





Readings: Ezekiel 37, 12-14 Psalm 129, Romans 8, 8-11 John 11, 1-45

Representation of the Death and Resurrection of Lazarus

Narrator: A man named Lazarus, who lived in Bethany, became sick. Bethany was the town where Mary and her sister Martha lived. (This Mary was the one who poured the perfume on the Lord's feet and wiped them with her hair; it was her brother Lazarus who was sick.) The sisters sent Jesus a message:

Sisters: "Lord, your dear friend is sick." **Narrator**: When Jesus heard it, he said,

Jesus: "The final result of this sickness will not be the death of Lazarus; this has happened in order to bring glory to God, and it will be the means by which the Son of God will receive glory."

Narrator: Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus. Yet when he received the news that Lazarus was sick he stayed where he was for two more days. Then he said to the disciples,

Jesus: "Let us go back to Judea."

Disciples: "Teacher, just a short time ago the people there wanted to stone you; and are you planning to go back?"

Jesus: "A day has twelve hours, doesn't it? So those who walk in broad daylight do not stumble, for they see the light of this world. But if they walk during the night they stumble, because they have no light. Our friend Lazarus has fallen asleep, but I will go and wake him up."

Disciples: "If he is asleep, Lord, he will get well."

Narrator: Jesus meant that Lazarus had died, but they thought he meant natural sleep. So Jesus told plainly, **Jesus**: "Lazarus is dead. But for your sake I am glad that I was not with him, so that you will believe. Let us go to him."

Thomas (called the Twin): "Let us all go along with the Teacher, so that we may die with him!"

Narrator: When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had been buried four days before. Bethany was less than two miles from Jerusalem, and many Judeans had come to see Martha and Mary to comfort them about their brother's death. When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went out to meet him, but Mary stayed in the house. Martha said to Jesus.

Martha: "If you had been here, Lord, my brother would not have died! But I know that even now God will give you whatever you ask him for."

Jesus: "Your brother will rise to life."

Martha: "I know that he will rise to life on the last day."

Jesus: "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me will live, even though they die; and those who live and believe in me will never die. Do you believe this?"

Martha: "Yes, Lord!" I do believe that you are the Messiah, the son of God, who was to come into the world." *Narrator*: After Martha said this, she went back and called her sister Mary privately.

Martha: "The teacher is here and is asking for you."

Narrator: When Mary heard this, she got up and hurried out to meet him. (Jesus had not yet arrived in the village, but was still in the place where Martha had met him.) The people who were in the house with Mary comforting her followed her when they saw her get up and hurry out. They thought that she was going to the grave to weep there. Mary arrived where Jesus was, and as soon as she saw him, she fell at his feet.

Mary: "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died!"

Narrator: Jesus saw her weeping, and he saw how the people with her were weeping also; his heart was touched, and he was deeply moved.

Iesus: "Where have you buried him?"

Sisters: "Come and see, Lord,"

Narrator: Jesus wept. "See how much he loved him!" the people said. But some of them said, "He gave sight to the blind man, didn't he? Could he not have kept Lazarus from dying?" Deeply moved once more, Jesus went to the tomb, which was a cave with a stone placed at the entrance.

Jesus: "Take the stone away!"



Martha: "There will be a bad smell, Lord. He has been buried four days!" *Jesus*: "Didn't I tell you that you would see God's glory if you believed?"

Narrator: They took the stone away. Jesus looked up and said,

Jesus: "I thank you, Father that you listen to me. I know that you always listen to me, but I say this for the

sake of the people here, so that they will believe that you sent me." *Narrator*: After he had said this, he called out in a loud voice,

lesus: "Lazarus, come out!"

Narrator: He came out, his hands and feet wrapped in grave cloths, and with a cloth around his face.

Jesus: "Untie him and let him go."

Narrator: Many of the people who had come to visit Mary saw what Jesus did, and they believed in him.

(John 11, 1-45)

Reflection


Speak with the children about the story. How did they imagine the situation in today's gospel? Have they experienced death in their family? How did the adults react? What words of comfort did they hear? Have they ever gone to give condolences to someone? How did that feel? What do they think of Lazarus' story and his coming out of the tomb? Do you think like Martha and Mary that Jesus can rise Lazarus? What do people say and do when they see Lazarus come out? Jesus shows that he has power to solve the most impossible things. Do you trust Jesus to help you when you think things have no solution? Jesus shares the pains of human beings but gives us strength to face death with hope. Share.

