Fire Station Construction Begins: Completion Planned for Jan.

Months of planning led to a very special day on May 6 as a groundbreaking ceremony was held on the future site of the Winfield Fire Protection District Station 31 at the intersection of County Farm and Churchill roads.

Attending the event were the Board of Trustees, firefighter-paramedics and their families, administrative staff, and representatives from the architect firm Healy, Bender, Patton, & Been of Naperville, and the general contractor E.P. Doyle & Son of Wheaton.

Voters approved a referendum in 2022 and work began immediately to implement that plan. Two new ambulances have been ordered, a new fire engine was delivered, a new station is being constructed to hold it all, and the continued on page 9

Founders Park Re-Opening Ribbon Cutting

Founders Park playground was originally constructed in 1990 and has been in desperate need of updating for quite some time. We are pleased to announce that Founders Park is now a fully completed project. Starting with the final expansion/remodeling project of the Charles R. Beggs Activity Center that was completed in October of 2022, Founders Park was completely redeveloped and designed with a new playground, pickleball courts, Gaga ball, outdoor fitness area, team obstacles equipment, walking path, and shelter area. This project was done with the help of the state of Illinois OSLAD grant which was awarded to the Winfield Park District for \$600,000 with a project cost of approximately \$1.3 million.

Rose Steps Down as Winfield Historical Society President; Winfield Historical Society Plans New Book on Winfield History

This past May during the Annual Meeting of the Winfield Historical Society (WHS) long-time Winfield resident Adrienne Rose stepped down as the President of the WHS, a position she had held for over 43 years.

During a recent interview Rose looked back at her life story and involvement with the founding of the WHS, life in Winfield, raising four daughters and her music interest. She also spoke about a new Winfield history book project.

Rose moved into the Village in 1966 with her husband (the late) William "Bill" Rose. Both were active as volunteers in Winfield religious, governmental and in civic causes. Adrienne grew up in Chicago. She had met Bill while she was working for the University of Chicago when Bill was a senior at the U. of C.

Adrienne held the role of President and Vice President of the St John Catholic Church's Council of Catholic Women (CCW) as well as Women of the Year. Rose also had a strong professional interest in music and musical

performance. In 1971, she began her music career when St John's then Pastor Monsignor Reverend Vincent J. Cloos approached her to assist the local Methodist Church, who needed an organist for their morning services. This position she held for ten years. In the meantime, Rose also was organist at St. Johns Sunday 12:30 p.m. mass. She eventually became the Music Director for St Johns – a position she held from 1982 to mid-2023.

She earned a Bachelor's of Music – Piano from the Chicago Conservatory of Music College. Not one to stand idle and a desire to pursue her dreams and ambitions, she eventually studied and worked hard toward earning a Master's in Music – Theory from the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago while raising four daughters with Bill. Adriene has been teaching piano in Winfield since 1976 and continues today.

Rose is very persistent. She is a leader with a quiet but self-assured dignity surrounding her. She has been a steady and dedicated leader at the helm and committed to preserving Winfield History and serving her community. Her interest in history eventually led her and several other people to form the WHS.

Adrienne is one of the original and founding members (1978) of the WHS. The Society was established with one purpose in mind – to save the oldest (circa 1849) railroad station in the State of Illinois. Today it is known as the Winfield Park District Hedges Station (Besch Home) Museum.

Rose states, "We were a concerned group of local housewives back then." The "Village fathers" at first did not take their cause seriously. Adrienne and the ladies of the Society were able to muscle their way into local Winfield politics. They eventually purchased what was then known as the "Besch Home" and have it moved to its current location near Oakwood Park. This all occurred in spite of a failed Village Referendum in 1981, that put a question to the voters on whether the Besch home should be demolished or saved.

Adrienne and WHS were a determined group of village residents who persisted. President Ginny Faesen, Rose and Past President Martha Ingram, were able to negotiate a time schedule with the Village to purchase the Besch Home/Hedges Station for the cost of \$25.00 on the condition that the Society raise dollars by a certain deadline and have the structure moved from the corner of Church and

Once the funds were raised, a negotiation then took place between the WHS and the newly formed Winfield Park District to have the structure moved

of the interview. This is what has driven Adrienne for the past 43 years in her leadership role for the WHS - to preserve Winfield's past.

Adrienne continues to serve on the WHS Board in her new role as Past President. Within the past year she and the Board of the WHS have formed an Ad-Hoc Committee with the Winfield Library to work on the re-publication of a revised version of Louise Spanke's 1977 book Winfield's Good Old Days: A History of Winfield Illinois.

Adrienne is spearheading this book project because she wants a new generation of Winfield residents to be familiar with the Village's rich and progressive history and the physical changes that have occurred over the past 40 years since the publication of the first history. The Society's goal is to have the book published and available in time for September 2026 Winfield Good Old Day celebration and the United States 250th Semi-sesquicentennial celebration of our nation's independence.

additional staff will be added after the building is opened.

Trustees explored many options for renovating the current downtown station, but given the costs to expand, modernize, and repair the 50-year-old building, compounded by the challenges of additional vehicle and train traffic downtown, a contract was awarded to Healy, Bender, Patton, and Been Architects from Naperville to design a new station on land which had been purchased more than 10 years ago when the Silverwood Glen subdivision was platted.

"Locating the new station on County Farm Road will help us improve response times to all areas of our district," said Fire Chief Steve Evans. "Moving it closer to the Northeast residents of our district. plus locating it to quickly access the County Farm Road underpass, will help us improve our respose times to every part of the District. Our staff will have a healthier environment to work and recover in, and we will have the space to add an additional medic company to meet the needs of our residents."

New Station Features

A lot has changed since the current fire station was built in 1974. For starters, Winfield now has full-time firefighter-paramedics. Because this building will be designed to have crew who live there, considerations for response time, air quality, and staff physical and mental health have been at the forefront of design decisions.

