Winfield Family Holiday Traditions & the German Connection

As families in the Village of Winfield prepare for another holiday season it is a good time to reflect on our holiday celebration traditions.

In researching my German family roots and their connection to Winfield, I have discovered that several holiday traditions that many Americans celebrate originated with German traditions. In this article we will explore some of the German holiday traditions.

I have been researching my Daleiden, Schlick and Davis family roots in the Winfield area for over 40 years. I have compiled my research on a blog at schlickdaleidenfamily.com.

Winfield Illinois was established by several German immigrant families in the mid-nineteenth century. The German stock were primarily Catholic in term of their religious beliefs.

My Great Great Grandfather Christopher Daleiden and his immediate family were early Winfield settlers. Christopher immigrated from the Trier Bitburg area of Germany in 1856. He and his family settled on a dairy farm on Mack Road west of Winfield Road. Christopher and his older brother Michael would be part of a group of men that organized

and established the St. John the Baptist Roman



Catholic Parish that is still in existence in Winfield. Christopher and his wife Margaret would later retire and lived in their home once located just north of St John's Church.

> Here are some German Christmas traditions that many German Immigrants celebrated in in Winfield:

> Christmas Trees. Who can forget the religious hymn "O Tannenbaum" or "O Christmas Tree." Based on a traditional folk song which was unrelated to Christmas, it became associated with the traditional Christmas tree by the middle of the 19th century and sung as a Christmas carol. The tradition of decorating a fir, spruce, or pine tree and setting it up with candles (and now electric lights) and handmade decorations is a 400-year-old German tradition that is now a season staple in homes. While I do not have the photos to prove it. I can in my mind visualize a Christmas tree in the front parlor of the Schlick/Daleiden farmstead on Mack Road. The Christmas tree was a symbol of the coming continued on page 2

of Jesus and a focal point of German Christmas festivities.

Abvent Calendars: These calendars count down the four weeks leading up to Christmas Eve and are one of my favorite memories. Each day a new door is opened on the calendar to reveal a piece of chocolate. The opening of each door on the calendar instructed children about the anticipation of the birth of Jesus on Christmas Eve.

Abvent Wreaths: Many German families put an advent wreath on their dining room tables the fourth Sunday prior to Christmas. Each Sunday a candle was lit, and a Bible passage read to remind one of

the coming of the baby Jesus. This tradition is still conducted at our St. Johns Church in Winfield.

St. Hicholas Day. In Germany on the evening of December 5th, children would place their shoes outside their door in hopes that St. Nicholas would leave them presents. Parents had no problem getting their kids up on December 6th as they eagerly awoke to find their shoes filled with treats and small presents. St. Nicholas later became more secularized and popularly known as Kris Kringle or Santa Claus. I remember as a young child attending St. Johns Church seeing St. Nicholas following Sunday mass.

Christmas Soobs — Frank and Mae Schlick, my grandparents, on Christmas day would cook duck and serve red cabbage, apples and sausages. I am certain the tradition of this German meal and menu of food served by Frank's Grandparents was inherited and passed on from Casper and Susan (Daleiden) Schlick. I remember someone once say it "It is eating and sharing food, we remember and celebrate our past." Stollen bread was another family tradition. The stollen bread is shaped with tapered ends and a ridge down the center symbolizing the Baby Jesus in swaddling clothes. Stollen bread was a dessert item served on their family table. My favorite memory is making Christmas cookies with my brother and sisters and my mother.

Some of the above traditions continue and some change or go away entirely as our family and our community changes. New traditions are introduced as new family members become part of our family and community. One idea remains and that is the idea of taking time out to reflect and hope for a

happy new year & peace on earth.





President of Northwestern Medicine Central DuPage Hospital Highlights New Initiatives

In April 2022, Ken Hedley was named president of Northwestern Medicine Central DuPage Hospital. While he may be new to this role, the hospital is not new to him. Hedley, his wife and three daughters







live in the western suburbs and Central DuPage Hospital has been his family's hospital for more than 20 years.

Hedley has worked for Northwestern Medicine for 20 years, the last seven years within senior leadership. Most recently he served as vice president of operations at Northwestern Memorial Hospital.

"My family has received excellent care at Northwestern Medicine Central DuPage Hospital from wonderful physicians and staff. I'm honored now to be part of that leadership team," said Hedley. "It is exciting to bring the knowledge and skills I have honed leading teams at Northwestern Memorial Hospital to further enhance Central DuPage Hospital's positive impact on the community."

Elevating and expanding clinically integrated programs is a top priority for Northwestern Medicine. Hedley is working with physician and operational leaders to advance the programs and infrastructure that will result in standardization, coordination and collaboration across the health system.

An innovative new program is the extension of liver transplant care to Central DuPage Hospital. Patients who are waiting to undergo liver transplants at Northwestern Medicine Hospital require frequent physician visits and sometimes hospital-

ization due to the seriousness of their disease. In addition to expanded testing and screening capabilities, Central DuPage Hospital has a new inpatient unit dedicated to patients with liver disease and an outpatient clinic for physician appointments.

