Stacia and Brendan both agreed that being surrounded by family and friends was their favorite part not a difficult task considering they had a 24-member wedding partyl










HONOR THOSE WHO LOVE AND CARE ABOUT YOU



On your wedding day, people who surround you should be those you care about and trust. Bridesmaids and groomsmen serve this joyful purpose, so you and your spouse should invite only close relatives, best friends and faithful supporters.

In memory and photograph, these people will always be beside you on your special day. Ask people who you want to spend time with — not only at your wedding but in your future. A thoughtful bride and groom consider options and assets for possible attendants before they invite them to be part of their wedding.

Common sense lines up one to three attendants at a small, intimate wedding. A large, lavish or more formal affair will likely have more—up to 12 for each of you, provided they fit the purpose, site, camera lens and budget.

Most weddings have four to seven attendants. One groomsman per bridesmaid keeps symmetry at the altar and in photos, but there is no rule. Be certain that attendants feel comfortable with your choices for their pairings throughout the day.

Your wedding party can be easily chosen

in the case of a destination wedding: the attendants probably earn a spot at your side if they are willing to make a distant trip for you. If the officiant agrees, an attendant may be someone of the opposite sex.

Groomsmen or other men, as ushers, help seat family and friends, with specific ones honored to seat mothers of the bride and groom. A young family member or close family friend can be flower girl, ring bearer or train bearer, "Juniors" fall in the age gap between flower girl/ring bearer and bridesmaid/groomsman.

MAID OR MATRON OF HONOR

Whether already down the aisle (marron) or not (maid), an honor attendant should be someone dear to the bride's heart and on whom she can depend personally - perhaps a sister or a best friend - while planning and, just as importantly, on the wedding day,

BRIDESMAIDS/GROOMSMEN

A sister, brother, other family member or close friend of either bride or groom usually becomes a bridesmaid, groomsman or usher-They help with wedding errands. Bridesmaids (sometimes groomsmen, too) throw a bridal shower. All are key guests at pre-wedding events.

BEST MAN


The best man should be someone the groom trusts to help with his wedding details and who will also provide moral support during this wonderful, stressful time of his life. Often, the groom asks a brother, close relative or best friend to stand beside him and, literally, get him to the church on time.

FLOWER GIRLS

One or two flower girls, age 4 to 8, walk down the aisle alone or with a ring bearet. A shy flower girl may be paired with a more confident child. Family choice - or the officiant's guidelines - determine if a parent makes the entrance with his or her infant or very young child. As they walk down the aisle before the bride, flower girls may hold a ball of flowers on a tibbon, a basket of rose petals to scatter or baby roses to pass to guests.

RING BEARER

The ring bearer - a young boy of age 4 or 5 - walks down the aisle alone or with the flower girl(s). He carries a decorative pillow or box with real or arrificial rings attached with ribbon. To avoid misplacement, the best man may securely hold real ones. (B)

NOW WHAT?

Your wedding is one of the most complex events you, your spouse-to-be and your families may ever orchestrate. A solid plan moves the process forward so the anticipation is pleasant. This timeline and checklist help organize details from a chaotic start into the happiest celebration of your lives.

9-12 MONTHS

- Select a date and time for the wedding
- Arrange for parents to get together, perhaps at an engagement party or informally over dinner
- Begin to compile guest list
- Discuss budget with everyone who may contribute financially; establish priorities, including honeymoon
- Interview potential wedding planners
- Select officiant and visit with him or her to discuss wedding preparation and procedures

- Select catering service if not provided by reception site
- ☐ Visit www.stlouisbestbridal.com to announce - for free - your engagement online and in the local St. Louis Post-Dispatch
- Choose members of the wedding party
- Research legal rules for marriage license in location where you will wed and immediately add dates to implement them to calendar
- Narrow down ceremony and reception sites and book them (a popular location may book 18 months in advance or open



reservations only 12 months before date)

Close in on style, theme and colors

- Book photographer and videographer
- ☐ Book ceremony musicians and reception band or DJ
- Reserve party rental equipment (tables, chairs, tents, lighting)
- Shop for and order bridal gown and accessories
- Select florist