Activity

Bring to the group a piece of white paper for each child. Ask them to write a note of condolence to comfort Jesus for the death of his dear friend. Then write a prayer where you tell Jesus of something that worries you and you think is very difficult to resolve. Tell Jesus you know that He can help you resolve the problem. Share the prayers.

Prayer

Lord, help us to say to you with Martha, that we know you have power to give us life. Bring us out of the tombs of our selfishness to hear your call and walk with you. Amen.

Reflection


As a remembrance of the entrance of Jesus in Jerusalem, we read at the beginning of the Mass on Palm Sunday the gospel of Matthew for the year A. The palms are blessed and distributed to all. During mass this Sunday the passion of Jesus is read. Why would people first praise Jesus and then demand his death? Have you known people who have betrayed you or your parents? How did you feel about it? How do you celebrate the good things Jesus has done for you? Are you ever influenced by those who do bad things?

Activity

Reenact the scene of Jesus' entrance in Jerusalem. Have a procession with palms. Dress one as Jesus and give palms to the rest. Have a procession and ask the children to sing Hosanna.

Praver

Lord, you came to show us that the one sent by God is a servant to all. Help us to believe that true worth doesn't come from power but from our union with you. Help us to praise you each day through our acts of service to one another. Amen.

Jesus Washes His Disciples' Feet


It was now the day before the Passover Festival. Jesus knew that the hour had come for him to leave this world and go to the Father. He had always loved those in the world who were his own, and he loved them to the very end. Jesus and his disciples were at supper. The Devil had already put into the heart of Judas, the son of Simon Iscariot, the thought of betraying Jesus. Jesus knew that the Father had given him complete power; he knew that he had come from God and was going to God. So he rose from the table, took off his outer garment, and tied a towel around his waist. Then he poured some water into a washbasin and began to wash the disciples' feet and dry them with the towel around his waist. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Are you going to wash my feet, Lord?" Jesus answered him, "You do not understand now what I am doing, but you will understand later." Peter declared, "Never at any time will you wash my feet!" If I do not let me wash your feet," Jesus answered, "You will no longer be my disciple." Simon Peter answered, "Lord do not wash only my feet, then! Wash my hands and head, too!" Jesus said, "Those who have taken a bath are completely clean and do not have to wash themselves, except for their feet. All of you are clean - all except one." Jesus already knew who was going to betray him; that is why he said, "All of you, except one, are clean." After Jesus had washed their feet, he put his outer garment back on and returned to his place at the table. "Do you understand what I have just done to you?" he asked. "You call me teacher and Lord, and it is right that you do so, because that is what I am. I, your Lord and Teacher, has just washed your feet. You, then, should wash one another's feet. I have set an example for you, so that you will do just what I have done for you. (John 13, 1-15)

Reflection

Speak with the children about the Jewish Passover and what is celebrated there. How is that meal similar to our Mass? Have they heard sometimes "Lamb of God?" Who is being talked about? Tell the children the story of the Exodus12, 1-8, 11-14. How is Jesus the "Lamb of God" for us? Why? Jesus' generosity in giving his own Body and Blood challenges us to give of ourselves to others. The Eucharist invites us to commit to serve others, to share and to give our own lives, like Jesus. How can you offer your service to others? How do you react when Jesus wants to wash your feet? Are you embarrassed? Share.

Activity

Dramatize the Last Supper. Dress 12 children as the Apostles and prepare the supper as Jesus did with his disciples. In our web page you can find more information in the file for Lent. You can use these readings: Exodus12, 1-8,11-14; washing of the feet John 13, 1-15; and the Last Supper 1 Corinthians 11,23-26.



Prayer

Lord, by the Eucharist, the gift of yourself, by your body given to us and your blood poured out for us, you have remained with us forever. We give you thanks, Lord and pray that your nourishment may always strengthen us so that we, too, will reach out to share with and serve one another. Amen.