"Central DuPage Hospital has always been recognized for providing high-quality care, and we've seen an increased demand for a higher level of inpatient liver disease treatment," Hedley said. "Now, patients will be able to access all the care they need without traveling into the city for anything other than the actual surgery."

In the past, hepatologists have been disappointed to hear patients have declined further treatment because they lack access to transportation or because they do not want to travel into the city for care.

"Our goal at Northwestern Medicine Transplant is to be patient-centric with every decision we make," said Satish Nadig, MD, PhD, chief of the division of abdominal organ transplantation and the director of the Northwestern Medicine Comprehensive Transplant Center. "To that end, expansion of our liver program to Northwestern Medicine Central DuPage Hospital allows us to provide our world-class transplant care closer to where our patients live and work."

In the 2022-2023 U.S. News & World Report "America's Best Hospitals" guide Central DuPage Hospital is ranked No. 12 in Illinois. The hospital has received numerous other honors, including being one of only 22 hospitals across the U.S. to achieve 21 consecutive "A" grades for safety by Leapfrog Group.

"Ultimately, it is really the people that make this job so rewarding. Everyone you encounter at Central DuPage Hospital strives to provide the highest quality of care," said Hedley.


Winfield Park District – Lion's Park Update

a large boulder and a new companion boulder too.









Discovering the Personal Side of Abraham Lincoln

What is behind the iconic images of Abraham Lincoln on pennies, five-dollar bills, and license plates? Here in Illinois, the Land of Lincoln, we can find the personal side of Abraham Lincoln at our state capital of Springfield, just three hours south of Winfield.

Springfield is the location of Abraham Lincoln's only home he ever owned. He purchased the house at 413 South Eighth Street in 1844. The Lincoln family lived there until 1861, when they departed for Washington, D.C.

Today the National Parks Service operates the Lincoln home and surrounding neighborhood, which accurately reflects the era of 1850s architecture. While on tour, my NPS guide shared a little-known personal fact about Abraham Lincoln.

When Lincoln was in his twenties and living in

sound effects and life-size figures of Lincoln, his family and political colleagues.

In a quieter area of the ALPM, there is a Treasures Galley filled with extremely rare Lincoln artifacts. One display took my breath away. It was a spare pair leather gloves that Lincoln had in his dress coat pocket on that fateful night of April 14,

1865, when he was assassinated at the Ford Theater in Washington, D.C.

The long-fingered, custom-made gloves are stained with Lincoln's blood near the fingertips. Mary Lincoln kept the gloves as a remembrance of her beloved husband. Eventually the gloves became part of a private collection, and now, they are on temporary exhibit in this special exhibit area.


Next stop in Springfield is the Oak Ridge cemetery at 1442 Monument Avenue. This is the location of the Lincoln family tomb, which has become a National Shrine. Staff from Illinois' Department of Natural Resources conduct tours of the Lincoln tomb year-round.

Seasonally, DNR staff offer a "Friends of Lincoln" tour through the historic parts of Oak Ridge cemetery. This vigorous hike gravestones of Abraham

brings visitors to the gravestones of Abraham Lincoln's in-laws, colleagues, friends, and neighbors. Through extensive historical research, my DNR guide talked about the connections Lincoln had with others buried in Oak Ridge.

At one gravestone depicting a tall tree stump with broken branches, an 1880s symbol of lost loved ones, my guide told the story of the Florville family's connection to Abraham Lincoln. This grave site represents Phoebe Florville and her descendants. She married a Haitian-born Black man named William de Fleurville, who spelled his last name as Florville.

William Florville came to Springfield, Illinois in 1831. He opened a barbershop on Adams Street between Fifth and Sixth Streets. Florville had an enthusiastic sense of humor, and this attracted Abraham Lincoln, who enjoyed swapping jokes and telling tall tales with Florville.

New Salem, he became a renowned wrestler. Due to his tall stature and farm-honed physical strength, Lincoln could easily flip his opponent onto their back. He lost only one match in 12 years of wrestling in New Salem. In 1992, the National Wrestling Hall of Fame honored Abraham Lincoln as an "outstanding American" wrestler!

At the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Museum, 212 N. 6th Street in Springfield, the life of Lincoln comes alive through holographic imagery, booming Lincoln and Florville were friends for over 24 years. Florville cut Lincoln's hair and Lincoln gave Florville legal advice regarding real estate purchases. Over time, Florville acquired properties on Wash-

Over time, Florville acquired properties on Washington Street between Eight and Ninth Streets in Springfield. In 1865 when Lincoln's coffin returned to Springfield, Florville served as an honorary pallbearer at his friend's funeral. Florville died in 1868 and is buried at the Catholic Calvary Cemetery. His wife Phoebe is buried in Oak Ridge Cemetery, not too far from the Lincoln Tomb.

Lastly, in 1863, Abraham Lincoln declared that the last Thursday of November as a day of National Thanksgiving. So, think of Lincoln as you wrestle those turkey legs from the bird and enjoy Thanksgiving 2022!