- ☐ Select bridesmaids' dresses
- Close in on final quest list, addresses
- Arrange wedding cake tastings, then order a favorite
- Research honeymoon spots and select travel agent
- Mail save-the-date cards, especially for destination or holiday wedding
- ☐ Make master to-do list; keep copies only with those who need to know
- Consider items for registry

Order wedding invitations, thankyou notes and personal stationery (earlier is better)



- Attend pre-wedding counseling as required or desired
- Reserve location of rehearsal dinner
- Arrange lodging for out-of-towners

- Select and order formalwear for men; schedule fittings
- Complete registry
- Reserve wedding-day transportation as needed: to the church, from church to reception, from reception to after-party or where you will spend your wedding night
- Meet with travel agent to plan honeymoon and make reservations
- Secure travel documentation: renew/get passports

- Finish addressing invitations
- Meet with caterer to discuss plans for food at the reception



- ☐ Complete honeymoon plans
- If not already noted on calendars, fill in time for securing marriage license (See 'Sign on the Dotted Line')
- Set time for any bridal photography beyond the wedding day
- Select and order wedding rings
- Set appointments with hairstylist/ makeup consultant for rehearsal and wedding day
- 5elect gifts for attendants
- Choose favors and guest book
- Complete cake order, if necessary
- Book room for wedding night

- Plan menus for rehearsal dinner
- Pick up wedding rings; arrange for engraving or check for accuracy
- Have final fitting of wedding gown. make alteration appointment
- Have run-through of bridal hair (with headpiece, if applicable) and makeup; experiment now, not later

- Check that bridesmaids have arranged fittings for their gowns, groomsmen for tuxedos and shoes
- Draw up seating plan for ceremony and reception
- Submit song lists to ceremony musician and reception band or DJ
- Finalize plans with every wedding vendor including photographer



- Select gifts for parents, attendants and each other
- Mail invitations six weeks before wedding, earlier if destination wedding or if many travel; design, test-drive map for out-of-towners
- Decide on insurance policies and name-change documents
- Write and order programs for ceremony
- Attend bridal shower(s)

□ Final gown alteration appointment: bring along maid of honor to learn to bustle it



- Prepare information to announce wedding after the big day at www.stlouisbestbridal.com
- Write vows, if desired; write toasts
- Review guest list and provide caterer with final counts
- Finalize seating arrangements
- Finish place cards for reception



- Provide rehearsal and wedding-day schedules to wedding party
- Arrange gift transport from reception
- Bride has last pre-wedding haircut and coloring
- Be certain names on photo IDs and/ or passports match honeymoon plane tickets/reservations
- Start packing for honeymoon, listing contents as you add items to suitcase
- Gather items for emergency kit
- D Everyone: Break in shoes

1 WEEK

- Send out all final payments possible, place fees still due in envelopes
- Delegate responsibilities for the wedding day to reliable helpers
- Finalize rehearsal and rehearsal dinner; confirm attending numbers
- Double-check details with vendors
- Confirm honeymoon details and finish packing
- Groom: Have hair trimmed
- Attend any remaining bachelor/ bachelorette party (hold earlier, if possible)
- Pass along any challenges that pop up at the last minute to those who can resolve them

1-2 DAYS

 Get massage, manicure, pedicure; purchase and pack extra nail polish in shade you are using for touch-up



- Pick up remaining rental attire
- Attend rehearsal and review all details with participants
- Enjoy rehearsal dinner, greet family and friends; present wedding party and parents with thank-you gifts
- Get a good night's sleep



YOUR BIG DAY

- Eat a healthy breakfast and drink lots of water to avoid dehydration from excitement.
- Try to take at least a little walk, play music or meditate to reduce stress.
- Double-check that you have all items you need, with backups just in case.
- Give groom's wedding band to maid of honor and bride's ring to best man.
- Write down and pass along any last-minute contingency plans that occur to you.
- Have hair and makeup done according to early plan.
- Make certain the best man and maid of honor sign the marriage license.

