RE: College Park, Georgia's Response to Mayor Motley Broom's Open Meetings Act Complaint

Ms. Settlemire:

As you know, Denmark Ashby LLC ("Denmark Ashby") represents the City of College Park, Georgia ("College Park" or "City"). Denmark Ashby received correspondence, dated April 3, 2024 ("Letter"), wherein the Office of the Attorney General requested that the City respond to an Open Meetings Act Complaint from Mayor Bianca Motley Broom ("Motley Broom") concerning allegations regarding the addition of items to the agenda on January 2, 2024, January 16, 2024, and March 4, 2024 (collectively "Council Meetings") and issues concerning quorum at a town hall meeting on March 21, 2024 ("Town Hall Meeting"). Please consider this correspondence as the City's response concerning those allegations.

Georgia's Open Meetings Act ("Act") provides that, if necessary, cities can add items not included on the published agenda. O.C.G.A. § 50-14-1(e)(1). In this regard, the purpose of the Act is to protect the public from "closed door" politics, as well as the potential abuse of individuals and the misuse of power such policies entail. College Park v. Martin, 304 Ga. 488, 489, 818 S.E.2d 620 (2018). Ultimately, what constitutes "necessity" is a discretionary act requiring local bodies to exercise reasonable judgment to control the content of agendas to conduct important public matters. Williams v. DeKalb Cnty., 308 Ga. 265, 840 S.E.2d 423(2020). The City's elected officials exercised reasonable judgment concerning the content of the City's agenda at each meeting and it would be improper to substitute another's judgment in the place of the local elected body.

The City properly noticed and held open meetings at each of the Council Meetings mentioned by Motley Broom in her complaint. At the start of each meeting, under Item No. 2 of the posted agendas, a councilmember moved to add certain items to the agendas.¹

Specifically, for the January 2, 2024 meeting, Councilman Carn sought to add an item to the agenda, which was an ordinance on "Administration Guidelines and Policies" ("Ordinance"). After a motion was made and seconded, the City Council unanimously voted to add the Ordinance to the agenda for the meeting. <u>Id</u>. Thereafter, the City Clerk announced the Ordinance for consideration and the City Council held discussion on the same, however, no action was taken. Rather, the matter was placed on the January 16, 2024 agenda and publicly noticed prior to the meeting held on January 16, 2024. At the January 16, 2024 meeting, the City Council voted to approve the measure. <u>Id</u>.

Likewise for the January 16, 2024 and March 4, 2024 meetings, the City Council voted and approved the adding of discussion on an intergovernmental agreement ("IGA") with MARTA for the Flint River Project.⁴ At the January 16, 2024 meeting, a motion was made and carried that withdrew the IGA for the Flint River Project.⁵ Later at the March 4, 2024 meeting, the City Council moved to reconsider the IGA and subsequently voted to approve the same.⁶

As authorized by the Act, the City determined that it was necessary and in the interest of the public to address and hear each item at the respective Council Meetings. To hear those items and avoid any "closed door" politics, the City exercised its broad discretion to add the items to each agenda. In this regard, the Ordinance was discussed at two separate meetings and was on the publicly available agenda prior to the City Council Meeting in which the Ordinance was voted on and approved. Regarding the IGA with MARTA concerning the Flint River Project, it required the City's attention to ensure the contract would take effect timely. With respect to each item mentioned above, the City only became aware of certain facts and information after the agenda was published.

Adding items to the agenda on the day of public meetings is a routine and ubiquitous act done by the hundreds of cities, counties, authorities, and other public boards throughout the State of Georgia. The Act requires certain conduct by those who it applies to, however, the spirit of the Act is to avoid closed door meetings so the public will be aware of decisions made on their behalf by their elected and/or public officials. Here, the meetings were properly noticed to the public and the decision to add items to the agendas was conducted openly before the public in the meetings.

Turning now to the Town Hall Meeting for Ward 4 ("Town Hall Meeting") that occurred on March 21, 2024; the City's position is that notice was given to the public. City officials gave the information to the City's media department and notice was published

through various media platforms, including the City's main website and Facebook. Additionally, while a quorum may have been present at the Town Hall Meeting, the intent of the meeting was to present to the public the newly elected City officials, to provide updates on certain matters, and to listen to questions from the public. The City fully appreciates and always aims to adhere to the Act's literal tenets, and in this instance, the City substantially complied with the Act as the public was not prejudiced by any potential unintentional deviation. The distinction between the way the City actually advertised the meeting and the way the act requires advertising is a specious, technical distinction that elevates form over substance. Indeed, from a factual perspective, the public had every bit as much notice as it would have if the City had advertised the meeting in the particular manner prescribed by the Act. Therefore, the facts do not support a finding of a violation.

The City's actions also demonstrate that the City acted in good faith and consistently with the open government policies that animate the Act. In summary, the intent of this Town Hall Meeting was not to conduct any official business, nor was any official action taken. The City advertised the Town Hall Meeting to the public, it was open to the public, and the public appeared and attended the meeting.

I am Demetrius Taylor, a 15year resident of the Embarcadero Club Apartments in Ward 1, and you will always hear me say, "Honey, I'm not the voice of the people, I am the people." What an interesting election season we had. The ancestors are dancing in jubilee as we are still creating history and showing that our excellence is being highlighted. For the first time in the 128-year history of this city, we are governed by an all-African American elected body. In addition to our city manager, our city attorney, our city clerk, HR Director, Police, and Fire Chiefs are all African American. Now, these are my concerns. It's time that we see Councilman Roderick Gay as the Mayor Pro Tem, as it has been approved to go in numerical order. With this suggestion, that newly elected officials serve one year before giving this honor, placing Councilman Gay in this position would definitely put that in rotation. Now, some time ago, the citizens inquired about the Mayor and Council developing a system and responding to the concerns raised in the communications portion of a council meeting. I want to say thank you for the wonderful work with the street repairs and repavement. I do hope that we have West Point Street on that list. The area between Lee Street and Best Road definitely needs to be repaired and the yellow lines done. I recently watched our public works department take care of the landscaping, and it looks incredible. Thank you, guys. We do see you.

Tina Hill said, Good evening, congratulation, Happy New Year and a special congratulations to our two new Councilwomen. History is made. My name is Tina Hill, I live on Parkview Drive and please repave Parkview Drive. We talked about that at Nasuom with the previous council person and we have some trees that need to be taken down, so please look at Parkview Drive. My communication rally has to do with the Citizen's remark time. I usually watch online, but this year I'm gonna be attending. No answers, you know, never come out of it. And if they are, where do they go. I really urge the council to please, please, please, when you get these concerns, please appoint either you or a department head for action. But once action is taken, can it be communicated back to the citizen, but can we add a tab to the website, which needs updating anyway, for citizen remarks and results? Because if I have a concerns chances are 20 over people or plus. Really, communication would improve. Also, the website, I'd also like to see a tab for emergency and after-hour contacts, contact people and numbers because when you have an emergency, you really have to search to find a number and half of the time when you call the number, nothing happens. So, it needs to be updated with something that's current. I thinks all I have. Thank you.

<u>Coach German</u> said, Happy New Year, congratulations to our new Council people. I'd like to defer my three minutes just to see what happens after this current meeting. Thank you.

Stanley Muhammad said, Thank you Miss Ames, we seek refuge in God from the cursed Satan, in the most holy name of God, the beneficent, the most merciful. Greetings, Mayor and council officials. I also want to lift my voice with the chorus of those congratulating the Mayor on being re-elected and also the council who fought so hard for the seats they sit in to represent your constituents. I would say I thank God for what I see on the mayor and council seats. I think we have a chance to address the most neglected part of our city – and that's the poor and the destitute. And that's our Black community, that has been grossly underserved and neglected for so many years. As I grew up in College Park, attended Brookville Elementary, as did my wife who grew up here. You have one person hiring a law firm that doesn't represent our community. It was voted in illegally and unlawfully. I'm not saying it's good, bad, or ugly; I'm saying I've just never seen it before. You all have taken on a job, do that job to the best of your ability. Let bygones be buried in the womb of time, move forward, and respect each other. Ms. Betsy Eastman, 1833 Rugby Avenue, College Park, Ga., came forward and said I want to echo Millie Gosh's comments about thanking you for your work, because two of you are just starting this process of taking on the challenges of running this City. It will take a lot of effort to be involved and to be responsive to us as citizens, and we certainly do appreciate that when we hear back from you.

Ms. Eastman said I am speaking in opposition to the Ordinance to Amend the parliamentary procedure that was raised on January 2, 2024. In that meeting I don't understand. We've been running our meetings here in College Park for years with having a Mayor running them, and I don't understand why you feel the need to change that process. Our Mayor does follow procedure. She tries to move it along efficiently. She is polite. She is fair. And yet, many times she has over spoken as she is trying to administer the meeting in a proper and correct way.

Ms. Eastman said there seems to be petty politics. We have a lot of things going on, a lot of questions about how we're spending our money. But tonight, my concern is how we are treating each other on this council with respect. And I ask for you to change your minds on this Ordinance and to think about what all of us want as citizens in this city. Thank you.

Ms. Tina Hill, 3515 Parkview Drive, College Park, Ga., came forward and said I am going to start off with the trees. Unfortunately, last week we had a gentleman from Jonesboro die when a tree fell on him when he drove to work. We have so many dead trees that the City owns, and they are very tall with a lot of dead weeds all over them. When they do fall, who is going to get killed or lose a home? I spoke to my Councilperson McKenzie and gave her two examples within three blocks of my home. I don't know if it is a line item in the budget. I don't know which department is in charge of that, or if that is something the City has.

