The Holy Trinity, June 7 2009

Readings: Deuteronomy 4, 32-34.39-40; Psalm 32; Romans 8, 14-17; Matthew 28, 16-20

The eleven disciples went to the hill in Galilee where Jesus had told them to go. When they saw him, they worshiped him, even though some of them doubted. Jesus drew near and said to them, "I have been given all authority in heaven and on earth. Go, then, to all peoples everywhere and make them my disciples: baptize them in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, and teach them to obey everything I have commanded you. And I will be with you always, to the end of the age."

Reflection

In the readings of this week the readings give us the that there is only one God, who alone deserves to be worshipped and obeyed. Paul reminds us that by Baptism, we did not receive a spirit of fear and slavery, but the spirit of adoption as children of God and co-heirs with Christ.

Jesus calls us to participate fully in his mission and to make disciples of all people.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (n.232 249) tell us the following:

The mystery of the Holy Trinity is central for the Christian life. It is the mystery of God self, it is ,therefore, the source of all other mysteries of faith; it is the light that illumines them. It is the most fundamental and essential one. The revealed truth of the Holy Trinity has been at the root of the living faith of the church, mainly in the act of Baptism.


Activity

Review with the children the way of making the sign of the cross. Do they know why Christian makes the sign of the cross? Remind them also of how the adults bless them when they go out, before they start something or before going to bed. They place them under God's protection. Renew the Baptismal promises and make the sign of the cross using holy water.





Corpus Christi June 14, 2009

Readings: Exodus 24, 3-8; Psalm 115; Hebrews 9, 11-15; Mark 14:12-16, 22-26

On the first day of the Festival of Unleavened Bread, the day the lambs for the Passover meal were killed, Jesus' disciples asked him, "Where do you want us to go and get the Passover meal ready for you?" Then Jesus sent two of them with these instructions: "Go into the city, and a man carrying a jar of water will meet you. Follow him to the house he enters, and say to the owner of the house: The Teacher says, Where the room is where my disciples and I will eat the Passover meal? Then he will show you a large upstairs room, fixed up and furnished, where you will get everything ready for us." The disciples left, went to the city, and found everything just as Jesus had told them; and they prepared the Passover meal. While they were eating, Jesus took a piece of bread, gave a prayer of thanks, broke it, and gave it to his disciples." Take it," he said, "this is my body." Then he took a cup, gave thanks to God, and handed it to them; and they all drank from it. Jesus said, "This is my blood which is poured out for many, my blood which seals God's covenant. I tell you, I will never again drink this wine until the day I drink the new wine in the Kingdom of God." Then they sang a hymn and went out to the Mount of Olives.

(Mark 14,12-16,22-26)

Reflection

Do you understand Jesus' words about the bread and wine being his body and blood? Do you eat the bread and drink the wine believing what Jesus says? What do you want to say to Jesus? Jesus says that he gives up everything he is and has out of love for us. Would you like to share with others every thing?

In the readings of this week Jesus, priest of the new covenant, offers sacrifices and seals the commitment with his own blood. Jesus gives us everything he is and has for the salvation and liberation of us all.

Activity

Represent the scene of the Last Supper. Act it out with the children. Prepare bread and grape juice to represent wine. Bring costumes to dress up the children as the apostles. Also posters with picture and explanation of each apostle A lector reads the gospel and the children act it. When the reading is finish all together they pray and give thanks to Jesus for giving himself up for us.

Lord, you nourish us each day physically and spiritually with your own body and blood. Your communion teaches us to share everything with others. Help us to be generous with one another, giving ourselves in service and in love. Stay with us. Amen



Jesus Calms a Storm

On the evening of that same day Jesus said to his disciples, "Let us go across to the other side of the lake." So they left the crowd; the disciples got into the boat in which Jesus was already sitting, and they took him with them. Other boats were there too. Suddenly a strong wind blew up, and the waves began to pill over into the boat, so that it was about to fill with water. Jesus was in the back of the boat, sleeping with his head on a pillow. The disciples woke him up and said, "Teacher, don't you care that we are about to die?" Jesus stood up and commanded the wind, "Be quiet!" and he said to the waves, "Be still!" The wind died down, and there was a great calm. Then Jesus said to his disciples, "Why are you frightened? Do you still have no faith?" But there were terribly afraid and began to say to one another, "Who is this man? Even the wind and the waves obey him!"

Reflection


Are you very scared of the storm?


Activity

Help us to convert into Apostles That serve the Church with a pure Conscience, witnesses of its truth and of its beauty in the midst of the darkness of our time.








The Conversion of Paul (Acts 9, 3-6) As Saul was coming near the city of Damascus. Suddenly a light from the sky flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him: "Saul, Saul! Why do you persecute me?" "Who are you, Lord?" he asked. "I am Jesus whom you persecute," the voice said. But get up and go into the city, where you will be told what you must do.

