Is Jesus asking too much?

1 de Julio: Domingo 13 del Tiempo Ordinario 1 Kings. 19:16, 19-21; Gal. 5:1, 13-18; Luke 9:51-62

Talk about the story. Talk with he children about the excuses we often give not to do what we are asked. What are those excuses about? (Do they mean we are not as interested in what we are being asked to do, or that deep down we do not want to do it?)


Speak about today's story. Some people told Jesus they wanted to follow him, but after doing other things. Others would follow him for a whole, but at the first difficulty, they would abandon him. What does Jesus tell them today? DO they abandon something when they are not going well, or when they get tired? Do they sometimes leave for later what adults ask them to do?

Activities and prayer. Bring to class pictures or photos of children doing house chores or homework. Ask the children to choose what they like and do not like to do. Ask them to explain why and ask them the excuses they give not to do things immediately. Ask them to draw themselves doing Jesus asked you to? something they have been asked, and to write their commitment on the back. As they present their papers, all say: Jesus, your friend, invites you: "I want to follow you, Jesus".

You are there.

Do you want, like Jesus' friends, to get even with the Samaritans who did not want to receive Jesus? Do you think following Jesus is too difficult?

 \mathbf{Q} : Sometimes it is very difficult to follow Jesus. If we want to follow him, we must be willing to give up everything we have, to do what he asks of us. What would you be willing to give up if

- Jesus did not want revenge. Do you sometimes feel like getting
- Jesus says we have to keep up our resolution to do the right things. Do you often start things and then five up?

What am I going to do?

Speak to Jesus and tell him some time when you felt like taking revenge. Ask him for strength to forget the hurt. Tell him you want to be his friend always. Tell him what you want to do:

- For example: <u>I will not leave things unfinished.</u>
- For example: If someone has hurt me, I will try to forgive, and <u>not seek.</u>

Jesus wants even more friends

8 July: 14 Sunday in Ordinary Time Is. 66:10-14; Gal. 6:14-18; Luke 10:1-12, 17-20

Talk about the story. Speak with children about the places they visit. How are they normally received? If there are children in the house they visit, do they try to play with them in peace, or do they quarrel?

Speak about the story. What do they think about that recommendation not to bring luggage or sandals? Is not that a little crazy? Why would Jesus want them to do that? How can one bring peace to others?

If they felt God was calling them to do the work of Jesus — being priests or religious, or dedicating themselves to that work, what would they say or do? What do they think their parents would say about it?

Activities and prayer. Ask the children to pair up and ask each pair to decide in which way they would bring Jesus message to others: by teaching, taking care of the sick, caring for the poor, visiting people in prison, defending the rights of workers and immigrants, struggling against violence and war ... As each pair say what they want to do, all answer: Jesus, we want to bring your peace to all.

You are there. Do you think it is crazy to go and preach with out any luggage or money? What would you tell Jesus when he tries to send you? What would your parents tell you if told them you are going to dedicate yourself to the work of Jesus for the rest of your life?



Q: Jesus sends his friends off on a journey but tells them to take nothing. They must depend on the goodness of others. What would you do if Jesus told you to go off with nothing? Would you be scared?

Jesus, your friend, invites you:

- Jesus wants many of this friends to follow him. What are you going to tell him?
- Jesus says that wherever they go, his friends must bring peace. How can you bring peace to others? Jesus gave everything for us. What can you give?

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What am I going to do?

Speak to Jesus and tell him about some time when you were not at peace with somebody. Ask him for help to be patient with that person you do not like that much and to bring peace wherever you go. Tell him what you want to do:

- For example: <u>I will count to 20 before answering someone impatiently. Then, Ill try t respond nicely.</u>
- For example: <u>I will play gently and I will not quarrel with my</u> brothers and sisters.

Who is a neighbor?

July: 15 Sunday in Ordinary Time Deum. 30:10-14; Col. 1:15-20; Luke 10:25-37

Talk about the story. Speak with the children about people they like and dislike. Why do they sometimes exclude other children from groups in school or in the neighborhood? Would they help one of those excluded children if they were in need? What do they do when they are too busy or entertained with something and someone asks for help?

Speak about the story. What do they think about the characters who did not stop? What do they think about the Samaritan? Was he crazy to stop to help a stranger? What does neighbor mean? Are neighbor only those who are close by, or can we become neighbors to others by getting close to them?

Activities and prayer. Dramatize the story. Then, make another dramatization reflecting a present day situation where a child who is not a friend needs help. Who will help him?

You are there. Taking care of a wounded man by the wayside could be very dangerous. Besides, you are in a hurry. What do you do?



Q: The Good Samaritan helps a man who is beaten up and left on the side of the road, while others pass hurriedly by. Have you ever ignored someone in need because you were too busy? How did that make you feel?

Jesus, your friend, invites you:

- Jesus days that the most important thing is to love and to help others, even if it is difficult. What is most important for you?
- Jesus says that the neighbor is the one who is near. But also, the neighbor is the one who feels compassion for others, even if they are strangers. Who is your neighbor? Whose neighbor are you?

What am I going to do?