Ms. Hill said the second thing is communication. Quality and clarity is so needed. At the first of the year I came to a personal Swearing-In, and the flyer had the wrong date. There were people who didn't even come because the wrong date was on the flyer. We need a calendar where people can participate in our community. Push Push had an opening; where was that advertised? The police had coffee with citizens. I saw pictures. But unless you hit Facebook at the right time, you're missing out. What about people who don't have the internet? Understand that not everybody has the same access or the same abilities. We should not be advertising things only on Facebook. We used to do it in the utility bill.

Ms. Hill said lastly, I'm going to voice a concern that is probably going to divide a lot of people. I'm on the old mail list for our old, retired person Ambrose Clay. I love Ambrose. He served well. He is going to keep his "Clay On Council" website. And I replied to him immediately, because I think that is a disservice to new people coming into the community. He is not "Clay On Council", and I asked him, please change the name. We don't need to keep dividing people. Can I ask for someone's 30 seconds?

ACTION: Councilwoman Jamelle McKenzie moved to allow Ms. Hill more time to finish her comments, seconded by Councilman Carn and motion carried.

Councilman Joe Carn said we have never had to vote on this before. This is a perfect example of communication issues.

Ms. Hill continued. We have an election. It's done. We have to move forward. I know there are people upset about Robert's Rules and what happened. It is what it is. Mayor, you have a new website; mayorbianca.com. And my concern, I don't think we need a rehash of thoughts of a meeting. We need to help people. We have people with no heat. We have big concerns in our city. We have to put this petty crap aside. So, that's my concern. People are going to hate me if they want to. I don't really care at this point. This thing with 'Clay On Council"; stop. You're not on Council. Mayor, please, I know you're upset. Please, let's be fair on the website. I think we have to give Council some credit. They had a great first meeting. We're going to move this city forward. Thank you for the extra time.

And I ask that you consider this as part of your consideration of the change to parliamentary procedures. Thank you.

A. Motion to approve a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for a Type II Home Occupation for an arts and crafts studio at 1579 Vesta Avenue. Ward 1.

City Planner Deborah Rogoff-Ezra came forward and said I am putting before you consideration for a petition for a Conditional Use Permit for a Type II Home Occupation, which will be an arts and crafts studio. According to Division 4, Section 3.7 of the Code, a Conditional Use Permit is required for this type of use. There are no impacts to the community.

City Planner Deborah Rogoff-Ezra said the applicant is LaLisa Alita Anderson. She has been a resident for many years. She lives at 1579 Vesta Avenue. It is an R-3 Zone in Ward 1. She is proposing an addition on the second floor, which will be a 600 square foot studio, a covered porch which is 160-square feet, and a small extension to the main building. The total is 979-square feet. The additions will be considered as part of a building application. In your packet there are examples of her artwork. The setbacks and all the standards are met so no need for a variance.

City Planner Deborah Rogoff-Ezra said there are no employees. The applicant is hoping to have booths and sell her products online. There are 6 parking spaces in front of the unit. She will not be using any gas or Kil fire that would cause issues. The neighbors are in support of the arts studio. This is the applicant's retirement goal. The neighbors and the architect came to the Planning Commission meeting too. Staff's recommendation is for approval of this type of Conditional Use. (See City Planner's Report for further details).

Some of our apartments, as well as our motels, have lighting that is too dim. I want to go out one evening and identify some of the better lighting of other complexes. We want an assessment and have you come back and report to us. We want to set a standard for all apartments and motels to have decent adequate amount of lighting.

Councilwoman McKenzie agreed.

Councilwoman Arnold said we should do this study for safety and security for our residents.

Councilman Gay said at the BIDA meeting they talked about the mural under the bridge.
There are some GDOT lights that I recommend.

Director of Power Hugh Richardson said I can talk to you about that.

It was the consensus of Mayor & Council to move forward with drafting lighting standards for hotel and motel properties.

N. Motion to approve bi-monthly multifamily taskforce meetings.

Councilwoman McKenzie said I agree this needs to be done.

 Councilman Carn said this is a continuation City Manager of what we were doing before you got here. Myself and Councilwoman Arnold comprise of more than 85% of the multifamily apartment complexes in the city. This is one of the biggest fixes that will overall improve the quality of life in the city. We are going to crack down on this.

Councilwoman Arnold said I think everyone should enjoy where they live. We need to set some higher standards to support the quality of life for the residents in these apartments. I am looking forward to this committee to establish these standards and what our expectations are.

Councilman Gay said during this recent election, the apartment owners and managers need to be held accountable. Forty percent of the community is transit. It doesn't make sense to not participate for something that took us 100 years to have. Number two, we need to get our police more involved in the apartment communities. The community events are fine. I

want the officers back in the apartment communities. We used to do welfare checks and rent rolls. We need to know these communities and these people. This city is disconnected from its apartment communities.

Councilwoman McKenzie said I have no comment.

Councilman Carn said Councilman Gay is not lying. Top priority City Manager.

Councilwoman Arnold said I support both of those comments.

ACTION: Councilman Gay moved to approve multifamily apartment meetings for every two weeks, seconded by Councilwoman Arnold and motion carried.

O. Discussion of impact fees.

Councilman Carn said we need to establish some impact fees. Lots of other cities have it. These fees help provide expanded parks and recreation program funding, fire protection, and road improvements. We want to put together an Impact Fee Study. I know Mr. Robinson is familiar with it from DeKalb County. Folks, we have to step up to the plate. I want the residents to know that we are hitting the ground running. Councilwoman McKenzie said I would like to know exactly what we are going to be discussing on this.

 Councilman Carn said essentially this is a real estate purchase and sales contract that we executed December 7, 2023. This is with MARTA for a parcel of property up in the corner of the City of College Park. I had issues and concerns with purchasing this property from MARTA. MARTA definitely thought it was in their best interest for us to purchase this property, but I did not think it was in College Park's best interest to purchase the property.

Councilman Carn said this property has restrictions on it. Us buying it means that MARTA still has a say, in terms of the purposes of the land. And MARTA still has rights to that land, in terms of retention ponds and other things that they can do on the land. Our proposal was to build something permanent, but it's kind of hard to build something permanent when MARTA has an option to come in at any time they see fit.

Councilman Carn said the other issue I had was the location of this. Parks are great. Parks are great for communities. But there is a much greater need, because all of our residents do not have direct access to a full-size park, like the Old National/Godby Road Corridor. They deserve that access. And I'm going to try to make it my business to make sure that everyone gets equal treatment and equal level of services.

Councilman Carn said this is not a good deal for us. There is an out clause with this thing, in terms of us being the purchaser. We can give written notice that we are not interested.

And it is at our sole discretion. Again, it's not the worst project I've seen, but there is a higher and greater need, and a much better project that covers our citizens with equity. That

is my proposal for nullifying this contract. City Attorney, if there is a consensus, I want you to send notice to let them know; thanks but no thanks. And look somewhere else for a

community park.

Mayor Motley Broom said I think Finding the Flint Project is an incredibly important one for our community. And it has been one that has garnered community support since, I believe, 2018. And I understand and I concur with Councilman Carn that we have needs throughout this city for great green space. This location is one that is not dictated by us. It is where the head waters of the Flint are. And we have an outstanding opportunity to partner with the Atlanta Regional Commission, which has said that they are committed to try to fund this project to the tune of \$150 million throughout the entire network.

Mayor Motley Broom said we have an outstanding opportunity to partner with Aerotropolis/Clayton County. Because it is not just about a park, it's about the real issues about stormwater issues that we are facing, not only in College Park but downstream. And Clayton County is experiencing some of those challenges every single time we have these massive storms. And we know because of climate change, things are happening at a more frequent rate. We have a chance with Finding The Flint to help mitigate some of those issues downstream.

Mayor Motley Broom said so, it's not just about a park. It's about improving our entire environment. Clayton County Commissioners are on board. We have the Atlanta Regional Commission on board. We have a number of regional partners that are looking at this and want to support us every step of the way. The one key was; we had to own the land. And the Council said last year, yes, we want to own the land, and we want to move this project forward.

Mayor Motley Broom said so, I would urge my colleagues to support that vision because it is one that is in the best interest of the entire community. I recognize that it is not one that is in the Old National/Godby Road Corridor. I absolutely positively think that we should be working towards greater access to green space across this entire community. Bar none. I don't think that means that we abandon this project.

Councilwoman Arnold said I hear what both of my colleagues are saying in reference to yes, I support 100% on us advocating for a park on Goby Road. We need one. It's long overdue. And, any monies that we spend when it comes to extra green space, I'm pushing for a park on Godby Road. The families, the children that live on Godby Road, they need a place to go. They've needed a place to go for years.

Councilwoman Arnold said we complain about the activities that we don't want to see on Godby Road, but we don't give the children any type of an outlet. There are no recreational programs. There is no park. What else are they supposed to do? And I'm speaking from experience as a parent raising children living in an apartment complex.

Councilwoman Arnold said so, I understand the importance of us saving the environment. That's important, yes, because we want to leave something to our children. But right now, Godby Road is on fire. And we have to do something about it. And talk is cheap. And right now that is all that I am hearing right now. Parents are suffering. Children are going to jail because they don't have anything else to do but to get in trouble. So, I don't know that I'm necessarily for spending this money on Finding the Flint.

Councilman Carn said this alternative park does save the environment, as well. And I understand environmental issues, I understand we are dealing with climate change and all of that. I'm proposing some climate change along one of our most popular corridors. I'll make you all a deal. As soon as we establish a full-size community park within walking distance of all of our neighborhoods, then let's bring back up the Flint and take a look at that point. But right now I got thousands of children that can't get to a park. And this park is what we need in our community for peace of mind, time for reflection, and all of the other

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- benefits that our other neighbors enjoy and some of our neighbors on the south end of town
- do not enjoy; and we are going to seek partnerships with Aerotropolis, with Playful Cities
- 916 USA, and all the partnerships we've done with other parks and community projects so it's
- going to be a community park with community partners just like the rest of them. Even more
- so. I'm excited about it. This \$218,000.00 is going to a better use, not that the Flint is a bad
- use. We have to prioritize in this city, and that starts in 2024.