The Vocation of Saul (Acts 9, 8-18) Saul got up from the ground unable to see, even through his eyes were open. They had to take him by the hand and lead him into Damascus. For three days he continued blind, during which time he neither ate nor drank. There was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias to whom the Lord had appeared in a vision. "Ananias!" he said. "Here I am, Lord," came the answer. The Lord said to him, "Go at once to Straight Street, and at the house of Judas ask for certain Saul of Tarsus. He is there praying." But Ananias protested: "Lord, I have heard from many sources about this man and all the harm he has done to your holy people in Jerusalem. He is here now with authorization from the chief priests to arrest any who invoke your name." The Lord said to him: "You must go! This man is the instrument I have chosen to bring my name to the Gentiles and their kings and to the people of Israel. I myself shall indicate to him how much he will have to suffer for my name." With that, Ananias left. When he entered the house he laid his hands on Saul and said, "Saul, my brother, I have been sent by the Lord Jesus who appeared to you on the way here, to help you recover your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit." Immediately something like scales fell from his eyes and he regained his sight. He got up and was baptized.






Saul escapes from the Jews (Acts 9, 23-25) After quite some time had passed, certain Jews conspired to kill Saul, but their plot came to his attention. They went so far as to keep close watch on the city gates day and

night in an attempt to do away with him. Some of his disciples therefore, took him along the wall one night and lowered him to the ground, using


Paul and Barnabas are mistaken for gods. (Acts 14, 8-15) At Lystra there was a man who was lame from birth; he used to sit crippled, never having walked in his life. On one occasion he was listening to Paul preaching and Paul looked directly at him and saw that he had the faith to be saved. He called out to him in a loud voice, "Stand up! On your feet!" The man jumped up and began to walk around. When the crowds saw what Paul had done, they cried out in Lycaonian, "Gods have come to us in the form of men!" They named Barnabas Zeus; Paul they called Hermes, since he was the spokesman. When the apostles Barnabas and Paul heard of this, they tore their garments and rushed out into the crowds. Friends, why do you do this? They shouted frantically. "We are only men, human like you. We are bringing you the good news that will convert you from just such follies as these to the living God, 'the one who made heaven and earth and the sea and all that is in them.'




The Clairvoyant Slave Girl (Acts 16, 16-18) It was while we were on our way out to the place of prayer that we met a slave girl who had a clairvoyant spirit. She used to bring substantial profit to her masters by fortune-telling. The girl began to follow Paul and the rest of us shouting. "These men are servants of the Most High God; they will make known to you a way of salvation." She did this for several days until finally Paul became annoyed, turned around, and said to the spirit. "In the name of Jesus Christ I command you, come out of her!" Then and there the spirit left her.




Paul and Silas in Prayer (Acts 16, 25-33) about midnight, while Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God as their fellow prisoners listened, a severe earthquake suddenly shook the place, rocking the prison to the foundations. Immediately all the doors flew open and everyone's chains were pulled loose. The jailer woke up to see the prisoners' gates wide open. Thinking that the prisoners had escaped, he drew his sword to kill himself; but Paul shouted to him: "Do not harm yourself! We are all still here." The jailer called for a light, then rushed in and fell trembling at the feet of Paul and Silas. After a brief interval he led them out and said, "Men, what must I do to be saved?" Their answer was, "Believe in the Lord Jesus and you will be saved and all you're household." They proceeded to announce the word of God to him and to everyone in his house.



Paul at Athens (Acts 17,16-33) While Paul was waiting for them in Athens, he grew exasperated at the sight of idols everywhere in the city. In the synagogue he used to hold discussions with the Jews and those sympathetic to Judaism, as well as daily debates in the public square with ordinary passers-by. Epicurean and Stoic philosophers disputed with him, some of them asking, "What is this magpie trying to say to us. Others commented, "He sounds like a promoter of foreign gods," because he was heard to speak of "Jesus" and "the resurrection." Then they led him off to Areopagus, saying: "We are curious to know what this new teaching is that you propose. You are introducing subjects unfamiliar to us and we should like to know what it is all about." Then Paul stood up in the Areopagus and delivered this address: "Men of Athens, I note that in every respect you are scrupulously religious. As I walked around looking at your shrines, I even discovered an altar inscribed, 'To a God Unknown.' Now, what you are thus worshiping in ignorance I intend to make known to you.




Paul before the Council (Acts 23) Paul gazed intently at the Sanhedrin. Then he said, "Brothers, to this day I have lived my life with a clear conscience before God." At that, the high priest Ananias ordered his attendants to strike Paul on the mouth. Paul said to him in rebuttal: "You are the one God will strike, you whitewashed wall! You sit there judging men according to the law, yet you violate the law yourself by ordering me to be struck!" Paul was aware that some of them were Sadducees and some Pharisees. Consequently he spoke out before the Sanhedrin: "Brothers, I am a Pharisee and was born a Pharisee. I find myself on trial now because of my hope in the resurrection of the dead." At these words, a dispute arose between Pharisees and Sadducees which divided the whole assembly. A loud uproar ensued. Finally, some scribes of the Pharisee party arose and declared emphatically: We do not find this man guilty of any crime. If a spirit or an angel has spoken to him..." At this, the dispute grew worse and the commander feared they would tear Paul to pieces. He therefore ordered his troops to go down and rescue Paul from their midst and take him back to the king Agrippa.