- Follow schedule written last month.
- Make extra time to get dressed.
- Set aside extra time for the unexpected.
- Allow 50 percent more time for travel.
- □ Take advantage of snacks and bottled water in the dressing area.
- Greet guests by name, be gracious and grateful.
- Smile and remain calm. Do not let anything slightly amiss interfere with your joy.
- Cherish each moment of this special day with your new life partner and those gathered to celebrate with you.
- If you leave early, say goodbye to parents and grandparents.

Planning a wedding can be tedious and overwhelming. The task of communicating all of your hard work and detailed plans to your guests is a big part of the stress. Before the digital age, mailing save-the-dates, creating excel spreadsheets and juggling RSVPs required the multitasking skill of a professional. If you are planning your wedding and wondering where to start — a wedding website, a bride and groom's ultimate planning and communication tool — just made your life a lot easier.



Once your website is created, list your URL on your save-thedates and invites so guests can quickly find your page. Upon searching your URL, guests will enter your awesome new website and find all the details of your big day. From your wedding party and travel information, things to do for out-of-towners to your registry; all the information is in one place. This allows you to easily ser expectations for the wedding and add in all those little details that either don't fit on your invite or seem odd to list. Examples can include: attire guidelines, cash har, a no-alcohol reception or your request for an unplugged wedding.

GUESTS GET TO KNOW YOU (AND YOUR FRIENDS) ON A MORE PERSONAL LEVEL

Wedding websites are a window to the bride and groom's person-

The process is not magical and heavenly intervention should not be expected. From start to finish, organization is imperative. A few management priorities help keep wedding planning in check and on schedule.

TAKE TIME TO THINK

Becoming married takes an "I do." No rule about who pays for what is set in stone. See our traditional lists on the next page to see where your wedding may adapt.

SIT DOWN AND DECIDE

Before setting plans in motion, decide who can pay for what. Whether a couple is established or starting out, financial priorities must be considered as the vision of the wedding unfolds. For smooth planning, there should be give-and-take plus thoughtful consideration in a discussion between a couple and all others who will contribute payment. Couples, particularly older brides and grooms, often pay a major part or all their wedding expenses. Parents may play a less traditional role by paying for an item like flowers or offering a specific amount toward a single or total bill.



MAKE A SPREADSHEET

Organize a spreadsheet with three expense columns: Estimated, Modified, and Actual. Color-code, divide and title it in any way that makes sense to you. Make a commitment to tracking expenses as you go so that if paperwork is misplaced, your budget will stay up-to-date. Use free online tools to create the spreadsheet.

LIST EVERY DETAIL

Not knowing what is due and when a bill should be paid disorganizes bride and groom and any other person responsible for making payments. Record each purchase. Note how it was bought - by check, credit or cash. Was it paid online? Extra columns show how much is due, by when and how you expect to pay. Immediately list an expense when incurred and paid even in part, filling in appropriate columns with details.

SAVE ALL RECEIPTS

Print out every receipt for the wedding and designate a large envelope to hold them. Knowing where each nickel and dime goes lets you envision the path your budget should follow. Reccipts avoid overlooked minor expenses. Even a few dollars misplaced here and there can overrun a careful budger.

LEGAL REQUIREMENTS TOP 'MUST DO' LIST



Before two people head to the ceremony and run off into matrimonial bliss, they must apply for a marriage license. A legitimate officiant will not marry a couple without one in hand. Rules vary between states, as marriage is considered a civil contract between a state and two people initiating it.

A marriage license should be secured based on where the wedding takes place, and not where the couple lives. If the ceremony destination is not Missouri or Illinois, the website usmarriagelaws.com can be consulted for any other state.

Marriage license requirements can change by state, even between counties, so it is MOST important to verify ALL information with the local marriage license office or county clerk where you will be married before making wedding or travel plans. Each county also directs its own schedule for a counthouse marriage by a judge-

GETTING MARRIED IN THE SHOW-ME STATE

The state of Missouri requires that both parties be single and not blood-related, 2018 legislation raised the minimum age of marriage to 16, and 16- and 17-year-olds must receive parental permission to be married. It also bars a person 21 or older from marrying anyone 18 or younger.