Mayor Pro Tem Roderick Gay said I would like to make a comment.

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Mayor Motley Broom said point of order.

City Manager Stanley Hawthorne said I am happy to report that we are now sending out the Strategic Performance Report. It is approximately 37 pages across the departments of activities going on over the last two weeks. We are sending it out to as many of our households as we can reach. That is it.

11. Report of Mayor & Council.

<u>Mayor Motley Broom</u> – said I want to share that I have been selected to the Board of Directors for the National League of Cities. I am very excited about the opportunity. And I have also been selected for one of the four board committees. I will be on the Board of the Legislative Action Committee, which is responsible for overseeing the implementation of the lobbying agenda, in partnership with the Executive Committee of the National League of Cities and the full board. The Legislative Action Committee also serves as a link between the NLC Federal Advocacy Committees and the Board of Directors.

Mayor Motley Broom said so, as we move forward with the things that are really important to us, but may not necessarily be within the purview of the State, we do have a voice. I am joining Councilmember Christina Hobbs from Union City; a Councilmember from Fairburn; and Councilmember Byron Ames from Atlanta. I am looking forward to that work.

Mayor Motley Broom said I have also spent time last week with the Georgia Municipal Association's EMS Task Force, which is diving into some of the issues we are seeing in our community regarding EMS issues and EMS issues across the state. Last week we met with the Georgia Department of Public Health to learn more about the rules and regulations surrounding EMS service and the various service areas. Senate Bill 16 is under consideration.

Mayor Motley Broom said last week I had the opportunity to go to the Georgia Chambers Eggs and Issues Breakfast, which is the unofficial kickoff to the legislative session. And there the Governor spoke and talked about his budget, which is proposed to include a doubling of local maintenance improvement grant funds, which is how we do a lot of our paving around here. So, there is never ever enough money to pave the roads. So, this is actually good news for communities across the state if this passes. There are some other things the Governor has his eyes on.

Mayor Motley Broom said I am looking forward next week to the Georgia Municipal
Association Cities United Conference. Cities from all across the state will be in
Atlanta to meet, confer, learn, train, and go to legislature and talk about the concerns
facing cities.

Mayor Motley Broom said I also wanted to thank Train Or Die and Jay Shoates (sp) and his team. They did a great Christmas Eve Toy Giveaway on the Old National Corridor. I had an opportunity to join them. They do this to make sure that children are blessed with toys in the extended stays. I want to thank our Fire and Police Departments for making a smooth morning of the whole thing. It was great. That's all I have.

<u>Councilwoman McKenzie</u> - said this is my 16th day for Public Service to the citizens of College Park. I begin my 16th day report with much sorrow. Our College Park Police Department suffered a great loss today. Sergeant Shakeya Walker was a dedicated member of our College Park PD. She had a heart of gold, and she was truly one of those persons who cared and served from the heart. My prayers and condolences are with the family and the loved ones in our PD. Gone too soon, but she will never be forgotten. I ask that you keep our PD in your prayers, because we are not okay.

Councilwoman McKenzie said on January 8, 2024, I joined the FHOAA Group, which is the original African-Americans who lived in the area which is now known as Six West. These are people who were displaced due to urban revitalization and airport expansion. With staff, we have established Price Barbershop. And the homes located next to it are historic landmarks. And we are working on the placement of historic marker throughout the Six West area.

Councilwoman McKenzie said I began meeting with this group shortly after Black History Month of last year realizing that it was impossible to find history on the black community here in the City of College Park, which has been in existence in this city ever since this city was Manchester in the 1890s. And so, I want to thank BIDA for removing this property from our Six West Sales Roster, and our City Staff for working with Ms. Gloria Abdula (sp) and her executive team to assist with making this possible. We moved forward with the project. It was an amazing day.

Councilwoman McKenzie said this past Sunday, January 14, 2024, I attended the Push Push Arts Drop In Celebration to check out their new venue and their arts campus which is located at 1805 Harvard Avenue. It was an awesome event with live music and small bites. It was an opportunity to visit some of the small businesses that are going to be located in that complex. I'm totally excited to have Push Push here in College Park, and I look forward to the future. The whole vibe is amazing.

Councilwoman McKenzie said yesterday College Park participated in the Martin Luther King Parade with the City of Jonesboro. Councilmembers Arnold, Carn, and

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myself rode in a recreation vehicle and had the opportunity to spend time with community members and elected officials from Clayton County Municipalities. It was an awesome way to celebrate the champion of non-violent social justice, none other than Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. And I want to thank Brian Anderson for coordinating this effort, along with Lance, Michelle, Teresa, and Ron. We also had our dance team there.

 Councilwoman McKenzie said in addition, I want to shout out to the New Sergeant Anthony Paniagua and Officer Wyatt from our PD for attending and bringing the jumbo screen to the parade. College Park was well represented. It was an amazing event. And I am looking forward to us doing our own event where we can invite cities in the future.

Councilwoman McKenzie said on January 7, 2024, I attend the Wild Hog's Supper which is the beginning of our legislative session. You meet some of our state leaders and other municipal leaders. It was a good experience.

 Councilwoman McKenzie said I am also excited about my Ward 1 leadership. Mike Lindsay, my BZA Board Appointee, he was sworn in at the January 8, 2024 BZA Meeting. Ebony Austin, the owner of New Vogue, who is my Main Street Association Appointee, she was elected as the Vice President of the Main Street Association at their January 10, 2024 meeting. And Lisa Williams, who is my BIDA Board Appointee, was elected Secretary/Treasurer at the January 11, 2024 meeting.

Councilwoman McKenzie said last Friday, January 12, 2024, the City of College Park Police Department held a promotion ceremony, and we had some amazing persons who were promoted. Lt. Durden and Lt. Goss were promoted from the rank of Sergeant to Lieutenants. They are amazing men. Sgt. Snow, Pogorzelski, Jones, and Paniagua, from Officer to Sergeant. I want to thank Chief Rogers for her leadership.

Councilwoman McKenzie said I met with Dr. Emmanuel to discuss the implementation of curbside recycling. And I want to thank him for the presentation he made during our Workshop Session. I want to thank my Councilmembers who expressed their interest to see a program like this to go forth.

Councilwoman McKenzie said I'm also concerned about the trees on Rugby and Washington. I will be addressing issues such as that.

Councilwoman McKenzie said I have also been driving around to see some of the streets we would like to have paved in Ward 1 under the grant. Those decisions should hopefully be made within the next few days.

Councilwoman McKenzie said during the past two weeks I met with several of our department heads. And I will continue to do that for the month of January. I want to see how I can partner with staff.

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1098 Councilwoman McKenzie said I will be attending a course at UGA for the newly elected officials, and the GMA meeting that the Mayor mentioned. We also have our legislative luncheon at the Capitol.

 Councilwoman McKenzie said I want to shout out to Public Works, Power, and First Responders for your hard work and efficiency during the inclement weather that we have been experiencing over these past few weeks. You have been spot on, and I truly appreciate your work.

Councilwoman McKenzie said I will be in my office hours sometime in February after my inauguration, and we will also hold our Ward 1 meeting around that time. In the meantime, I plan to meet with our community champions to organize our teams, and that meeting will be held tentatively at Club E on January 27, 2024 at 10:00 a.m.

Councilwoman McKenzie said I also want to remind everyone that if you want to get in contact with me prior to those meetings, you can reach out to me at my email at: jmckenzie@collegeparkga.com. We also have our Facebook Page which is onewardone. Our website is www.lwardl.com. For Instagram, it is onewardl. We are getting our email distribution set up. I ask everyone to be patient with me. Councilman Clay is asking everyone to sign up for my email.

Councilwoman McKenzie said finally, I want to strongly encourage members of the community to come to our council meetings, or to watch them on our city media with an open mind, and to not rely on hearsay or bias commentaries, masses information and inspiration that are designed to create confusion, division, and unrest in our city regarding the decisions of this Council that are being sent to you by email or posted on any website, other than our official College Park City Website. One should rely on what you see and what you hear.

Councilwoman McKenzie said let's unite on the wonderful enormous things that we have in common and shun the egregious temptations to become divided by miniscule deviations designed to separate us and to keep us apart. Let us focus on becoming OneWardOne; and in that let us press forward to become One College Park. And that's all I have.

<u>Councilman Carn</u> - said I'm excited about this year. Sixteen days in, and we are making progress. We have a long way to go and a short time to get there. I heard comments from the residents about the last few meetings, and I got positive comments from my neighborhood. They like the new direction we are going in. They said that we were moving boldly and more decisively. But now we have to work on fixing these problems boldly and decisively as well. And that's what we intend to do.

Councilman Carn said SB-16 John Albers Bill, we want to make sure that's a priority throughout the session. Mr. Albers is a very influential person in Fulton

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1143 County, and we support him 100%. 1144 1145 Councilman Carn said the Wild Hog Supper was really great. I got to do some 1146 networking. Saw a few new faces. It was a great event as always. They killed the 1147 pig as they do every year. 1148 1149 Councilman Carn said it was a great meeting with PHOAA, as well. We are going to recognize all of our community and their heritages. The Black Heritage was 1150 overlooked in a lot of different ways. Our streets are named after Ivy Leage 1151 Colleges. Only one problem, Black colleges and universities were left out of that 1152 1153 equation. And we are going to look at that as well in the near future. We are 1154 committed to representing all of College Park. 1155 1156 Councilman Carn said the M.L.K. Parade was great. The weather was pretty good, 1157 all things considered. 1158 1159 Councilman Carn said Chief Rogers, the induction ceremony was great. You have a good roster coming on board. We talked about the NFT tags. I want to do that 1160 as soon as possible. It will bring crime numbers down, if we implement it right. 1161 1162 1163 Councilman Carn said Dr. Emmanuel, I want to give you my street resurfacing 1164 list. 1165 1166 Councilman Carn said on mileage reimbursement, before I went to the county 1167 commission, the Councilmembers received standard mileage reimbursement just 1168 like anybody else. But at some point we stopped receiving that given a certain 1169 distance. 1170 1171 Councilman Carn said folks, we don't get an actual salary, so to speak. We get a stipend up here. We are semi-volunteers up here. We get that stipend for two 1172 meetings a month, and the rest are free. And it's a whole lot of free. Althea, we 1173 1174 want to make sure we are entitled to mileage reimbursement like anyone else, and 1175 that includes outside of the city. 1176 1177 Councilman Carn said I have heard of different mottos we have, to include "City 1178 on the Move" and "Community We Deserve". There are too many residents that 1179 have not been getting what they deserve. Some are. I have my own motto and that is 'We Serve Our Residents First". 1180 There is only one number one, our residents. City Manager, we are going to have to operate this City's departments 1181 on the basis of one purpose and one purpose only; to provide our residents with 1182 1183 the best services that we can at the lowest amount of tax dollar that we can, period. 1184 1185 Councilman Carn said there are some areas in our city that are doing pretty well.

