Readings: Revelation 7:2-4, 9-14; Psalm 23; 1John 3:1-3; Matthew 5:1-12a

The Sermon on the Mount

When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain, and after he had sat down, his disciples came to him. He began to teach them, saying:

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the Kingdom of heaven.

Blessed are they who mourn, for they will be comforted.

Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the land.

Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be satisfied.

Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy.

Blessed are the clean of heart, for they will see God.

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.

Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the Kingdom of heaven.

Blessed are you when they insult you and persecute you and utter every kind of evil against you falsely because of me. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven." (Matthew 5:1-12a)

Reflection

The saints we celebrate are not just those on our altars, but all those people, past and present, who are generous, peace makers, just and prayerful. Do they know people who seem holy to them? Who is their favorite saint? Talk with them about the saints. Do they know anyone who does some of the things that Jesus says we need to do to be happy? How do you feel when you are kind, generous, or a peacemaker? Do they posses any of the qualities that Jesus lists? Give an opportunity to everyone to share.


Activity

Bring books of life of saints to the group. Let them pick one and give them time to read it. Then share why that person was happy and holy. Who would you like to have as a role model?

Prayer

Lord, you know that we seek happiness. We know that happiness is your plan for us; that we may have what we need to live healthy lives, be peacemakers, with love for one another. Help us to live in happiness, as your beloved children, having the saints as our role models to follow. **Amen.**

Friends of Jesus and Mary XXXII Sunday in Ordinary Time November 8, 2009

Readings: 1Kings 17:10-16; Psalm; 145 Hebrews 9: 24-28; Mark 12: 38-44

Jesus warns against the teachers of the law

In the course of his teaching Jesus said to the crowds, "Beware of the scribes, who like to go around in long robes and accept greetings in the marketplaces, seats of honor in synagogues, and places of honor at banquets. They devour the houses of widows and, as a pretext recite lengthy prayers. They will receive a very severe condemnation." He sat down opposite the treasury and observed how the crowd put money into the treasury. Many rich people put in large sums. A poor widow also came and put in two small coins worth a few cents. Calling his disciples to himself, he said to them, "Amen, I say to you, this poor widow put in more than all the other contributors to the treasury. For they have all contributed from their surplus wealth, but she, from her poverty, has contributed all she had, her whole livelihood." (Mark 12: 38-44)

Reflection

What do their families, schools, and the society around them teach them about generosity? Do they generously give of their material possessions, talents and time? Jesus says that the poor woman has given more than others because the others gave what they did not need. What do you have that you could share with others? Is it difficult for you to give what you have? Do you give from what is not necessary or needed, or do you sometimes give something important to you? Have they ever seen a member of the community or a friend give up something that was very valuable to them? Share.

Activity

Give out flash cards. Ask them to write something they can give. Example: share a lunch, give your favorite toy or clothes. Place a basket on the altar and ask them to place in the cards. Then have them say a prayer asking Jesus to teach us to be generous.

Prayer

Lord, because of your great generosity we have received life and all we are and have. Open the doors to our hearts to make us generous in the service of others. **Amen.**

Friends of Jesus and Mary XXXIII Sunday in Ordinary Time November 15, 2015

Readings: Daniel 12: 1-3; Psalm 15; Hebrews 10:11-14; Mark 13, 24-32

Jesus said to his disciples: "In those days after that tribulation the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from the sky, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. And then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in the clouds' with great power and glory, and then he will send out the angels and gather his elect from the four winds, from the end of the earth to the end of the sky. Learn a lesson from the fig tree. When its branch becomes tender and sprouts leaves, you know that summer is near. In the same way, when you see these things happening, know that he is near, at the gates. Amen, I say to you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away. But of that day or hour, no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father." (Mark 13, 24-32)

Reflection

The end of the world will mean the final victory of Jesus. We don't know when it will come, but we have to trust in Jesus. Talk with the children about what they know about astrologers or psychics and their predictions. Compare those visions with Jesus' words that promise victory. How do they prepare for a trip? What do they enjoy about traveling? Explain how sometimes our life is like a journey: if we prepared we will be able to enjoy it, despite some of the difficulties. How can we prepare for the journey of life? Share.

Activity

Give to each child a blank piece of paper. Tell them to make a list of the things they will need to take for a trip (bag, clothes, food). Then ask them to write the things they will need in their journey to God. What actions and attitudes do we need to take? Share.

Prayer

Lord, we often hear terrible predictions about catastrophes at the end of the world. Teach us to trust your word above everything else, since your word doesn't pass away. If we remain in your love and love one another, we know we have nothing to fear. Thank you, Jesus. **Amen.**

Friends of Jesus and Mary Christ the King November 22, 2015

Readings: Daniel 7: 13-14; Psalm 92; Revelation 1:5-8; John 18:33b-37

Pilate said to Jesus, "Are you the King of the Jews?" Jesus answered, "Do you say this on your own or have others told you about me?" Pilate answered, "I am not a Jew, am I? Your own nation and the chief priests handed you over to me. What have you done?" Jesus answered, "My kingdom does not belong to this world. If my kingdom did belong to this world, my attendants would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jews. But as it is, my kingdom is not here." So Pilate said to him, "Then you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say I am a king. For this I was born and for this I came into the world to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice." (John 18:33b-37)

Reflection

Christ loves us. Jesus freed us from our sins and built a new kingdom for us. The reign of God is not one of power, dominion or violence, but of truth, justice and love. What do they know about kings and queens other than the stories from the fairy tales? How does the role of kings, queens and other rules, compare and contrast with that of Jesus? Which kingdom do you think is better? Why?