Before the ceremony, even on the same day, a couple must appear together at the recorder of deeds office in any Missouri county or the city of St. Louis. No blood test is required,

Each must show a valid form of governmentissued identification, such as a current passport, state ID or driver's license, which lists date of birth. Unless the Social Security number is on the ID, a Social Security card is also required in Missouri, A person without a Social Security number must sign a form of verification.

The marriage license is valid in any county, but only in Missouri. The ceremony must take place within 30 days of the license being issued. If an individual is divorced, a final decree must be at least 30 days before application, although some counties allow variations.

A cash-only, non-refundable charge of about \$50 must be paid with the application. For an extra fee, a certified certificate may be given as proof of marriage or as a keepsake.

NUPTIALS IN THE LAND OF LINCOLN

Getting married in Illinois differs on some details. A bride- or groom-to-be still needs to be single, not related and at least 18 years old. Sixteenand 17-year-olds must have parental consent. No one under the age of 16 can marry.

Like its neighbor to the west, Illinois requires a valid form of identification and proof of age for both parties, who must be present at the time of application - but only in the county where they will be married.

Also, a waiting period of 24 hours is required after application. The license, however, is valid for 60 days.

A certified decree of divorce, often within a recent rime frame, may be required. Date of divorce or when a spouse died also may be requested.

The fee for a marriage license varies by county. For example, Madison County requires a non-refundable cash fee of \$30.



WHO CAN OFFICIATE THE CEREMONY

Missouri and Illinois also differ in criteria for an officiant to fulfill these duties.

According to the law, marriage in Missouri may be performed by any clergyman, active or retired; a judge, municipal judge; a religious society, institution or organization when either party is a member. Paperwork must he returned within 15 days to the recorder issuing ir. In Illinois, an officiant may be an ordained minister, active or retired judge, or public official empowered to perform marriage. The signed license with information filled out should be returned to the recorder of deeds within 90 days of issuance.

If considering someone besides clergy or a public official to take charge, check with the county recorder of deeds where you will be married to assure authorization-for-a-day will be valid. (B)

The couple has said their I do's, and now it's time to celebrate with dancing and cake, of course! In the past, wedding cakes were pure white, simple and elegant, but wedding cakes have come a long way baby. Today, while couples are becoming more daring in wedding eake design, decoration and flavor, others have done away with all that pretty decor and just want to serve something a lot simpler - and even a little naked. Here are some of this year's wedding cake trends:

SIMPLE AND CLASSIC


Typically, wedding cakes are lavishly adorned with edible flowers, latticework, and beading and elaborate sugar decorations, but Danielle Rothweiler of Rothweiler Event Design in Verona, New Jersey, says that couples have now asked for wedding cakes that are simple, yet classic. "I am getting requests for cakes that aren't "too much" and that are just decorated with fresh flowers instead of sugary designs," she says.

GOLD CAKES

Wedding cakes are worth much more these days because couples are opting for lavish gold touches. "There must be at least one wedding cake a week that wants a gold accent, whether it's an edible 24-karat gold leaf applied to the cake, a solid tier that's decorated in edible gold. or even a gold cake topper," she says. "It goes with every color and adds a bit of elegance to cakes that are more simplified in design."

NAKED CAKES

Say what? No, this is not a wedding cake trend that will make the guests blush. Instead, naked cakes are cakes that are decorated with just a thin coat of buttercream on the outside of the cake, so you can see exactly what you're eating. "It's more of a rustic trend," says Bunce. who thinks that this trend will also die out way before the gold trend will. "The couple typically

puts fresh flowers on the outside of the cake too to make it look a little more sophisticated."

DARING FLAVORS

Wedding cakes aren't just about what they look like, they are about what they taste like 100. With tiered wedding cakes, Bunce says that couples are including traditional flavors, such as vanilla and chocolate, in some layers, and more daring flavors on others, "On the smaller tier, they want something funkier, like carrot cake with salted caramel burtercream, or chocolate cake with Oreo buttercream," she says.