And you would be proud to live there, but there are some other areas that are

mismatched and misdirected. Everyone that works here this year, if you are not

reaching out to our residents each and every day with services that they need, if

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1189 you are not accommodating our residents; that is going to be a problem this year. 1190 I am talking to all of us. We have to double our efforts. I want these entire departments obsessed with serving our customers first. 1191 1192 1193 Councilman Carn said Michelle, Parks & Recreation is an important program. We 1194 have rec program here that are better than some other cities. At the same time, we do need some tweaks and changes to these programs. We all want to see better 1195 1196 services to our residents first. The biggest issue I have, and no fault of your own, is we seem to end up outside of our residents for Parks & Rec for attendance 1197 because we don't know how to reach our kids. And the reason I believe that is 1198 1199 true, is our kids largely don't participate in Parks & Rec. There is an 85:15 ratio. 1200 Something is amiss. And that would be with any department. 1201 1202 Councilman Carn said Michelle, I want us to make a concerted effort to flip those 1203 numbers around. And not only that, the bigger issue is that a lot of our children can't afford Parks & Rec programs. I am proposing that we look at eliminating 1204 1205 the financial burden for Parks & Rec programming for any family in this community that makes \$50,000.00 or less. 1206 1207 1208 Councilman Carn said I want us out there talking to our children and parents and 1209 find out what they want to do. I want to see the afterschool care. I want to see a 1210 lot of changes in Parks & Rec. We are going to restructure things and cater to our residents. 1211 1212 1213 Councilwoman McKenzie said I yield to Councilman Gay. 1214 1215 Mayor Motley Broom said I turn it over to Mayor Pro Tem. 1216 1217 Mayor Pro Tem Roderick Gay said go ahead, Mayor. 1218 1219 Mayor Motley Broom asked, whose responsibility is it to set the framework for this and ensure that families are meeting the income standards? And do we have 1220 1221 an understanding of what that impact would be if every family in the City of College Park who makes \$50,000.00 or less, what the impact would be to 1222 Recreation and Cultural Arts? 1223 1224 1225 Councilman Carn said one thing I would suggest is to put together a task force 1226 and assess things. The one thing I do know is that staff is up to the tasks and to 1227 figure out how we get there. 1228 1229 Mayor Motley Broom asked City Manager Stanley Hawthorne, have you had an 1230 opportunity to participate in developing this type of program in another 1231 community? 1232 1233 City Manager Stanley Hawthorne said yes. While I am not prepared to comment

in detail, I have to tell you that there are a lot of things that Council has acted on

tonight that staff has been caught by surprise. And it does concern me going forward, if this is the way we are going to conduct business. With that said, this is an issue I discussed with Councilman Carn previously. One of the things that has surprised me about our structure is we have a high level of participation by non-residents with no distinction of the fees that are charged. With an amended motion, it will give staff a chance to present impacts and scenarios. And it can be discussed during the budget.

Councilman Carn said my motion still stands. I would like implementation on this by May.

 Councilwoman McKenzie said I like the idea of no cost for families that cannot afford it. If we made this affordable and attainable, it would afford a wonderful opportunity to many children. But it is going to require some planning and looking at our budget.

Councilwoman Arnold said thank you for bringing this up. I think it is very important that we have something in place for families in College Park, whether it is a sliding scale or free. I do think we need to do some research on it. We need to think about before and after school programs, too. I am looking forward to what is going to come out of this impact study. May is a bit late to register. We spend money on other stuff and nobody questions it. I am asking for a more aggressive timeline.

Mayor Pro Tem Roderick Gay asked Councilman Carn, would you like to change your motion to add a more aggressive timeline?

Councilman Carn said absolutely. Let's go.

Councilwoman Arnold said maybe we start small.

ACTION: Councilman Carn moved to allow fee recreation programs for all College Park residents with a household income of \$50,000.00 or less citywide, seconded by Councilman Gay. Councilman Carn withdrew his motion. Motion did not pass.

Mayor Motley Broom said I concur with Councilwoman Arnold to make sure we are doing more for those who cannot afford our recreational services. My concern is that we rush into a policy and then that policy gets abused. If we set this income ceiling, who verifies it? Do people bring in their tax returns? How is this all coming together? And we also know that people get ID's that are not in the City. Is that up to recreation staff to confirm that? I just want to make sure that the policies we set forth are ones that support this program and make it successful.

Councilwoman Arnold said I don't disagree with what the Mayor said. But I think we have smart, capable staff members that can make it happen.

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Councilwoman McKenzie asked, how do we verify a person's residence in College Park? Utility Bill? Driver's License? I'm sure we will find a way to do this. We did it with the utility program. Let's focus on the majority of families; the youth that will be saved. And hopefully this will cut down on crime.

Councilman Carn said ultimately we are not going to have abuse. We are going to have a grateful community. We will put parameters in place.

ACTION: Councilman Carn moved to approve a policy to implement free recreation and cultural arts programs for all College Park residents with a household income of \$50,000.00 or less to be implemented aggressively and immediately, seconded by Councilwoman Arnold and motion carried.

Councilman Carn said on the Federal Lobbyists trip, we want to coordinate with everybody. That's all I got.

<u>Councilwoman Arnold</u> - said I enjoyed participating in the Wild Hog event. It was an opportunity to meet other representatives and to learn more about my colleagues.

 Councilwoman Arnold said and I enjoyed the M.L.K. Parade. What you see before you are 130 years of change. This is a historic moment. We have made history and change. We should document the history that we have made of the Body. Fifty to 100 years from now, somebody is going to be studying College Park, and they will want to know who did what to affect their lives.

Councilwoman Arnold said over the 16 days, I am still learning. I see opportunities that we can leverage. There are technologies that we can leverage. Do we have access points in all of our activities? Do we think that not everyone has access to the internet? Just something to think about.

Councilwoman Arnold said Godby Road is important to me. I grew up in an area like Godby Road. I would like us to make some changes in the budget to have crosswalks at every entrance into the complexes. We need to make things easier for staff. We need extra programming for our children and our families. We need a way to participate in the development of the agenda. What about the initiatives that Council has? Maybe we can add that in. So when we make decisions, we will know what area it will impact. Those are my comments.

Councilwoman Arnold said it was nice to participate in Push Push. I would like for us to do a better job publishing these events. Can we come up with a process? I would like us to do a better job receiving the information and recognize those in our community doing great things.

Councilwoman Arnold said our New Ward 3 website is: www.cpward3.com. I'm encouraging all the residents of Ward 3 to subscribe to the newsletter and to share

your thoughts of what you want to see in Ward 3 and how I can better assist and advocate for you. Thank you.

<u>Councilman Gay</u> – said I was looking at the 10-day weather report. I don't think it is going to get to 50 until next Thursday. I would like for us to not cut off anybody until then. Nobody needs to be cutoff.

Councilman Gay said we need to allow Fulton County to create the Promise Academy. I thought that one of the commitments was they were going to notify our constituents ahead of time about enrollment. They have already reached out to our community at-large. So, City Manager, I guess you will take that lead.

Councilman Gay said I don't know if anybody ever got expired insurance. This happened to one of my constituents. It wasn't his car. The registration was cancelled. Somebody stopped him. And when he went to court, there is nothing that is sent out from the DMV certified to let someone know of their cancelled registration. I would like to see if state agencies can send out certified notices.

Councilman Gay said City Manager, I would like to do an intergovernmental agreement with One Talent that is next to Club E, to administer a grant as part of their tax exemption. They have an educational purpose. I understand from City Manager that there are no gratuity issues. I want to immediately enter into an IGA with them. They will come over here and show you their IRS documentation. The amount is \$8,000.00.

Councilman Gay said we also agreed to pay outside of the amended budget for an allotted camera. I would like a date certain.

Councilman Gay said we need to know when the speed humps are going to be installed that this Body agreed on.

Councilman Gay said we need to go back and revisit White City Road. As some of you may not know, White City Road starts off in the City of South Fulton and ends up in Ward 4. There is open-air prostitution. We might also need to have our representative to talk to the DA's Office. It is just one or two houses. We want to deal with that immediately.

Councilman Gay said when you are at Herschel Road and 29, that road has been demolished by tractor-trailers. We need to reach out to GDOT. That corner needs to be repaved.

