developing other lots in Town Center that it already owns. The Village argues that the private ownership of the land outside the TIF district is not a factor in the blighted lots within the TIF.

The validity of these last two arguments is another decision left to the judge. If the Village is successful at getting the injunction dismissed, the process to create the second TIF district can be started again, but a lot of time has been lost. If D34 is successful, the Village will not be able to proceed with TIF #2. This will leave Northwestern Medicine as the only developer interested in working in downtown Winfield, with the added advantage of also being the primary landowner.

Get Excited to Try the **Exceptional** Flavors of La Birria Loca Restaurant

Your tastebuds are in for a treat when La Birria Loca opens in Winfield this September! This carry-out only restaurant is excited to offer birria, a traditional, yet obscure, Mexican dish served up in unique, modern ways. Owner, David (from Addison), said his grandma would make birria when he visited her, and it instantly became his favorite dish.

David has been working on this restaurant idea for a couple years with chef Abednego (from Durango, Mexico) and house manager Josef (from Melrose Park). Normally served on special occasions, birria didn't become as popular as menudo or pozole, despite the similar characteristics of using braised meat in broth. Traditionally made with goat meat, La Birria Loca will also offer a beef option for the less adventurous. The trio chose to purchase meat from a supplier that raises animals in a natural and relaxed environment, which ultimately enhances the flavor of the birria.

La Birria Loca, located at 27W570 High Lake Road (formerly Gnarly Knots), will also serve a homemade "elote" (Mexican corn) using an original family recipe, along with a variety of desserts from Sturino's Sweets in Roselle.

Restaurant hours will be 11am-6pm, Tuesday through Sunday, closed on Mondays. Cash and card accepted, however La Birria Loca will be a coinless operation, letting customers choose if they'd like to round up their order total to the nearest dollar with proceeds going to benefit local school districts' and independent music education programs.

From the drink menu, I selected the NWB Old Fashioned, and for lunch the chicken and waffles. The drink came with a huge ice cube and a long sliver of orange peel. It tasted light and a little bitter. It wasn't as smooth or as

tasty as the Old-Fashioned cocktail served at Winfield's own Berger Bros Pub.

The chicken and waffles arrived hot and steamy. The crunchy waffles tasted sweet, like a carnival funnel cake drizzled with a delicious maple cream sauce. The tender, boneless chicken cutlet with a waffle batter coating was crispy on the outside and juicy on the inside. A generous side of lightly salted French fries helped to offset the sweetness of the chicken and waffles.

Lastly, I strolled through the historic district, window shopping and admiring the variety of architectural styles. Then I jumped in the car, headed north

on Route 59 back home to Winfield. All in all, this 60mile round trip took only four hours including stops.