WEDDING CAKE ALTERNATIVES

"More couples are going non-traditional, but they are all reluctant to totally dirch the idea of a wedding cake," says Rothweller. "I've seen alternatives, like cake pops and mini desserts, but over the past year those frems have now been served in addition to a traditional wedding cake." (6)

5 MIRRORED SHAPES TO FIT ANY FIGURE



HOURGLASS

A defined waistline sits between hips and shoulders similar in size. This figure indulges easy enhancement. All necklines seem to work. Glamorize an indented waist and let natural curves contour this figure-hugging silhouette. A mermaid gown delights in the line, a sheath accents it, a cinched waistline on a ball gown pours into double (or triple) layering of fluffy tulle, crinoline or the like, and a low-flaring style guides an elongated central line. The drop waist features a bodice that firs to the mid hip.

PEAR

Hips, and perhaps thighs, are wider than shoulders. Simple vertical, rather than horizontal, lines evenly shape curves. An off-the shoulder or "V" neckline frames the face, An A-line gown highlights an indented natural waist so an added detail, such as studded waistband or flowing sash, accents the top and lets the skirt flow gracefully. A trumper gown is fitted throughout the bodice and the volume begins at mid-thigh.



APPLE

Slimmer thighs counter a fuller chest, broader shoulders and less defined waist. The waistline, wherever drawn, grabs the eye. An empire waist cases lower flow, but a cinched waist slenderizes the silhouette to balance proportion. With or without sheer illusion, a deeply plunging neckline draws attention away from wide horizontal shoulders to flatter the bustline. A wide ribbon, slightly dropped waist, asymmetrical pleating or ruching focuses waistline interest.



RECTANGLE

Straight line extends from shoulders to waist to hips. Exult in a long, lean line or create geometric roundness with an A-line, frothy and flirtatious skirt or elevated empire waist for more skirt flow. Off-the-shoulder styles widen a top tier. Illusion pieces of embroidered lace play peckaboo with what may or may not hide under sheer fabric. A nipped waist artistically balances high and low canvases. New curves flow with soft, breezy fabric. A slit elongates a tall bride's legs and contrasting sash trims a wide middle.



INVERTED TRIANGLE

Shoulders are wider than hips. A scoop neckline ourlines a lovely neck. Off-shoulder draping minimizes a generous bustline. Popular modesty and illusion pieces balance a slim bodice to move the eye down along neck-to-knee embellishment. A ball gown with a full skirr encourages flow, but a confident bride's short gown or high-low skirt exudes fun with alluring attention to shapely legs and spectacular shoes. 15

Combinations Classic suit, shirt and tie

When it comes to formalwear, a suit can feel like a uniform—but it doesn't have to. The elements of the outfit can be enhanced in order to achieve a more personalized look.

SHIRT AND TIE COMBOS

It is a best practice to keep a set of traditional colored shirts in your closer at all times. White, light blue and pale pink pair well with almost all ties. But if you are feeling a unique look, patterned shirts are a great option. Our recommendation is to stick to traditional patterns, though, as there is a fine line between stylish and tacky.

When working with a tan suit and blue shirt, it is best to keep it as simple as possible. Tie Tip: Navy ties are the best recommendation, but if you want to jazz it up, consider a textured tie with traditional colors.

PINK SHIRTS NAVY SUIT

With pink shirts, navy suits are the favorable option. They match together perfectly, especially when the shirt is a lighter shade of pink. **Tie Tip:** The safest bet is to roll with a navy tie, but go with a knit one to add some dimension to the overall look.

GREY SUIT

Pink and grey play well off of each other, but to truly bring out the combination, you'll want to pair with a maroon tie, or even a deep violet.

TAN SUIT

This suit and shirt combination should be reserved only for warmer weather events. **Tie Tip:** The warm tones allow for dark brown and navy tie choices.



THE ERA OF MATCHING DRESSES IS BECOMING A THING OF THE PAST

NEW YORK — Alison Kelly felt she had enough on her plate dealing with her own wedding gown and all the details of her mountain getaway nuprials without micromanaging how her bridal party would dress.