 Councilman Gay said this is just a comment. You absolutely need green space for the development of children. The reason you can't afford to live around Piedmont Park is because of the park. You see, green space is more economic than brick and mortar. Maybe we should look at an IGA with some of the property owners over there, because green space is economic. Target connects both sides of Godby. And

- 405 Improper orders given by Council Member Carn and Council Member McKenzie to Dr.
- Emmanuel, and a host of other damning accusations that should have been properly and probably
- 407 could have been worked out during the team building session this weekend, or any other weekend
- 408 for that matter.
- A lawsuit that seeks attorney's fees as well, meaning that we have to pay going and coming. Not
- 410 to mention the 12 to 15 other lawsuits that we currently are defending.
- So, I ask you, Madam Mayor, who wins in this lawsuit? Could you not have held off filing this
- 412 until after talks this weekend? You filed on Friday. Could you not have done a better job at
- 413 mitigating these circumstances? You have four years in this seat. Could you not have wedded more
- than four weeks to do this? I shudder to think what this will do to our reputation, our efforts to
- heal, and to work together as a community, and our overall face to the public as a whole moving
- 416 forward.
- What do you now expect? Do you expect business leaders and developers to run to the city to do
- business? You expect people to run to College Park as a place to live, a place to raise a family and
- a place to become actively involved in civic duties?

- 420 Two of my clients today called me who were going to build single family units, affordable single
- family units here in College Park. They told me, "We're out". They had several million of dollars
- in loans from Fannie Mae. They had the funding. They said, "This is a blank show. We want
- nothing to do with College Park. You guys need to get your together. We are out". They were going
- 424 to build 50 town home, affordable units for our citizens and people who are complaining about not
- having anywhere affordable to live. No more.
- Make no mistake, I'm not condoning any prior acts by others who have been out of character or
- disrespectful. What I am shining the light on is the hypocrisy that continues to flow from the head
- of this body. If you are truly interested in healing this city, I don't think this is the way, Madam
- Mayor, to go about it. Sadly enough, we will continue to be the laughing stock of the south and
- 430 not the jewel that we can be. We will continue to be known for our dissension and not for our unity.
- 431 Is it really worth it? I challenge everyone to read through this complaint and the 200 plus pages of
- exhibits like I did this afternoon, and ask yourself, is it really worth it? Your complaint alleges,
- among other things, irreparable harm if you basically don't get to say what you want to say while
- presiding over a meeting. Not getting into the legal merits of the claims, but I can tell you who will
- be irreparably harmed. The citizens of College Park, period. The citizens of College Park deserve
- 436 better.
- You are now messing with my property values, my image as a citizen, things that directly affect
- 438 me and my household, and for one, I take strong issue with that, and will do everything in my
- power to write this wrong. What do we do in council? What do we do city manager? What do we
- do city attorney? When is enough, enough? Going to be enough? This is a lose-lose for everybody.
- I ask you again, is the risk worth the reward? The risk of burning down this house for the reward
- of you being able to speak on issues that you don't even have a vote on. Quote by E. Stanley Jones,
- "A rattlesnake, if cornered, will become so angry, it will bite itself". That is exactly what harboring
- hate and resentment against others is, a biting of oneself.
- We think we are harming others in holding these fights and hatred, but the deeper harm is to
- ourselves. Thank you.
- 447 MAYOR MOTLEY BROOM: Thank you, sir.
- 448 CITY CLERK: The next individual is Ms. Kenneth Anderson, 2900 Camp Creek Parkway.
- 449 Lawsuit.
- 450 MAYOR MOTLEY BROOM: Your time has expired, sir. Oh, you're not finished? Oh, I'm sorry. I
- 451 apologize. Go ahead. Go ahead.

- JAMES WALKER: No. No. You're fine. I ask you, I beg you, I did not move into College Park for
- 453 this. People did not come to College Park for this. Developers are leaving. People are running
- away. Tax dollars are going out the window. We are the shame of the south. When is enough going
- to be enough?
- 456 And I'm not talking about things happened in the past. Councilman Carn and Councilman Gay,
- 457 you had the same right that the mayor did to file a lawsuit in federal court, but you didn't. You sat
- 458 there. You took the disrespect and the disgrace.
- Now, I don't agree with everything you've done, but, at least, you had the city in mind by not
- 460 putting us forefront in a federal lawsuit that will end up costing us potentially hundreds of
- 461 thousands of dollars in addition to the suits that we already have. I just don't see a work around
- 462 this.
- Now, maybe I'm wrong and I hope I am wrong, and I hope the city attorney can work and not be
- accused falsely of the accusations that I read and have to defend an ethics complaint by the state
- bar because of what your attorney has put in the complaint that you signed an affidavit that it's true
- and accurate and I hope the city manager will understand, because I think you're doing one heck
- of a job, sir.
- And what we have now, God help you. My prayers are with you. Because you have to help heal.
- This staff, this council, I have no idea what we are going to do, but I know we have to stay focused
- and prayed up, and I just beg you all to find some way to move us forward in city of College Park.
- 471 MAYOR MOTLEY BROOM: Thank you, sir. Ms. Ames.
- 472 CITY CLERK: The next person I have is Tina Hill, Parkview Drive, to discuss lawsuit. Okay. Next
- is Tanya Austin, Parkview, to discuss "CP", climate political.
- 474 Tanya Austin: Greetings, everyone. Thank you for allowing me this opportunity. And if you don't
- 475 mind, I'd like to first thank the city employee that won employee of the month for his service,
- because College Park has amazing service, and I just thank you for... Where is he?
- Well, thank you for all of our employees, and I appreciate everything that they do. And I have been
- 478 a College Park resident for 27 years. One of the things I love most about it has been the sense of
- community, the services, and just, the neighborhood is wonderful.
- So, I do want to talk about climate control. In a world where we have global dissension, we have
- 481 terrible political climate in this nation, and I come home and I find the same thing. I'm not happy
- at all, and I simply ask, I'm not pointing fingers at anybody, no individual. I don't have a political
- agenda. I'm not buying any property, any land. I don't have a business deal. I'm simply a resident,

- a tax-paying resident that expects adults to get along at work. That's all I ask. Find a way to do it.
- Find a way to do it.
- The citizens of this city do not want to be embarrassed. I've been embarrassed and shamed. All of
- my 27 years, I've never been just so taken aback by the behavior of elected officials. It's
- 488 embarrassing, and I don't want to see our city decline in leadership, government, business, quality
- of life. All of those things are important. All of those things are important.
- So, I think the clergy that brought the invocation and asked for peace, I say the same thing, we
- 491 need peace. If you do know the Lord, please, get on your knees and ask him to guide you. Guide
- 492 you in your every decision, conversation, vote, interaction, thought.
- We are bigger than this, we're better than this. We are bigger than this, we are better than this. We
- are bigger than this, we are better than this. It's unacceptable to fight. It's unacceptable. All adults.
- That's who I'm talking to, adults. It's unacceptable.
- 496 I'm always going to be engaged. I don't come to many council meetings. I watch on that television
- or Facebook or whatever. I watch what's happening, and I don't like what I'm seeing. So, I'm asking
- 498 you all to govern with integrity, with wisdom, and with the spirit of unity. That's all I ask for the
- 499 citizens of College Park.
- 500 MAYOR MOTLEY BROOM: Thank you very much. Ms. Ames.
- 501 CITY CLERK: Next, I have Barbara McGee to discuss recommendation for police officers.
- BARBARA MCGEE: Good afternoon, mayor and council, and the citizens. I'm just so happy to
- walk up here this evening. I've had knee surgery and I've been going through quite a few medical
- issues, so I'm just happy on this evening. And I stand before you, too. I also want to recognize
- Women History Month while I'm here, if I may.
- The theme for this year is Women Who Advocate for equity, diversity and Inclusion. The theme
- recognize women throughout the country who understand that, for a positive future, we need to
- eliminate bias and discrimination entirely from our lives and institutions.
- Billie Jean King went on to say, and I quote, "Champions keep playing until they get it right". So
- I'm here tonight to say, as a woman, we will get it right one time or the other.
- But this afternoon, I want to focus on Saturday afternoon. As you all know, we always go... Well,
- 512 you don't know. My husband and I love eating at Captain D's on Main Street. So here, we are
- 513 driving on Saturday afternoon, and we get on Main Street and Virginia Avenue and there and
- behold, a young man sits on the edge of the bridge. My husband looks over there and he says, "My

515 goodness, that really doesn't look nice". And I sa	says, "No". Because there's a road down under the
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- 516 bridge.
- And I says, "Well, I'm going to call the police". He says, "No, no, we're going to just wait a minute".
- So, I said, "If he's there when I get back, we come back, I'm calling the police".
- So, as we drove back, it was about 10 minutes, 10 to 15 minutes maybe, there was three police cars
- there. A young lady, I think her name might've been Officer Wells, was distracting... Well, not
- Officer Wells. Officer Dallas maybe, was standing over to the left, distracting him. And I said, "Oh,
- someone just need to go and just smack him backwards". By that time, an officer walked up there
- and just pulled him backwards.
- He went up in the air, hat went off his head. And I think it might've been Officer Ike and Sergeant
- 525 Snow. Sergeant Wells also. But I commend them for doing such a horrific herois, however you
- said, job. They were very calm. They wasn't running or jumping or anything, and my husband says,
- "No. They're trained to do this". So, I commend them, because I believe they saved someone's life.
- Now, some people say, oh, maybe he was just sitting there resting. Well, from my experience as
- 529 counseling people, excuse me, he might've been just waiting for the minute to jump.

- If you're collaborating, then, you would've had some conversation with her so that all parties can
- participate and be available. It's the impression, just watching the video, that that did not happen.
- In the spirit of James Walker's comments, just because you can, does not mean you should. Just
- because you can create an ordinance, silencing the mayor does not mean that you should. It is poor
- 576 governance. It does not breed transparency, collaboration, critical thinking, any of those things.
- More information always makes you more decision makers.
- And I'll just add, if you want to see how council is combative against mayor, we saw that at the
- start of the meeting with Councilman Gay, refusing to verbally state his vote on agenda items. This
- is for the sake of disagreement. I don't understand why you stand on your head and do that. What's

- various perspectives of...
- 590 MAYOR MOTLEY BROOM: I'm sorry, ma'am. Can you state your name for the record?
- 591 ALTHEA MORRIS: Althea Morris. As I sat in the back and listened to the different comments
- from people, I came in embarrassed. People are calling from all different cities and saying... And
- asking, "Althea, what's going on in College Park? What are you guys doing?" And that is so
- 594 embarrassing and frustrating.
- As the young lady said before, we're dealing with adults, each and every one of you are adults.
- And I know, majority of you sitting up there, and I am ashamed. I am ashamed and appalled at this

- area? Are there plans by the city to clean up, and make over beautified model the entrance of Rugby
- Avenue along Washington Avenue? Unkept trees, and debris, and trash, are a constant on this part
- of Rugby Avenue. Lastly, what needs to be done to complete a sidewalk on West Rugby Avenue?