Speak to Jesus and tell him about a time when you helped someone. Was is easy or difficult? How did you feel afterwards? Tell him what you want to do:

- © For example: <u>I will help at home even if I have to leave a game or something I like.</u>
- For example: <u>I will help my younger brother or sister</u>, or some <u>classmate</u>.

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Martha and Mary have an argument

22 July: 16 Sunday in Ordinary Time Gen. 19:1-10; Col. 1:24-28; Luke 10:38-42

Talk about the story. Speak about visitors. Do they like to receive them? What do they do to help their parents with the preparations? Do they see that the adults are always too busy and they do not have time to listen to them or to be with them? Who do they feel about this? Are they themselves sometimes too busy and without any time to pray or to pay attention to someone who needs them? Do they sometimes fight because they feel they work more than their brothers and sisters? Speak also about the first reading and how Abraham saw God in the three visitors. He took care of them and received a reward from God, the promise of a son. How do we attend to those who come to visit? Do we see God in them?

Activities and prayer. Imagine we are preparing for Jesus who come as a guest. Make a list of things needed. What would Jesus like to be offered (taking care of someone, listening carefully, paying a visit to a sick person, helping, praying). As they present each of the things, all say: "I want to listen to you, Jesus".

You are there. Are you Martha or Mary? If you are Martha, why are you bothered about your sister's attitude? Does something similar happen in your home, too? If you are Mary, do you think Martha is too nervous, and she should learn to take it easy?



Q: Martha is mad at her sister, Mary, because she is listening to Jesus and not helping with dinner and the housework. But Jesus tells Martha that it is more important to spend time with him. Are you too busy, or worrying about unnecessary things, to spend time talking with Jesus?

Jesus, your friend, invites you:

- Jesus your friend Jesus says it is very import to listen to him to do what pleases him. Do you listen to Jesus every day?
- ☐ Jesus says it is important to receive and welcome visitors as if they were Jesus himself. How do you treat people who come to visit your family?

What am I going to do?

Speak to Jesus and tell him you want to listen to him always and to do things as he likes them. Tell him what you want to do:

- © For example: <u>Every morning I will pray to know how to behave all day.</u>
- For example: welcome people who come to visit us kindly, and I will be attentive to them.

Jesus teaches us to pray

29 July: 17 Sunday in Ordinary Time Gen. 18:20-32; Col. 2:12-14; Luke 11:1-13

Talk about the story. Speak about moments when they ask their parents for something. Do they always give them what they ask for and immediately? What happens if they do not? Do they throw a tantrum? What are they wishing for right now?

Do they think their prayers are not being listened to? Do they ask confidently, knowing that God is near and wants the best for them? Speak about the first reading and how Abraham begs God not to destroy the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah just is case there are some good people in them.

Activities and prayer. Ask the children to draw doors and write on them what they are asking God for. Then, draw and cut out loaves of bread where they can write the good things God has given them this week. All say: I know you always listen to me, Jesus.

Ask the children to write on a piece of paper something they have been forgiven for, and on the other side, something they forgive someone for.

You are there. Do you think the comparisons are funny? Why? Do you want to tell Jesus that sometimes you ask for things and you think they are not given to you? Do you sometimes knock and ask, but it is not opened or given to you?



Q: A man keeps knocking at his neighbor's door until he finally gives him the bread he wants. Do you ever ask God things? Does it seem like he is nor answering you? Do you keep asking?

Jesus, your friend, invites you:

- ☐ Jesus says he always listens to our prayers and gives us what we need. What do you ask God?
- Jesus says we must be constant, and pray without tiring. DO you sometimes get tired if you think you are not being listened to?

- For example: <u>I will forgive someone with whom I am angry,</u> <u>knowing that God also forgives me.</u>










You can not take it with you

August 5: 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time Eccle. 1:2; 2:21-23; Col. 3:1-5, 9-11; Luke 12:13-21

Talk about the story and the questions from "You are there". Talk about belongings they do not want to lose. What objects or people are most important to them? Is it important to them to be very rich? Do they admire wealthy people? Is there something wrong with having a room full of toys?

Activities. Ask the children to create their own story of the man of the gospel. Where does he live? Does he live with anyone? Does he have friends? Is he worried about being robbed?

Final Prayer. Give the children pieces of paper to write down something they are willing to share with others. As they place their pieces of paper in the basket to be used for the Offertory, all respond: "We can to think of you, Jesus"

You are there.

What do you think about the man? Why does God call him silly?

Do you know anybody who keeps things just for themselves, someone who hoards his or her belongings?

What was the man in the story missing in his life?



Q: A rich man hoarded all his wealth and didn't share it with anyone else. Do you always share what you have with others? How does it make you feel you share what you have?

Jesus, your friend, invites you:

Perhaps Jesus is not saying that money is bad, but that it must be placed at the service of others. What do you have that you can place at the service of others?

What am I going to do?

Speak to Jesus and tell him about what you wish for in this life. Tell him what you would like to be when you grow up. Ask to teach you to share and tell him what you want to do this week:

- © For example: <u>I will invite someone to play a game that does</u> not require us to spend any money
- © For example: <u>I will give something I have to a less fortunate child.</u>

This boss is out: What do you do now?