So instead, she asked her maid of honor her sister — and the test of her bridal party to choose natural tones to honor the informal Vail, Colorado, location that she and her husband had picked for their Sept. 2 nuptials, and to wear styles that made them feel good.

"I'm surrounded by women who make their own decisions and are strong and independent. There's no way I could tell any of them what to weat. It just wouldn't even work," Kelly laughed. "I know that they know their own bodies."

She was thrilled with the results, a soft mix of rose blush, light red, ivory and taupe that proved the perfect complement to her own white gown. The bridesmaids wore matching rings of flowers on their heads. The groom's parry was also not matchy-marchy. He wore light gray, his best man was in black and the other groomsmen were in darker gray, Identical boutonnieres tied their looks together.

While brides have been giving their stand-up loved ones greater freedom from the constraints of more traditional — often hideous — matching confections, they now seem to be taking the mismatch bridesmaid trend a step further. Matching colors in different silhouettes or identical dye lots for different styles of dresses have given way to completely different curs, textures and colors.

"They did so well," said Kelly, who lives in Colorado Springs, Colorado, and works as a librarian. "They kept showing me the pictures of what they were thinking, I thought that was really nice because I was just too busy doing my own thing and planning my own sruff. I trusted them, and it ended up being much better than I imagined."

The trend is well represented on the retail side. David's Bridal, with more than 330 stores in the United States, Canada, Mexico and the United Kingdom, has an online section of mismatched bridesmaids options with advice on how to make the concept work, from using the same color in different styles to choosing wildly different fabries, lengths, silhouettes, colors, prints and embellishments.

One suggestion from the company: Select different shades of the same color, but include light, medium and dark shades to allow for an ombre gradation. For large wedding patries, mix in some pale neutrals that will offset the overall palette.

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



Here's to a good TOAST

Whether you are the maid of honor, the best man or the father of the bride, a wedding toast is a gift and a love letter to the special people celebrating their special day. A good toast can make people laugh. It can make people cry. Most importantly, a good toast will bring the attendees together to celebrate the bride and groom, and to create a cherished memory for the happy couple to look back on. While that may seem like a daunting task, it gets easier with the help of the rips below.

GATHER YOUR THOUGHTS

Before you get up to the microphone, have a plan of what you want to say. Rambling will lose the audience's attention. In weeks prior to the wedding, make a bullet point list of what you want to say or stories you want to tell. Having this list in mind

while you present will allow the words to flow and make sense, as well as keeping the attendees engaged. However, ensure that it's only a list of topics: reading from a written script will kill the emotion and energy of the room. Have a plan but let the words come from the heart.

BE PERSONAL

An audience loves stories. Think about sharing some light-hearted or meaningful moments you've spent with the bride or groom; this can be a good way to start out the toast. While inside jokes may lose or confuse attendees, they will likely love to hear stories of the first time you met or how you helped the groom ask

the bride out on a first date. Avoid inappropriate or embarrassing stories. Don't he afraid to be sappy - there's no such thing as being too sentimental at a wedding - and let your toastee know how much you care for them.

WISH THEM WELL

End your toast with kindness and well-wishing and relay to the audience your hopes for future prosperity. Then raise your glass and take the sip. **(B)**

A RECEPTION FOR THE MODERN ERA

Modern couples are taking a holistic approach to wedding planning. Even as they tailor details to reflect their personal taste and style, they are also thinking globally. Sustainability is now a major consideration, one that many St. Louis catering companies recognize by minimizing waste and using locally sourced ingredients. Butler's Pantry calls their approach Seat to Savor. "We strive to use every part of the plant, produce and protein," says chef Vince Bommarito Ir., the chief culinary officer at Butler's Pantry. "The trick is to not only use it in familiar ways but also unexpected ways. For instance, we like to use leftover basil, introduce agar-agar and voita! We've created basil 'caviar' to top hors d'ocuvres or add an herbaceous flair to the cocktail menu."