- The next comment is from Chris Reed. Actually, this should be read during his item on the agenda.
- This is for special events, so I'm going to skip that one.
- The next comment is Tom Coleman, and it reads, "Dear Mayor and council, I note with concern,
- last meeting's moved to transfer Bill Evans Ball Field to BIDA. As there was no explanatory
- comment at the time, it can only be assumed that this is for conversion of the field for commercial
- development. That being the purpose of the Building & Industrial Development Authority.
- Bill Evans field is well utilized, most notably by teams of the schools of the Atlanta University
- complex. I have also seen tournaments and Woodward use this as well. The removal of this
- recreational asset should not be done without a suitable replacement nailed down before a transfer
- of the facility to a private entity. Might I suggest, in their wisdom, Mayor and Council and body
- stipulate that as part of any sale, acquiring the entity fully fund the construction of an equivalent

- to send this because I am bewitched, bothered, and bewildered by this new lawsuit that the mayor
- has filed against the City of College Park, the city you say... My apologies. The city you say is the
- 732 city in which we deserve.
- As a participating, I'm sorry. As a practicing attorney yourself, Ms. Mayor Bianca Motley Broom,
- you know how much time and effort these kinds of proceedings take, and you know how much
- these kinds of proceedings cost. You have been hounding the budget, and wanting to make sure
- the city is not doing this frivolous things to upset it, and now you go on and sue the very city you
- 737 claim that you want to protect.
- This stunt is one of pure ego and retaliation, and I won't stand for it. You had ample opportunity to
- take care of this through our city attorney in executive session, and even at the retreat. A retreat
- designed to get everyone functioning cohesively, and communicating better with one another, in
- particular, council, with you. You told us in your newsletter that you were not going to stay for the
- entire retreat, because you have family obligations, and yet you want us to trust your judgment and
- your insight to handling things.
- When you campaigned initially, you told us how you know how to bring people together. You said
- you know how to work through adversarial issues, and now... I'm sorry. And know how to make

There was an incident where a person was killed and it occurred in the house and the property owner was sued. And then, the other thing I would like for you to consider while we have you here is to maybe look at an ordinance that talk about vacant properties. We don't maintain a vacant property list. That'll give you a better tools to enforce.

- will be probably a motion required. This council did vote to terminate the contract with MARTA
- 1520 for the Flint River property. Since that time, we have now been informed by our federal
- legislative body or members and Ms. Jennifer's here as well, Brecca has been working on it,
- David Scott's office, that there are funds in the amount of \$500,000 that are being given, granted
- to the City of College Park for this particular project.
- 1524 I know that, at the time, my colleagues were concerned about the spending of general fund
- monies towards this project. This is a project that the members of my community, my ward, it's
- very important to them. But I believe that this is also a project that is going to be very beneficial
- 1527 for us as a city and the community around us. The Atlanta Regional Commission is involved in
- this. Aerotropolis is involved in this. This river runs over 300 miles through the state of Georgia.
- And the project is a wonderful project. At this time, I just wanted to share some words of

- Project, because I want to thank my colleagues for reconsidering it. I don't think we should have
- ever gotten rid of it in the first place, because it is a really vitally important project for our entire
- region. And as Councilmember McKenzie said, it is something that we should all be doing because
- it is the right thing to do, and I certainly agree with her sentiments on that. And I do want to thank
- 1644 Congressman Scott's office because I did reach out. I was concerned about this, and I appreciate
- his office reaching out to my colleagues to help them talk about this and think through this so we
- 1646 could keep on working on this project.
- I also wanted to thank all the leaders in Clayton County who got together for the Women Around
- Our Region luncheon. It celebrated the five Black female mayors of Clayton County, including
- 1649 Mayor Wynn-Dixon of Riverdale, who is our champion, our trailblazer, and just a phenomenal
- outstanding leader, Mayor Angelyne Butler from Forest Park, Mayor Dr. Donya Sartor from
- Jonesboro and Mayor Marci Fluellyn of Lovejoy. We were joined by Anna Roach of the Atlanta
- Regional Commission, who is also the CEO and the Executive Director of the Atlanta Regional
- 1653 Commission. And it is just nothing but a joy to get together to celebrate that and it was a truly
- special, special event. And I just want to thank everybody for all of that.
- I also want to thank Ricky Mackenzie. He had a Meet the Mayor's Forum last week and we had
- eight Black female mayors to close out Black History Month who were the first in their
- 1657 communities. We had Mayor Burks of Clarkston, Mayor Robinson of Douglasville, Mayor Butler
- of Forest Park, and Mayor Fluellyn of Lovejoy, Mayor Dr. Sartor of Jonesboro, Mayor Vincent of
- McDonough and Mayor Thomas-Smith of Palmetto and myself. It was such a wonderful
- 1660 conversation and an excellent opportunity that we're going to build on because the comradery and

- 1719 **COUNCILWOMAN MCKENZIE:** Thank you. All righty. Everybody, we do have a lengthy
- report now and I will try not to repeat some of the things that the mayor's already spoken. Today
- is my 64th day in office. Yay! Thank you. And also today is the fourth day of Women's History
- Month. This month it's set aside to honor the contributions of women to American history. It began
- with Women's History Week in 1978 and then in 1987 Congress passed a public law 100-9 which
- designated the entire month of March as Women's History Month. I want to say a quote from
- 1725 Jimmy Carter that he said in 1980. He said, "From the first settlers who came to our shores, from
- the first American Indian families who befriended them, men and women have worked together to
- build this nation. Too often the women were unsung and sometimes their contributions went
- unnoticed, but the achievements, leadership, courage, strength, and love of the women who built
- America was as vital as that of the men whose names we know so well."
- I want to salute all of our women everywhere, no matter whether you get the credit or not, you're
- doing great things. Keep up the great work. I also want to say a special happy birthday to everyone
- who's listening to the sound of my voice who may be watching this if you have a birthday in the
- month of March.
- 1734 My theme for my comments tonight is it's bigger than us. Public service is about the citizens and
- the city that we represent. Everything we do while we're in office sitting in these seats should
- reflect that and so it's bigger than us, it's bigger than our personal opinions, it's bigger than our
- fears, it's bigger than our insecurities and it's bigger than our prejudices and preferences. One of
- the reasons that I chose to run and I ran hard for this seat was because it was critical to me that the
- 1739 residents of my ward and my city come first and that they have representation that not only sees
- them but also hears them.
- My ward didn't need someone who would just sit here and pontificate or seek the seat in order to
- put the council members in their place, which was some of the ambitions that I heard of folks that
- were seeking the same office, but rather they needed someone that was here to do the work and

put themselves last in order to put the people first. And it isn't easy holding your tongue. Now, y'all

know I'm a speaker. I can speak. It's not easy holding your tongue when you want to speak or

1746 refraining from defending yourself when you know you're being lied about and falsely accused,

but I understand, and Deen told me this when I first before I ever came into office, it comes with

a territory, so you've got to be bigger. That being said, these past two weeks have been a mixture

of informing, inspiring, and inciting.

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1750 I intended and I completed the Harold F. Holtz Training Institute for newly elected officials offered 1751 in conjunction with the Georgia Municipal Association and the University of Georgia in Athens. This was an incredible experience in which I had the opportunity to meet and to hear from other 1752 municipal leaders and elected officials and to gain information about how to be effective in my 1753 1754 service to our community. As soon as I was elected, I wanted to receive this training. I mean, I wanted to get this training before January 1st, but the practical and the professional teaching that 1755 1756 I received during those few days last week was even more valuable after being in this seat for 1757 almost 60 days. So I really got more out of it because there was a point of reference and the learning 1758 was experiential. I want to thank GMA CEO, Larry Hanson and his team for this dynamic training and for all the wisdom that he shared with us, and he kind of took me and Tracie, well, she'll tell 1759

1760 you, Councilman Arnold should tell you, but he was really, really kind to the two of us.

March 1st through the second, we thought we would have it march through the first through the third, but March 1st through the second, we held a retreat for our governing body. And it's no secret that this governing body has been challenged for quite a long time before January 2nd, and it didn't just begin, as I said on January 2nd, 2024. These issues have existed for several years and have compounded to a place where all the progress we were making was either smeared by negativity or we were being seen as a contentious group that should not be entrusted to properly address the needs and the concerns of our constituents. The purpose of our retreat this past weekend was to remove ourselves from the organizational structure that we are in and even the geographic location that we govern in to focus on how to heal the hurts and the misconceptions that we have been allowing to affect our ability as a governing body to properly execute the responsibilities that come with running our organization, which is the City of College Park. Furthermore, the purpose of this retreat was to explore what issues were hindering us, come to the full realization that we are here to serve the people and we need to be the version of ourself that allows this to happen in excellence and to do a reset so that we can move forward as a unified governing body.

The only setback was that the retreat was scheduled to take place over a three day period and we were not able to complete the targeted task because our presiding officer did not inform us that she would be leaving a day and a half early. We were however, able to accomplish a few goals and it was my hope that we would leave Buford and strive to put the people of College Park first and to continue to make sacrifices that come along with making this city and our residents a priority. Every member of our governing body was afforded the opportunity to put it all on the table and leave it there. We were able to gain a better perspective of our roles or our lanes as Larry Hanson would say, and most important, I believe that we would be able to agree that our behaviors are critical to our constituents, and we did.

