Message from Father Andrés Makowiec

There was a story about a lawyer who did the impossible to save his client, but his guilt was such that he was condemned to death. While the convict was waiting to be executed, the attorney returned to visit him in jail and said to him: "I couldn't do anything else for you, but I don't want you to die. I propose that we exchange clothes. I'll stay here for you and you can go free. But remember; change your life so you don't return to this place." They exchanged clothing and the convict left the jail. After a few days of enjoying his freedom, he decided to visit his lawyer. But when he arrived at the jail, they informed him that he had already been executed...

Recalling the Pascal mysteries, we are invited to identify with the criminal in this story. But it was Jesus who was executed in our place. He offered his life so that we could live. Some have learned from this lesson, like St. Maximilian Kolbe, and knew how to manage their life – offering it up so that others could live. And us?

On Ash Wednesday, we recognize publicly that we are sinners; that we are dirty and destroyed just like the ashes. (Sometimes we give incorrect meaning, almost magical or sacramental to the imposition of ashes.) In reality the imposition of ashes represents our condition as sinners and our intent to return to live according to Jesus' Gospel.

During the season of Lent, the Church invites us to meditate on the value of Jesus' sacrifice, a sacrifice to the last drop of blood. The reason for the sacrifice: His great love for each human being and His desire that all reach salvation and eternal life.

We were called to be instruments of God's love towards our families, community, and particularly, the children so needy and sensitive to love and the lack of love. So easily we excuse ourselves and cancel our meetings with the children in prayer, or our meetings with the leaders to prepare the programs for pastoral action. It's so difficult to organize the special activities, but which are so necessary to celebrate some parish or liturgical feasts.

The celebration of the Pascal Tridium shows us Jesus, who has no limits in expressing His love for us. He washes His disciples feet and, finally, opens His arms, so that no <u>human</u> weakness impedes Him from completing His <u>divine</u> mission, and allows himself to be nailed to the cross. In this way his open hands take in all who believe in Him.

I invite you during this time to meditate on the value of Love, value of suffering, value of each sacrifice, of each cross. Where there is a cross, there is salvation.

St. Theresa of Avila said: "The cross that is embraced, has the less weight". Embrace, the one God has placed on your shoulders and help others to also embrace theirs. Let us be like Cirineo for the weak, especially for our children that suffer spiritual abandonment from the world that surrounds them. Great things come from sacrificing, surrendering, and loving. Imitating Jesus, the saintly martyrs, and so many exemplary Christians, let us not be afraid to draw nearer to Jesus' cross.

Let us begin this Lenten time with a good sacramental Confession. Let us reconcile with our families, with our parish groups, and with our ministries. Then, let us achieve our Lenten objective of being generous, surrendering our lives, our capacities, our time, to the last drop, to the last sigh, to the last instant. Our only measure of love has to be a love without limits as Jesus showed us.

Be Generous!

May God give you the grace of humility and fill you with love.

First Sunday of Lent March 01- 2009

Readings:9, 8-15; Psalm 25, 4-5, 6-7, 8-9; 1Peter 3; 18-22; Mark 1:12-15

Jesus says no

The Spirit drove Jesus out into the desert, and he remained in the desert for forty days, temped by Satan. He was among wild beast, and the angels ministered to him. After John had been arrested, Jesus came to Galilee proclaiming the gospel of God: "This is the time of fulfillment. The Kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe the gospel." Mark 1:12-15

Reflection

Jesus prepares for his mission by praying; He resists the temptation to look for something easier and goes out to preach Inviting all to a new life. Do you sometimes feel tempted not to do what adults ask of you? Do you ask God to be with you when you are about to do something important? Of all the things you do daily, what do you need to change? Jesus spends 40 days in the dessert without eating. We Christians have a period of 40 days of Lent, to reflect on our lives and commitments. What do you plan to offer for Lent?

Activity

Have the children write down what they would like to offer for Lent. Place the papers in a basket. Bring it to the altar. Every week pray asking God for strength to accomplish their commitments. You can star to pray this day the "Merciful stations of the Cross"

Prayer

Sometimes we find it easier to seek comfort for ourselves than to do good for others, because that demands sacrifice. Give us strength to overcome our temptations and help us to continue to follow you, serving others. Amen





Second Sunday of Lent 8, 2009

Readings: Genesis: 22: 1-2.9a, 10-13, 15-18 ; Psalm 116:10, 15 16-17, 18-19 ;Romans 8:31b-34;Mark 9:2-10

The Transfiguration

Jesus took Peter, James, and John and led them up a high mountain apart by themselves. And he was transfigured be fore them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no fuller on earth could bleach them. Then Elijah appeared to them along with Moses, and they were conversing with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus in reply, "Rabbi, it is good that we are here! Let us make three tents: one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." He hardly knew what to say, they were so terrified. Then a cloud came, casting a shadow over them; from the cloud came a voice, "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him." Suddenly, looking around, they no longer saw anyone but Jesus alone with them.

As they were coming down from the mountain, he charged them not to relate what they had seen to anyone, except when the Son of Man had risen from the dead. So they kept the matter to themselves, questioning what rising from the dead meant,

(Mark 9: 2-10)

Reflection

The experience of the Transfiguration gives us the promise of a world far beyond our own imagination and our own dreams

Jesus invites his friends to know that he is the Son of God and true God Talk with the children about the very happy moments in their lives that they remember as a clear as a photograph. Did they wish those times would last forever?