An open bar is one tradition that has remained a constant, but over time their choices have broadened. Offering more than just soda and water for non-drinkers (or guests who might want to take a break) is a thoughtful touch and a chance to get creative. Pressed juices provide a healthy, refreshing option, as do mocktails made with fresh fruit purees, like



mango mules or watermelon margs. "We know our clients are looking for unique, Instagramworthy food-and-drink experiences, therefore, we consistently try to push the envelope with



the ingredients we choose and how we present them," chef Bommarito says.

Another way to reduce a reception's earbon footprint? Drink locally, The St. Louis area has no shortage of breweries and wineries, and weddings are fantastic opportunities to give out-of- towners a taste of what makes St. Louis special. Markets and liquor stotes all over the city offer kegs from the region's most popular microbreweries including Schlafly. 4 Hands, Urban Chestnut, Old Bakery and dozens more, Also, consider using real stemware and eliminating single-use plastic straws and swizzle sticks—they will not be missed.

Guests who have a sweet tooth and a penchant for the unexpected will love a dessert bar or a milksbake station that offers traditional and boozy shakes. Strange Donuts owner Jason Bockman says that it caters to couples who want something a little bit different for their reception—in this case, doughnuts as an alternative to cake—while still referencing classic wedding

traditions. "Wedding cake and strawberries and champagne flavors are always popular, but being from St. Louis, our goocy butter cake doughnut is always on the menu," he says.



Receptions tend to get more laid-back as they progress, and the food should loosen up right along with it. If dinner was the time to use the correct fork for salad, late night is the time to do away with utensils entirely: Bringing in finger foods like pizza, bot dogs, sliders, pretzels and toasted ravioli is a surefire way to keep the party — and the guests — going into the wee hours.



The pros and cons of 6 catering styles

Here are six catering styles and the advantages and disadvantages of each.

PLATED SIT-DOWN

Pros: A classic and elegant way to serve guests, seated dinners are also a great time for the wedding party to give toasts or for the couple to have their first dance.

Cons: Guests can only choose from a couple of options, which could be problematic for those with allergies or restricrive diets.

Sample menu: Butternut squash soup - Roasted fingerling potatoes - Chicken marsala

SERVED BUFFET

Pros: Buffets are the more casual and often more affordable choices. These feasts are great for large receptions. They bring plenty of options and guests can enjoy second helpings.

Cons: Buffet-style dinners can take a long time, and some guests may not enjoy waiting in line or serving themselves.

Sample menu: Bread basker — Garden salad — Pasta Alfredo - Pork tenderloin

FOOD STATIONS

Pros: Fun and creative, a variety of themed food stations let the couple share a range of their favorite foods with guests. Plus, people are free to grab a bite whenever they like.

Cons: Labor-wise, food stations can be expensive if certain dishes are cooked to order (like pasta) or need to be carved (like prime rib). The stations also take up a lot of floor space.

Sample menu: Charcuterie — Flatbreads — Sushi — Raw bar - Barbeene

FAMILY STYLE

Pros: This way of eating brings an ease and familiarity and it encourages guests to interact with one another.

Cons: Family-style meals often require large serving dishes and appropriately sized tables to accommodate them - both of which could bring added expense.

Sample menu: Couscous — Brussels sprouts — Beef tenderloin

SMALL BITES/HORS D'OEUVRES

Pros: Opting for an assortment of small bires rather than a full meal creates a fun, cocktail-party vibe.

Cons: Some guests may be disappointed or confused about not eating a traditional multicourse dinner.

Sample menu: Bruschetta - Meatballs - Stuffed mushrooms - Bacon-wrapped dates - Mini lobster rolls

FOOD TRUCKS

Pros: Wedding food served from trucks turns tradition on its head. Possible options include just about every kind of cuisine, and guests can hop in line whenever they're ready to eat.

Cons: Bad weather could complicate things. Food trucks' casual nature is part of their charm, but that doesn't necessarily make them less expensive.

Sample menu: Pizza truck — Taco truck — Slider truck (1)



- E. What kind of destination should we choose? What fits the two of you? Plan like it will be a vacation-for-two.