1784 Some more takeaways were that the sharing of elected official opinions would be based on 1785 communication with those officials and Mayor Pro Tem has already stated that, so that factual 1786 information would be shared with the members of our community. We also agreed that we would show one another respect as we meet, but not only when we meet here in this council chamber, but 1787 1788 when we're not in a meeting as well. Most important, we agreed that we would leave the past in 1789 the past and move forward with the goal of representing our constituents in a spirit of accountability and with respect for one another and to have continued effective communication. 1790 1791 We also got a better understanding about what it means to be a team because regardless of what 1792 transpires during our meetings behind closed doors and in our district, when one of us looks bad, 1793 our entire city looks bad.

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When one of us misses the mark, our entire city suffers. When we support one another and assist in helping one another to do good, then our entire city wins. Unfortunately, when we returned from the retreat, we discovered that there were more woes brewing and that we were not aware of until this morning's news articles began to flood our emails and our text messages, and now our beloved city is once again on the map in a way that is not appealing. We are facing a lawsuit that will cost our taxpayers tens of thousands of dollars simply because the communication we thought we had never really existed. And the real victims are the people who work hard every day to make a living, to call College Park their home, the people who elected us to represent them, and we did not want our personal feelings to get in the way of our decision making.

The people who don't want our personal feelings to get in the way of our decision making, the people who deserve to have a peaceful place to live, like my sister spoke about free of immature, petty political drama. I want to thank Dr. Natasha for being a phenomenal facilitator for this retreat and doing her homework and being prepared to help this governing body, also to Warren Bond who drove all the way to Buford to visually document to the event from my colleagues on council. And I want to also thank my colleagues on council and to everyone who attended for the full session, our city clerk, our city manager, our city attorney. Thank you for being there and thank you for being a part of making solutions happen. More news is I held my 1st Ward One community meeting on February 24th, 2024 at the courtroom in the public safety building.

1812 During our meeting, our Ward One board appointees made reports and I gave updates on the restrooms in Barrett Park, curbside recycling, street and traffic concerns, and the Flint River Nature 1813 1814 Preserve Project. In an effort to save time, I won't go through what I shared with the community, 1815 all these updates, but you can go to our www.oneward1, the word one, the number, the word ward, 1816 and then the number one.com. And on that website you can see my entire updates that were shared 1817 during that Ward one community meeting. I also want to thank our special guest speakers, Dr. Emmanuel Adediran and Chief Connie Rogers for sharing invaluable information. My colleague, 1818 Mayor Pro Tem, Roderick Gay for supporting us with his presence and to all our police staff who 1819 1820 were present. We had several police officers. We had about five or six officers, and especially to 1821 the 50 plus members of our community who came out at 10:00 AM on a beautiful Saturday morning to get informed and to begin to continue their involvement in our Ward one community. 1822

1823 Our next ward one community meeting will be held on March 23rd, which is a Saturday. At the 1824 same time, 10:00 AM We'll be putting signs out the Monday before that time just to let everybody 1825 know that we'll be there. It'll also be announced on our media. We are currently conducting a Ward 1826 one community involvement and development survey to get input from our resident stakeholders 1827 about Six West, Barrett Park, Flint River, Main Street, safety and other resident concerns. This 1828 survey was based on feedback that we have received from our community champions and persons in the community. I'm asking that everyone will please complete this survey. We have gotten a 1829 1830 wonderful response already from our residents, but we want to hear from more. So we're asking that you would complete this survey no later than March 8th. The survey can also be found on our 1831 onewardone.com website, as well as our One Ward One Facebook information blog page, and the 1832 1833 survey results will be revealed at our March 23rd Ward one community meeting.

1834 The next two weeks schedule is going to be very busy. We're going to travel to Washington DC 1835 this week. I look forward to that. I'm going to thank Jennifer for coming all the way down here to sit with us, and we will be meeting with our federal legislators and then on to attend the National 1836 1837 League of City's Congressional City Conference from the 10th to the 13th. I plan to begin my office hours here at City Hall in April after the renovations are completed in our offices. I also 1838 want to let everybody know that our MARTA station, our airport MARTA station, will temporarily 1839 1840 be closing from April 8th to May 19th. It's going to be a six-week period to do construction renovation. However, there will be shuttle service available 22 hours a day from 4:00 AM to 2:00 1841 1842 AM between the College Park station and the north baggage claim area.

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This will not affect the sky train. The sky train will continue to run on its route for those who catch it at the GICC or trying to go to the rental car lots. I also wanted to give some follow up on the employee break room suggestion box. We are still going to give another week or so to leave that suggestion box. We just really got the word out. I believe it was last week, Christa, let everybody know we want to give another week or two for that. I've gotten some great ideas. Somebody even said we need to have a lactation room or a quiet space. So we want to look at what we can do to make the employee break room here at City Hall, more amenable, more friendly, and a place where you can really take a few minutes, half an hour of your break and feel good about taking a break.

1851 I also want to thank our Chief Information Officer, Mr. Michael Hicks for taking out time with me 1852 and Howard Levinson, who is my tech guy, and he spent an afternoon with us at Barrett Park. 1853 Michael showed us all the security features of the new restrooms in Barrett Park also, which is the 1854 Butterfly MX technology, fancy smancy water fountain that you can just put your little water bottle 1855 to and you don't have to touch it. It's going to fill the water up for you. But I was really impressed 1856 with the design of the restrooms, the thoughtfulness with the restrooms, and the fact that the 1857 security will require, you have to show your face in the camera and you'll have to put in a code or you'll have to be able to notify a park ranger. We have several ways that persons will be able to 1858 1859 enter. I'm not going to get into all of it, but I want to thank Michael.

We're not going to open up the restrooms in Barrett Park until we are totally sure that it is safe and secure. So once Michael and I talk and we see what's going on, I will be announcing a date for the grand opening of the restrooms in Barrett Park. I want to thank my colleagues for deciding to move forward with the Flint River contract with MARTA because that is very important. It's very necessary and it's something that I have personally been involved in since 2017 when I took the tour with Hannah Palmer and we began to discuss that project and it was breaking my heart to think that that would fail. I'm also very thankful to the community from Aerotropolis and the Atlanta Regional Commission and Jennifer Imo and Brecca Carter, David Scott's office, all of the organizations that have come together to say this is important and we're going to move forward with it.

I want to close by saying that I believe that organizations are much more than what they are slated to be on paper, and because organizations rely on people, human flesh and blood to run them, we must never omit to acknowledge the fact that the human element always matters. Organizations can't run without people and therefore people matter how those people feel, how they're viewed, how they're heard, and how they are seen. Therefore, organizations are run by organisms, and organisms are living, breathing entities that have feelings, and we're not perfect, and because we're not perfect, it can cause chaos at times because humans can be unpredictable and very stubborn. But the good news is that organizations are governed because they're governed by humans. They can also heal and they can also change. I want to encourage the members of my ward and the residents of the city of College Park not to lose hope, even though things may not look the way each of us would like them to be right now, there is still always the possibility of change.

And even though that change may be difficult and change may be, it may challenge the core of one's being, and I like what Dr. Chisluo said, "There's time to change." Change can bring about growth, and growth can bring about prosperity, and prosperity is not money or things, but prosperity is the condition of being successful or thriving because when people are prosperous, they are given the distinct ability to erase all the struggles that they experienced in order to achieve that progress and that prosperity. What I'm saying is that when you get to the point of prosperity, everything that you went through, everything that you tried to fight, every challenge that you met on the way it becomes erased because you are now thriving, you are now successful, and our city is experiencing challenges. We are experiencing things that we don't like, the good, the bad, and the ugly, but if we continue to allow the process of growth to happen, if we continue to embrace the process of change, we can achieve true prosperity. Let's press on as a community of thrivers, and as that Jesse Jackson would say, "Let's keep hope alive." That's all I have to say.

- 1893 MAYOR MOTLEY BROOM: Thank you Councilmember McKenzie, Councilman Carn.
- 1894 COUNCILMAN CARN: All right. Amen. Let's pass the collection plate.
- 1895 COUNCILWOMAN MCKENZIE: Put it on me.

- 1896 COUNCILMAN CARN: Amen. Speaking of collection plate, actually I guess I'll start on that 1897 first topic. We've been making significant progress in this last couple of months and I see good things happening in this city through all the transition and the turmoil. Good things are happening 1898 in this city and there are a huge list of improvements that we have been experiencing since the 1899 1900 beginning of this year, but change is not easy and sometimes it's going to be a bit of agitation here 1901 and there, but we're making that change and we're going to get through that change and we're going to be solid and stronger than ever coming through on the other side of whatever challenges come 1902 1903 our way.
- 1904 In my community, I've got a lot of residents that are struggling right now. Times are tough all over. 1905 Gas is still \$3 plus, food is still high. A part of this city's objective is to make the lives of our 1906 residents just a little bit better and we want to strive to do that any way in every way that we can. 1907 City manager, one of the things I've seen around town, it seems like I guess in the past five years 1908 is just about every other store I go to seems like I get to the cash register and they say, pay my 1909 money for whatever it is I'm picking up and they say, well, "Sir, would you like to round that up 1910 to the next dollar?" And sometimes I round it up, other times I won't. Usually I round it up and I don't help carry a lot of change in my pocket. 1911
- Something had occurred to me and city attorney, I wanted to get a bit of a clarification on something along these lines. We've got a lot of utility service customers that pay for water, electricity, sanitation here in the city. What I wanted to know, was there anything that would possibly prevent us from putting together some type of a roundup program for residents that are struggling that may be on that cutoff list for electricity, so on and so forth, and put together some kind of a roundup change request with the thousands of residents that we have for utility service?
- Mr. Denmark: No, Councilman, I can think of nothing that would prevent us from making a request that rate payers voluntarily round up. We use that when you establish a separate fund that would be used to help us. I can't, as I sit here now, think of any impediment to doing that.
- 1921 COUNCILMAN CARN: Well, city manager and Councilwoman McKenzie in particular. I know 1922 altruism and nonprofit and charitable giving is I guess kind of your wheelhouse. Well, I imagine 1923 that's sort of part of how you ended up here, I guess in a sense too, but I'm not an expert at that, but I have seen the trend and it's a heartwarming trend that has emerged during the retail industry 1924 1925 nationwide. I think we might want to look at being part of that trend, and you probably know more about it than me and maybe if y'all could come up with something. I thought if there's no objections, 1926 1927 I thought that might be a good something to explore looking at doing a project like this, and maybe 1928 we have an application process for those most in need or something along those lines, but I like to explore it and see if it's something we can come up with that everybody would be okay with if it's 1929 acceptable to everybody to take a look at. Something like that. 1930
- 1931 COUNCILWOMAN MCKENZIE: Did you want --

