The iconic flag raising is immortalized at the Marine Corps Memorial outside of Arlington cemetery and also at Marine Recruit Depot Paris Island and outside the Marine Military Academy in Harlingen, TX. It has been said that the Japanese lost all but 200 of the 21,000 they had on the island and the Marines had lost 7,000. Winning this battle and taking the island made a significant difference in changing the tide of the war by giving the US a strategic flight line in the South Pacific. Admiral Nimitz the commander of the Naval Fleet in the South Pacific said this of the Marines on Iwo Jima. "Uncommon Valor was a common virtue".

As every year passes we lose more of the brave souls that survived World War II. Let's us always remember the sacrifices made at home and abroad by our greatest generation.

SAFETY OFFICER - Overmedicated Potential signs

- Taking too many medications can become a common issue as we get older.
- Taking many medication can be a problem if any of the medications are doing more harm than good. If you think you are taking too many medications, talk to your doctor or healthcare provider. They may decide to have you stop any unnecessary medications called (deprescribing).
- Recognize the Warning Signs: Knowing symptoms to watch for can help you determine if your loved one may be overmedicated. Potential signs include: drowsiness; physical complications, like dry mouth and ulcers; confusion; withdrawal from family or friends; hallucinations; dizziness or falls; fractures; and seizures.
- Overmedication is an overutilization of medication wherein a patient takes voluntarily, or is prescribed, unnecessary or excessive medications. While not strictly a medical condition, common symptoms may include: slurred speech, drowsiness, confusion, and poor motor skills.