Friends of Jesus and Mary Easter Sunday April 20, 2014

Readings: Acts 10, 34a 37-43; Psalm 117 Colossians 3, 1-4; John 20, 1-9

Early on Sunday morning, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb and saw that the stone had been taken away from the entrance. She went running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, whom Jesus loved, and told them, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they have put him!" Then Peter and the other disciple went to the tomb. The two of them were running, but the other disciple ran faster than Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent over and saw the linen cloths, but he did not go in. Behind him came Simon Peter, and he went straight into the tomb. He saw the linen cloths lying there and the cloth which had been around Jesus' head. It was not lying with the linen cloths but was rolled up by itself. Then the other disciple, who had reached the tomb first, also went in; he saw and believed. (They still did not understand the scripture which said that he must rise from death.) (John 20, 1-9)

Reflection

Jesus' resurrection was not a return to earthly life as it was the case of the resurrections he had performed before Easter (Jairus' daughter, the son of the Naim widow, Lazarus). These facts were miraculous events, but the affected persons would have to return to their ordinary life. At a certain point, they would die again. The Resurrection of Jesus is essentially different. In his resurrected body he goes from the state of death to a life beyond time and space. (Catechism of the Catholic Church, #646) Jesus' disciples did not understand what had to happen according to scripture. What are some of the prevalent attitudes toward death in your families? Do they treat death as the end of everything? Have they ever seen a death in their family? How did they feel? Do they think that person is still near them in some way?

Activity

Read the gospel with the children. Ask them to imagine the scene. Who is the young man that is at the tomb waiting for the women? Why would the women go by themselves to the tomb? Where was everyone else? Give them a blank piece of paper and ask them to write down a person that is suffering because of violence, poverty or sickness. Jesus is still suffering for them. Write down how you can help him. Let this be your weekly commitment.

Prayer

Lord, today we celebrate your Resurrection with great joy. May our gatherings always be full of joy because we have faith and the hope that, as you have conquered death, we, too, will rise with you. Amen.





Friends of Jesus and Mary

Second Sunday of Easter April 27, 2014

Readings: Acts 2, 42-47; Psalm 117; 1 Peter 1, 3-9; John 20, 19-31

Jesus Appears to His Disciples/Mercy Sunday

It was late that Sunday evening, and the disciples were gathered together behind locked doors, because they were afraid of the Jewish authorities. Then Jesus came and stood among them. "Peace be with you," he said. After saying this, he showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy at seeing the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father sent me, so I send you." Then he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive people's sins, they are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven." One of the twelve disciples, Thomas (called the twin), was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord!" Thomas said to them, "Unless I see the scars of the nails in his hands and put my finger on those scars and my hand in his side, I will not believe." A week later the disciples were together again indoors, and Thomas was with them. The doors were locked, but Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here, and look at my hands; then reach out your hand and put it in my side. Stop your doubting, and believe!" Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Do you believe because you see me? How happy are those believe without seeing me!" In his disciples' presence Jesus performed many others miracles which are not written down in this book. But these have been written in order that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through your faith in him you may have life. (John 20, 19-31)

Reflection


To doubt is not strange. It is the Lord himself, however, who gives us peace and communicates with us through the witnessing of others. At the same time, we are entrusted with sharing everything with others. In the same way Jesus showed his wounds to Thomas, we show others we are the friends of Jesus through the works we do with our hands, our feet and our heart. Who do they listen to and believe? Who do they trust? What are they afraid of? Is there peace in their homes and community? Share.

Activity

Let the children draw their hands, feet, and heart. Ask them to write in them what they are planning to do with their hands, their feet and heart this week in order to show that he or she is a friend of Jesus. Example: House chores, homework, visiting someone who is sick, forgiving, telling someone they love them. Share what each one will do.

Prayer




Holy Order: Laying on of hands-Commissions service



On Easter Sunday 1331, in the small town of Blanot, France, the Church was filled with people who had come to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection. The Mass was celebrated by the Vicar of Blanot, Fr. Hugues de la Baum. At the moment of Communion, one of the last to come to receive was Mrs. Jaquette. When the priest had finished giving Communion, he went back up towards the altar and in that moment the two assistants saw the Host that had been received by Mrs. Jaquette fall onto the cloth. She did not realize what had happened, but one of the men went immediately to tell Fr. Hugues. Fr. Hugues was well aware of the fact that even the smallest particle was Jesus and hurried to go and consume it.

All of a sudden the Host on the cloth disappeared, leaving behind a drop of blood the same size as the Host. Fr. Hugues took the cloth into the sacristy and tried to wash it off with water, but instead of fading...the stain became redder and bigger! The priest could do nothing more than admit the truth. The invisible God had made Himself visible to increase the faith of the people. He cut off the part of the cloth with the red stain and went back in the church. Then, trembling, he showed it to everyone saying, "Here is the Most Precious Blood of Our Lord Jesus Christ."