Activity

Pick one child to represent Jesus. Prepare some Flash cards with good actions and others with bad actions (example: help a classmate, visiting someone, fighting, lying, visiting the sick and many more). Each child presents the action to Jesus. The child in the role of Jesus should decide whether with his or her deed, can come into God's kingdom. Those who have bad actions may change them to an action that would allow them to enter God's kingdom. When they are accepted they said: Jesus you are our king.

Prayer

Lord, you are a servant king. You gave yourself as food for us, you were crowned with thorns and nailed to a cross. But you conquered death and now you are the king of life. Teach us to follow you and to act like you: to serve others, to treat people with kindness, and to forgive one another when we do wrong. **Amen.**



Learn this prayer:

Blessed be your purity, for all eternity; God Himself rejoices in such gracious beauty.

To you Celestial Princess, Holy Virgin Mary, I offer this day my soul, my life, my hoart. Look upon me with compassion; You are my Mother, never leave me.



Readings: Jeremiah 33:14-16; 1 Psalm 25; 1 Thessalonians.3:12-4:2; Luke 21:25-28, 34-36

"There will be strange things happening to the sun, the moon, and the stars. On earth whole countries will be in despair, afraid of the roar of the sea and the raging tides. People will faint from fear as they wait for what is coming over the whole earth, for the powers in space will be driven from their courses. Then the Son of Man will appear, coming in a cloud with great power and glory. When these things begin to happen, stand up and raise your heads, because your salvation is near. Be careful not to let yourselves become occupied with too much feasting and drinking and with the worries of this life, or that Day may suddenly catch you like a trap. For it will come upon all people everywhere on earth. Be on watch and pray always that you will have the strength to go safely through all those things that will happen and to stand before the Son of Man." (Luke 21: 25-28, 34-36)

Reflection

Luke explains the signs of the coming of Jesus not as a threat of catastrophes, but as the fulfillment of God's promise of liberation for all. What do they expect this Christmas? Are their families busy and anxious about buying gifts and spending money? Do they know what is being celebrated this Christmas? Good actions and sacrifices are the things Jesus likes. Meditate and share what they will offer in this Advent Season.


Activity

Explain the children the meaning of the Advent Wreath. There is information on the next page. Encourage them to do good deeds to prepare a manger for Jesus. Prepare a small basket to place the good deeds. This is a simple way to instruct them to grow in virtue. They will feel very happy to prepare with their good actions a nice manger to place Jesus.

Prayer




ADVENT WREATH

Everyone in the family can be involved in making an Advent Wreath for your home. Explain the symbolism of each part. Decide how each person will participate in preparing the wreath and in daily or weekly family devotions. The first time you gather to pray around the wreath, have some review the meaning of each part.

Circular Shape

The Advent wreath is a circle. We cannot find the end or the beginning of a circle. The circular Advent wreath reminds us that Jeaus came to give us a life that will never end, eternal life with God in heaven.



Evergreen Branches

The evergreen branches used to make the circle do not change color as do the leaves on other kinds of trees. The evergreens in the Advent wreath remind us that God never changes: God always has loved us and always will.

Candles

There are four candles o the Advent wreath, one for each week in Advent. They remind us that the Jewish people waited a long time for the Savior to come. The burning candles remind us that Christ, the Light of the World, brightness the darkness around us. Each week we light one more candle, a sign that the more we let Christ into our lives, the brighter our lives will be.

Opening Prayer

O God, bless this Advent wreath. May it helps us prepare to welcome Jesus, your Son, into our lives, letting the light of his love shine through us. Amen.

Week 1 (Light 1 candle) Come to us, Lord Jesus. Warm our hearts with your love. Help us to prepare for your coming. Help us to see the good things we can do. Help us to see the good things others do: Come, Lord Jesus! (Pause for silent prayer)

Week 2 (Light 2 candles) We believe in you Lord. We know that you can help us to love each other more. You are our light. Come Lor Jesual (Pause for silent prayer)

Werk 3 (Light 3 candles) Jesus, we want your coming to make a difference in how we live and love. Open our hearts to hear you telling us how we can bring peace and joy to others. Come, Lord Jesus! (Pause for silent prayer)

Week 4 (Light 4 candles) Quiet the worries and fears in our hearts. Lord. Give us your peace. Thank you for the life you share with us. Help us to share that life with others. Come, Lord Jesus! (Pause for silent prayer)

Make an Advent Wreath

You can make an advent wreath for each child of your group

- Materials needed:
- 1) One small paper plate
- 2) One donut for each
- 3) Four birthday candles three purple and one pink
- 4) A small green doilet
- How to prepare it:

Place the donut in the paper plate over doilet. Open the holes for the candles on the donut,

Spray it to preserve it. When they are dry, place the candle on the donut and decorate it with a ribbon.