- Response time improvement: Wide doorways and hallways have been planned for crew to quickly get to their vehicles from anywhere in the building. There will be no stairs.
- Environmental improvement: Air quality will be significantly improved. Exposure to carcinogens are very common for first responders, and proper design reduces workplace contamination. Airflow is designed to prevent contaminated tools and air from entering the working and living spaces.
- Mental and physical health & recovery: First responders have a very physically and mentally challenging job. The new station design provides crew members with several different spaces to workout, rest, and recover.
- Meeting and study space has been designed to allow staff to more easily satisfy the 155 hours of training that's required each year.
- Landscaping plans were developed in partnership with the Silverwood Glen homeowner's association, and other local neighbors, to reduce the impact on the surrounding residential areas.

The new station is planned to be operational in the beginning of 2025. Trustees have not yet determined how the downtown fire station property will be

About the Winfield Fire Protection District

Winfield Fire Protection District serves more than 30,000 residents in a 13+ square mile area. The population has grown since the District's founding in the 1940s when the area was mostly rural farmland, and so has the demand for services. Responding to over 2300 calls per year with just one ambulance crew means residents who dial 911 regularly have to wait for an ambulance from a neighboring town (when they happen to have one available), due to the very busy workload on our primary ambulance crew.

It is that time of year when we all spend time outside, the storms blow in quickly leaving, and the fraudsters come out to search for easy targets. Beware – danger lurks in so many places these days just waiting for any one of us to make a simple mistake. There are articles written about cybercrime, senior crime, neighborhood vandalism – yet in our serene Village of Winfield, it is easy to have a false sense of security and think we are insulated from this type of activity. Every one of us can be a target and an easy victim – so here is just a gentle reminder of how to stay aware and protect your home and yourself during these summer months.

Storm Chasers - you know the path beaten to your door after every windstorm, rainstorm, hailstorm? They will claim they can see the damage even if you cannot and assure you they can make your insurance company pay - what they don't tell you is that they company they have may be imaginary or may have a record of shoddy work or failure to complete the project or charging you triple what it actually costs - if you believe you have damage, call your own insurance company for an adjuster to come out and then contract with a trusted contractor - do your homework to make sure they are licensed and insured and check the Better Business Bureau to see if there have been complaints – look for personal recommendations from neighbors/friends/family who have had similar work done – the storm chasers can be persistent – but learn to say no and turn them away firmly. Toss the flyers away that promise miracles but have no address or local phone number.

Bug Guys – I have about four of these visits a week – they are always doing "work down the street" at a neighbors' home so willing to offer a great deal because they are in the neighborhood. They see imaginary bugs, rodents, and other vermin everywhere – and try and convince me that my home is crawling with them and will soon be a pile of sawdust left from the wood-eating critters. Who among us doesn't feel their skin crawl when someone tells us our homes are infested with bugs? Summer is a time of bugs – and spotting an occasional one is not cause for hiring a company to spray poison around your home for eternity to protect you. Unless you are truly aware of a problem – shoo-shoo them back to the imaginary neighbors' home.

Tree Guys/Driveway Guys, etc. Same advice – they may be legitimately looking for work but just because they are doing work in the neighborhood does not make them the contractor you want to

hire – do your due diligence, get a quote, check background, insurance, references – BEFORE you hire them.

Utility/Public Works Service Employees – there are some creative predators who don official looking uniforms and knock on doors asking for entry to your home for various official reasons – do NOT give access to anyone unless you are certain they are there for a legitimate reason. Unless you have been notified of a need for a service directly by the company, ask for identification and then call

the company directly to make certain of the legitimacy of their visit.

Random Solicitors selling anything and everything – It is true that many kids get jobs selling products, organizations raise funds for legitimate activities, and all other reasons for people to be knocking on your door – but

be wary and trust your instincts. There are regulations for soliciting, these innocent looking people may not be so innocent, and if you have a sign that indicates you do not want solicitations – point to it and close the door. Do not be "guilted" or bullied into buying things or let them in your home – or make access

easy. Politely say you are not interested and then close and lock your door. If they persist, notify the police.

Be aware of strangers in the neighborhood or unusual/suspicious activity. Many of us live in very stable and well-established neighborhoods where we are at least familiar with our neighbors if not outright friendly – keep an eye out for each other. If you know someone is on vacation and see strange cars in their drive, let the police know. If there is unusual activity anywhere that you notice, it is better to be safe than sorry – make a call to the police to see what is going on – (that does not mean reporting your next door neighbor's party just because you don't like the way their friends look – or you weren't invited) – but be aware – especially if you have elderly neighbors or know someone

On April 10th, recent member of the Winfield community Brian Winkelman suffered a near-fatal accident while cutting down a tree branch and fractured his neck. Winkelman has been hospitalized since the accident, undergoing a lengthy surgery at Loyola Medical Center. Now at a long-term care facility, he receives therapy to be weaned from his ventilator. Once he re-learns to breathe on his own, he will relocate to a specialized spinal cord injury (SCI) rehabilitation facility to focus on recovery from his current paralysis. Doctors say he will be in the SCI rehab facility for an extended period.

Brian and his wife, Annette, lived in the Shelburne Crossing community in Winfield for 12 years and were active in local initiatives. As dedicated members of the Winfield Riverwalk Committee they organized numerous social fundraising events for the cause. Additionally, they regularly enthusiastically volunteered for the Winfield Criterium, always ready to lend a hand and help their community.

Brian runs a landscaping business that specializes in permaculture, and Annette, who is a health coach and chef, is running the businesses while she and his family take shifts so that someone is always by her husband's side. With the drastic reduction in incomes and mounting medical bills, assistance is urgently needed.