Talk about what they want to do when they grow up. What do their parents tell them they should do? Do they suggest professions that make a lot of money only because of that?

Talk about the voice that says we must listen Jesus. How do they listen?

Activity

Have the children draw three camping tents. On one write "My happiest moment" On another one "Here I am now" On the third one "What I would like to be in the future" Have them present their tents, saying: Here are my dreams, Jesus I want to listen to you. I know you are at my side always."

Prayer

Loving God, we have so many dreams and hopes for us and for our family. Today you tell us that, if we listen to you, you will fulfill us with blessings although they might not be the kinds of things we expected. Give us a great trust in your love. Amen





Third Sunday of Lent March 15, 2009 Readings: Exodus 20: 1-17: Psalm 19: 8, 9, 10, 11: 1Corinthians 1: 22-25: John 2:13-25

Jesus purifies the Temple

Since the Passover of the Jews was near, Jesus went up to Jerusalem. He found in the temple area those who sold oxen, sheep, and doves, as well as the money changes seated there. He made a whip out of cords and drove them all out of the temple area, with the sheep and oxen, and spilled the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables, and to those who sold doves he said, "Take these out of here, and stop making my Father's house a marketplace." His disciples recalled the words scripture; Zeal for your house will consume me. At this the Jews answered and said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus answered and said to them, "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up." The Jews said, "This temple has been under construction for forty- six years, and you will raise it up in three days?" but he was speaking about the temple of his body. Therefore, when he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they came to believe the Scripture and the word Jesus had spoken. While he was in Jerusalem for the feast of Passover, many began to believe in his name when they saw the signs he was doing. But Jesus would not trust himself to them because he knew them all, and did not need anyone to testify about human nature. He himself understood it well. (John 2: 13-25)

Reflection


There were offerings of animals presented to God in the Jewish temple. People needed to buy the animals there. Jesus was angry, not so much at the practices as at lack of devotion shown by people at the temple. For Jesus the most important thing was the honor given to God. Jesus dares to denounce abuses because he has the authority of the Father. What is most important for them? Is money, work, or entertainment ever more important than God? What values is this society transmitting to them?

Activity

Bring to the group a few coins to look at and see whose images appear on them. Prepare some dollar bills with the image of Jesus, where they can show his message of love and the value, in one side. On the back what is important to them or what they will do this week. On the following page you will find a model.

Prayer

Lord give us strength and patience to refrain from getting angry at things that simply make us uncomfortable, but to have the courage to stand up against injustices and against what harms others. Teach us your ways of peace, love and justice . Amen





Saint Joseph, give us peace and blessing from heaven and, above all, love.


Paul traveling for god Acts 13-21

Fourth Sunday of Lent - March 22, 2009 Readings: 2 Chronicles 36: 14-16, 19-23 Psalm 137: 1-2, 3, 4-5,6 Ephesians 2: 4-10 John 3: 14-21

Jesus will be lifted up

Jesus said to Nicodemus: "Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, so that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life." For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him. Whoever believes in him will not be condemned, but whoever does not believe has already been condemned, because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God. And this is the verdict, that the light came into the world, but people preferred darkness to light, because their works were evil. For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come toward the light, so that his works might not be exposed. But whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly seen as done in God. (John 3: 14-21)

Reflection

God always showed compassion despite the unfaithfulness of the people. God lifted up Christ so that we could all be saved. God's love is so great! What do you want to ask Jesus about Moses, the serpent and the people who were sick? Have they ever realized that the symbol in many doctors' offices is a snake wrapped around a pole? Is the symbol of the doctors, based on this bible passage. Have they ever heard of any sickness that

was healed by just looking at something? In this story everyone who looked at it was healed. Jesus says that by looking at him we get strength for the difficulties of life. What troubles would you like to tell Jesus about?

Activity

Show the drawing to the children. Prepare a big cardboard cross. Have ready for them small pieces of paper Ask them to write some sickness or problem that need to be healed. Each child will then stick his or her piece of

paper on the cross. When all had stick their paper all together said this prayer: "Jesus, you are our health"

Prayer



Fifth Sunday of Lent - March 29, 2009

Readings: Jeremiah 31:31-34; Psalm 51:3-4, 12-13,14-15; Hebrews 5:7-9 ;John 12:20-33

Jesus is the good seed

Some Greeks who had come to worship at the Passover Feast came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and asked him, "Sir, we would like to see Jesus." Phillip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Phillip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Amen, amen, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit. Whoever loves his life loses it and whoever hates his life in this world will preserve it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there also will my servant be. The Father will honor whoever serves me." I am troubled now. Yet what should I say? Father saves me from this hour? But it was for this purpose that I came to this hour. Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it and will glorify it again." The crowd there heard it and said it was thunder; but others said, "An angel has spoken to him." Jesus answered and said, "This voice did not come for my sake but for yours. Now is the time of judgment on this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And when I am lifted up from earth, I will draw everyone to myself." He said this indicating the kind of death he would die, (John 12;20:33)

Reflection

Jesus' death, like that of a grain of wheat, is not the end of the story. Jesus' death is a source of abundant fruit which is produced for the good of all.

Talk about the seeds. Have they ever planted something? Did they have to wait a long time until it grew? Do the children understand the meaning of sacrifice? Do they see the sacrifices their parents make for them?

Prayer