Agrippa Hears Paul (Acts 26) Agrippa now spoke to Paul: "You have Permission to state your case." So Paul stretched out his hand and began his defense. Paul began saying how he had been a great persecutor of Christians until, on his way to Damascus, a lightning had struck him to the ground and a voice from heaven had spoken to him. He spoke with so much eloquence that one of the ministers smiling said: "Paul, you are crazy; and your great learning is driving you mad!" Paul responded: "I am not mad. The king here is well acquainted with these matters. Do you believe the prophets, King Agrippa? I am sure you do." At this, Agrippa said, "A Little more, Paul and you will make a Christian out of me!" Paul replied, "Whether little more or much more, I would to God that not only you but all who listen to me today might become what I am-without these chains!" Ending the trial, Agrippa further remarked to Festus, "He could have been set at liberty, if he had not appealed to the emperor!"

Paul in the island of Malta (Acts 28, 1-10) When they were taking Paul as prisoner to Rome, the boat shipwrecked on the island of Malta and all were saved. The natives showed extraordinary kindness by lighting a fire with a bundle of brushwood when a poisonous snake, escaping from the heat, fastened itself on his hand. At the sight of the snake hanging from his hand, the natives said to one another, "This man must really be a murderer if, after his escape from the sea, Justice will not let him live." But Paul shook the snake off into the fire and suffered no ill effects from the bite. They expected to see him swell up or suddenly fall dead. After waiting for quite some time, however, and seeing nothing unusual happen to him, they changed their minds and began to say that his was a god. In the vicinity of that place was Publius, the chief figure on the island. It happened that Publius' father was sick in bed, laid up with chronic fever and dysentery. Paul went in to see the man and praying, laid his hands on him and cured him. After this happened, the rest of the sick on the island began to come to Paul and they too were healed. They paid us much honor, and when we eventually set sail they brought us provisions for our needs.



Paul's Death St. Paul has been the greatest apostle that Christianity has had. It can be said that he travelled half the world proclaiming the Gospel and started Christian communities which he would never forget. He would write them his famous letters full of wisdom. Incessantly he encouraged many, making them see that it is necessary to work hard to reach the Kingdom of God; but the work did not compare with the sublime glory that awaited them. And he added: "For me life is Christ, and death is the compensation; but if continuing to

live is fruit of my apostolate, I don't know what to choose, because I feel prized by both. On the one hand I desire death to be with Christ in heaven, which without a doubt is the best for me; but on the other hand, continuing to live, I judge to be more necessary for you." He fought so much that he finally could say: "I have fought well, I have

finished my race. Now only the crown waits that our Lord will confer upon me." When a group of soldiers finished crucifying Peter in the Vatican, another group of soldiers took Paul to the outskirts of Rome to ask his life for Christ, although in a different manner. This time, the privilege of being a Roman citizen deprived him of the glory of the cross that he honored so much during his life.

He was decapitated.

Readings: Wisdom 1:13-15; 2, 23-24; Psalm 29; 2Corinthians 8, 7.913-15; Mark 5, 21-43

Jesus went back across to the other side of the lake. There at the lakeside a large crowd athered around him. Jairus, an official of the local synagogue, arrived, and when he saw Jesus, he threw himself down at his feet and begged him earnestly, My little daughter is very sick. Please come and place your hands on her, so that she will get well and live!" Then Jesus started off with him. So many people were going along with Jesus that they were crowding him from every side.

There was a woman who had suffered terribly from severe bleeding for twelve years, even though she had been treated by many doctors. She had spent all her money, but instead of getting better she got worse all the time. She had heard about Jesus, so she came in the crowd behind him, saying to herself, "If I just touch his clothes, I will get well." She touched his cloak, and her bleeding stopped at once; and she had the feeling inside herself that she was healed of her trouble. At once Jesus knew that power had gone out of him, so he turned around in the crowd and asked, "Who touched my clothes?" His disciples answered, "You see how the people are crowding you; why do you ask who touched you?" But Jesus kept looking around to see who had done it. The woman realized what had happened to her, so she came, trembling with fear, knelt at his feet, and told him the whole truth. Jesus said to her, "My daughter, your faith has made you well. Go in peace, and be healed of your trouble." While Jesus was saying this, some messengers came from Jairus' house and told him, "Your daughter has died. Why bother the Teacher any longer?" Jesus paid no attention to what they said, but told him, "Don't be afraid, and only believe." Then he did not let anyone else go on with him except Peter and James and his brother John. They arrived at Jairus' house, where Jesus saw the confusion and heard all the loud crying and wailing. He went in and said to them, "why all this confusion? Why are you crying? The child is not dead she is only sleeping!" They started making fun of him, so he put them all out, took the child's father and mother and his three disciples, and went into the room where the child was lying. He took her by the hand and said to her, "Talitha, koum," which means, "Little girl, I tell you to get up!" She got up at once and started walking around. Activity





SACRED HEART OF JESUS


Did you know that the month of June is dedicated to the Sacred Heart?