August 12: 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time Sab. 18:6-9; Heb. 11:1-2, 8-19; Lucas 12:32-48

Talk about the story and the questions from "You are there". What are their treasures? Talk about the times when they are left unsupervised by adults. What do they do? When they have behaved poorly, were they more upset about their behavior or about the fact that they were caught? Do they feel adults trust them? How do they feel about that trust?

Activities and Final prayer. Take some trinkets to class (colored beads, coins, fake jewelry, and so on) and place them in a box. Ask the children to choose one object that symbolizes what is very important to them. They should then put it back in the box and explain to the class why it is important to them. When each child expresses his or her commitment for this week, all respond: "Jesus, you are my treasure." The children should present the box of trinkets at the Offertory pf the Mass.

You are there.

What do you think Jesus meant by treasuring things that cannot be destroyed or stolen? What kinds of treasures are those? What do you do when adults are not around to watch you? What is your treasure?



Q: Jesus tells us that a good worker still works, even when no one is watching; however, a bad worker goofs off when the boss is gone. What kind of worker are you? Do you ever goofs off when no one is looking?

Jesus, your friend, invites you:

Jesus trust you an gives you a mission to be good and behave well even if no one else sees you. What can make you forget this at times?

What am I going to do?

Speak to Jesus and tell him for being such a good friend and trusting you so much. Thank him for your treasures. Tell him what you want to do this week:

- © For example: <u>I will do my homework</u>, even if there is no one at home to remind or watch me.
- © For example: <u>I will give up TV to do chores around the house</u> (such as taking the garbage out, doing the dishes, and so on.

A prophet is thrown into a well

August 19: 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time Jer 38:4-6, 8-10; Heb. 12:1-4; Luke 12:49-53

Talk about the story. Talk about the people in their communities who fight for justice (for example, those who protest unfair immigration laws or bad conditions in the schools). Talk about the martyrs, who suffered for their faith. Talk about Father Miguel Pro, Oscar Romero, or the activist Arnold Mireles of Chicago, who was assassinated because he fought for decent housing for his community. Discuss the children's experiences of defending truth or justice.

Activities and Final Prayer. Ask the children to look through books on the saints and choose a martyr who gave his or her life for the faith. Provide the children with red pieces of paper cut out in the shape of flames. On one side of the flame, each child should write the name of the saint he or she has chosen to follow. On the other side, each child should write his or her commitment for the week. As they deposit the flames un a basket to be presented at the Offertory all respond: "Send down your fire, Lord".

You are there.

Are you bothered by the prophet's message: That you have displeased God? Are you among those who throw Jeremiah down the well or those who rescue him? If you were Jeremiah, how would you feel? Are you afraid?



Q: The prophet Jeremiah is almost drowned because he tells people that they have displeased God and they do not want to hear this. Do you ever speak out like Jeremiah when you see someone treated unfairly?

Jesus, your friend, invites you:

- Sometimes it's not easy being a friend of Jesus because what he says often goes against the unjust things people do.
- ☐ How do you react when you hear about injustice or when someone is treated unfairly, for example when someone lies and someone else gets the blame?

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What am I going to do?

Speak to Jesus and tell him how you feel when you see injustice.
Tell him how you react. Do you say something, or are you afraid?
Ask him for the courage to defend the truth. Tell him what you
want to do this week:

- For example: <u>I will defend someone who is unfairly accused.</u>
- © For example: <u>I will not get even with someone who has done</u> me wrong.

Jesus opens a narrow gate

August 26: 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time Isa. 66:19-21: Heb. 12:5-7, 11-13; Luke 13:22-30

Talk about the story. Talk with the children about what the narrow gate might mean. Are they willing to make sacrifices? Talk about their favorite athletes and stars. Have they gotten where they are without sacrifices? Can we, as Christians, be satisfied with only thinking of our pleasure and not of others'?

Activities. Make a big clock with hands out of poster board. Place the hands on certain hours of the children's schedule. For example, pretend the clock strikes the hour and say something like: "It's 7 o'clock. I get up and say my prayers." Or, "I pretend I am sick to say home from school." Go through the different times of the day and present the children with various options or decisions they struggle with during the day. Then ask the children how many times they have chosen the "narrow" gate and how many times the "wide" gate.

Final Prayer. Each child should present a commitment for the week. All respond: "Open your gate for me, Jesus"



Q: Jesus tells us that to be with him will not be easy. Just accepting Jesus is not enough. We must be willing to make sacrifices. What type of sacrifices do you think Jesus is talking about?

You are there.

Would you like to ask Jesus about what he means? Why would not having met him and eaten with him be enough? What sacrifices are willing to make to achieve something you really want? For example, what sacrifices are willing to make to get on the soccer or football team?

Jesus, your friend, invites you:

- ☐ Jesus says listening to and eating with him is not enough.

 Good works are also necessary., even if they are hard to do.
- ☐ What do you think Jesus is asking you t do today?

- © For example: <u>I will spend some time with a lonely or ill person</u>, even if I feel like going out to play at that time.
