- Academic Integrity and Responsibility Please review Elig Calendar

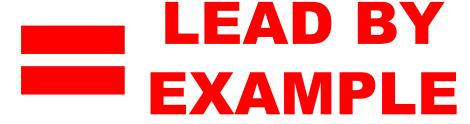

ELIGIBILITY BASICS

The Four Questions of the Extracurricular Participant

Did I fail any classes for the six weeks?

Answer: No. Then student can continue to participate.

Yes. Then go to question #2.

2. When do I become ineligible?

Answer: The failing student becomes ineligible at the end of the

school day, seven calendar days from the day the six

weeks ended.

3. What do I have to do to become eligible?

Answer: The ineligible student must be passing all classes on the

day ending the three week period (snapshot date) or the

six week grading period.

4. When would I be eligible?

Answer: If student is passing all classes on the specified mid

six weeks date or the end of six week grading period,

then that student becomes eligible seven calendar days

from that date.

Friday 9-19 Evaluate all students (UIL 6 week eligibility check)

Friday 9-26 Students gain or lose eligibility (End of school day)

Friday 10-10 Re-evaluate all students (3 week progress report)

Friday 10-17 Students may regain eligibility (End of school day)

Friday 11-7 Evaluate all students (2nd - 6 week eligibility check)

Friday 11-14 Students gain or lose eligibility (End of school day)

THANKSGIVING BREAK All students are academically eligible

Friday 12-5 Re-evaluate failing students (3 week progress report)

Friday 12-12 Students may regain eligibility (End of school day)

Friday 12-19 Evaluate all students (3rd - 6 week eligibility check)

WINTER BREAK All students are academically eligible

Tuesday 1-13 Students gain or lose eligibility (End of school day)

Monday 1-26 Re-evaluate failing students (3 week progress report)

Monday 2-2 Students may regain eligibility (End of school day)

Friday 2-20 Evaluate all students (4th - 6 week eligibility check)

Friday 2-27 Students gain or lose eligibility (End of school day)

Thursday 3-12 Re-evaluate failing students (3 week progress report)

WAIVERS AND WAIVABLE COURSES

There are some **advanced courses** that qualify for waivers. Only 1 waiver per semester can be used for a course grade of 60-69 in one of these approved courses. Only 1 advanced course can be waived per six weeks.

MAJOR TEAM POLICIES

Absence notification – player responsibility to notify coach in advance

EXCUSED vs UNEXECUSED absences – must communicate reason for absence

UNEXCUSED ABSENCES MAY RESULT IN LOSS OF GAME TIME

Communication with Coaching Staff

Team Travel – Bus travel is required

Injuries/Sickness – still responsible to be in practice unless sickness or injury prevents attendance...consult training staff first BEFORE seeing doctor esp if injury occurs at school during practice or during a CPHS GAME

COMMUNICATION EXPECTATIONS

Parent/Coach Relationship: Parents and coaches alike must respect the educational role both play in the development of the affected player. Each party must understand that decisions will be made, first and foremost, for the benefit and the interests of the TEAM FIRST, and the individual second. By understanding and respecting this dynamic, team members will be better served through their experiences in athletics. Clear communication will enhance the positive experience that can be realized through athletic participation.

If you have a concern you wish to express with a coach, please follow the procedures below:

- Call or e-mail the coach requesting a time for a meeting.
- DO NOT attempt to confront the coach immediately following a game or practice. Confrontations such as these do not produce positive talk or meaningful dialogue. Wait until the following day to schedule a time to meet with the desired coach.
- 3. Strongly consider having your son advocate for himself before approaching the coach.

Communication you should expect from your son's coach

- Expectations and goals the coach has for your son as well as for the team/season
- Game schedule and Practice schedule for the year
- Information on basic team requirements, special equipment or changes to a scheduled event
- Procedures if your son is injured while participating
- Team rules, guidelines and consequences for team infractions when they occur
- Team selection process

COMMUNICATION EXPECTATIONS

Communications coaches should expect from parents

- Concerns expressed directly to the coach at the appropriate time
- Advanced notification of any schedule conflicts in regard to team functions
- Advanced notifications of pertinent medical history prior to participation
- Advanced notification of a the need to miss a practice or game due to illness, injury or family matter

Appropriate concerns to discuss with coaches

- The coach's direct interaction with your son
- Ways to help your son improve athletic skills and to fulfill his role on the team
- Concerns about your son's interaction with others on the team or in school

Inappropriate concerns to discuss with coaches

Playing time for your son, strategies employed by coaches; issues with other team members

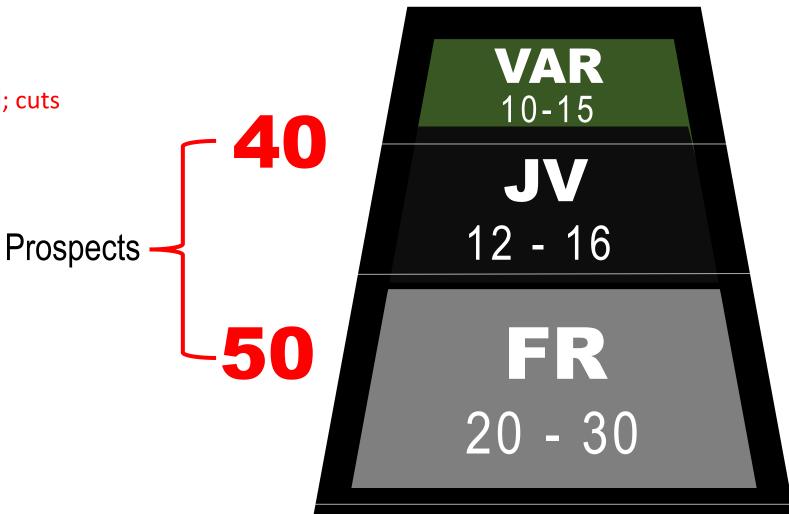