1932	COUNCILMAN CARN: well, I -
1933	MAYOR MOTLEY BROOM: Councilmember Arnold.
1934	COUNCILWOMAN ARNOLD: Add this to the next agenda.
1935 1936 1937 1938	COUNCILMAN CARN: Oh yeah. Well, no, I was just going to, if there was interest in taking a look at it, I would maybe have the city managers just do some research and talk and look into the departments and see what is possible and bring it back at some point in time or whatever. But that was just my thought there.
1939 1940	COUNCILWOMAN MCKENZIE: And I would be willing to work on that. Okay. I'll get with Councilwoman Carn.
1941 1942 1943 1944 1945 1946 1947 1948 1949	COUNCILMAN CARN: Most of us did commit to communicate better with each other. Most of us did commit to work together and as a team. And regardless of what goes on, I think the majority of this body will continue to work together as a team and do things that have never been done before in this city for the good of this community. No city is perfect. Every city goes through transitions and again, we're going to come out on the other side of this stronger and better because of whatever it is that we go through. Councilmember Gay, in regards of that flooding issue, just so you know, I've been asking about that particular flooding issue for quite about six months on and off. It's right in front of the bridge, like at the front end of the bridge, it's not on the bridge itself, but it pools there and it's like six inches of standing water. So it was a real big issue and a lot of residents are going to be very, very happy if we can get that fixed and resolved.
1951 1952 1953 1954 1955 1956 1957 1958 1959	A couple of things I took care of throughout the last week or two. I attended the Korean Trade Reception with the Fulton County government. There are a lot of Korean businesses in this county throughout metro Atlanta. They're looking for new places to do business. They're looking to open up headquarters and we are still open for business in the city of College Park. We have land for sale and properties and we want to reach out to any and all that are interested in doing business with this city. And some of those folks are interested in doing business. I may be a part of a trade delegation in terms of travel over there along with our state delegation, which includes some of our state elected officials as well as our county and participation on the city level. College Park wants to certainly be involved in that and I think we will be.
1960 1961 1962 1963	The Black Legislative Caucus event was on the 22nd at the GICC. It was a really great event. It was well attended and packed. We definitely rolled out the red carpet there, Mercedes. Once again, first class event, first class showing for the city of College Park and I think they're certainly going to be coming back.

1966	going on right around us right now. The mayor wrote off a litany of events and things that are
1967	happening and there are very few people that will bother to look on our website if the information
1968	is on our website. We still have a communications department now. I want to make sure that all of
1969	the county-wide city-wide announcements are sent to the communications department from tonight
1970	that everyone has spoke on. I want to get those things in an email, dates, times, everything that is
1971	happening. I'm putting together a newsletter, community newsletter, and I want to make sure we

- are making sure our residents are aware.
- 1973 Again, a handful of residents visit the website. That's great. They may get some information, but
- how about everybody else? What if you're not up on the web or tech-savvy, so on and so forth. The
- 1975 Women Making History event on Godby Road was really fabulous. It was jam-packed and I did
- attend. Mayor, she definitely represented well for the city of College Park. It was amazing to have
- 1977 that many mayors in town and I made sure we showed a little hospitality. We had gift bags for all
- of our mayors as we should.
- 1979 Looking forward to the trip to DC. Brecca, we're going to get together some gift bags for our
- legislative delegation, our Congress members and senators and the like. I got some bags, we're
- 1981 going to make sure we get those together, so we want to make sure that you're letting them know
- how much we appreciate them. So we'll get that together the next day or two here.
- 1983 I went on a tour with Mrs. Kennedy with the Keep College Park Beautiful group to the Strategic
- Materials Recycling Center over on Sullivan Road. This is a glass recycler and it was a very
- enlightening tour. I never knew how organized that place was. You pass by it on Sullivan Road and
- it looks like just a great big pile of glass up there. But man, they are organized and meticulous like
- 1987 you would not believe. And they gave us some tips and pointers on how to organize our glass in a
- 1988 way that would be acceptable to them, where they could possibly arrange some type of a pickup
- where we could start the recycling system. And I know you had talked about a recycling program
- and they told us what they needed from the glass perspective to make our lives a whole lot easier
- there. So that was a great tour.
- 1992 I also participated in the College Park Cleanup Day on February 24th with Georgia Works. Georgia
- Works is a partnership program and they are cleaning up like you wouldn't believe in our high
- traffic areas, those high traffic intersections and in between spots where public works may not be
- able to get to. Those are the crucial areas and I want to push to double what it is they're doing in
- 1996 College Park because this is the kind of coverage we have. I always say again, don't let this city
- 1997 fool you. With 14,000 in population, but that's about a hundred to a hundred and fifty every day,
- we get almost 10 times the company here, which means we're going to get eight, nine, 10 times
- the trash and litter. So we've got more cleanup and get more company than the average city. So we
- 2000 have to double and increase our efforts.
- 2001 Inspections and code enforcement, they are gearing up for an aggressive enforcement season and
- 2002 particularly in and around our apartment communities and everywhere else. I got one apartment

2003	complex looking	g at about two	hundred	citations right	now so fa	ır. And folks.	we mean business

- when we say we are raising the bar. And those citations are real, they're going to cost real money
- and if those unacceptable conditions are not fixed then those fines are going to increase. We are
- 2006 making the improvements this community expects to be made here contrary to what you may hear.
- We are getting it done and we're going to continue to do our best to get it done despite of whatever
- 2008 distractions are coming.
- 2009 Last couple of things. Congressman Scott again who has always come through for us.
- 2010 Congressman Lewis was always there for us as well. He was heavily influential in us getting the
- 2011 airport lands back along with the city of Atlanta to create what is now going to be Six West, our
- 2012 largest development project. They've worked in tandem over the years. Now Congressman Scott,
- 2013 his district will no longer be in Fulton County at all, in any part of Fulton County, so just FYI. And
- that's due to the state's redistricting plan. So he will not be our Congress member starting the next
- 2015 year.
- Now he still is our congress member from now to the end of the year and we are going to make
- sure that we recognize him. City manager and I would like us to at some point do something for
- 2018 him before he leaves this city sometime this year. Again, he will be our Congress member for the
- remainder of this year. I think we need to honor him in some kind of a way or some type of
- reception or something along those lines. I would like to put something together. When folks look
- out for us, we need to show them we really appreciate them and cities that show their appreciation
- are cities that really strive. And we want to definitely make a good showing to let him know how
- 2023 much we appreciate his commitment.
- Last thing here. Let's see here. Oh, so I need to find out City Manager, Fulton County Schools, if
- they have any kind of adult literacy classes, resources. I see that Cobb County and Clayton County
- do have adult literacy classes in some of the high schools and I'm not quite sure what we have, but
- 2027 maybe communications could find out for us.
- And that's all I got. Looking forward to a wonderful March. Oh, happy birthday to my mom. Her
- birthday is in March, so happy birthday Mom. This is the closest council meeting to her birthday,

- 2032 COUNCILWOMAN ARNOLD: Thank you. So first I would like to thank Dr. Emmanuel and
- 2033 Ms. Althea Philord-Bradley for allowing me and Councilwoman McKenzie the opportunity to
- learn more about the budget development and budget amendment process. Not only did this
- 2035 conversation give us more insight into those administrative processes, but it also allowed us to
- 2036 discuss some of the best and standard practices of the quarterly budget amendments and monthly

- 2040 I also want to thank the Princeton Village HOA board of directors for allowing me the opportunity
- 2041 to share in their community meeting and I'm looking forward to sharing at the next event. I want
- to thank Dr. Emmanuel again and the wonderful staff at the Tracey Wyatt Recreation Center for
- 2043 the tour and the hard work that has gone into preparing the center for the upcoming spring and
- 2044 summer activities.
- I want to send a special thank you to Mrs. Constance Rodriguez for her leadership on the Keeping
- 2046 College Park Beautiful, on that board, and the cleanup day that was held by the entire committee
- at 10 o'clock on February 24th. On that same day, I participated in the Women Around our Region,
- also known as WAR, luncheon for elected and appointed women leaders of Clayton County where
- 2049 Mayor Motley Broom, along with other mayors of Clayton County, received a special recognition.
- 2050 And it was wonderful to see women being recognized in this way.
- 2051 From February 27th through the morning of March 1st, I participated in the mandatory GMA
- training for all newly elected city leaders. The training was very insightful, it was relevant. It
- equipped us with the documented evidence-based and proven examples of how we should exercise
- our duties as elected officials. And yes, I too fell in love with the CEO Larry Hanson, who actually
- shared some very inspiring stories with us.
- 2056 And one of the items that I was extremely excited about bringing back to this particular body was
- for us to reaffirm ourselves as a city of civility by re-adopting GMA's oath of civility. And now
- 2058 I'm really disappointed that it doesn't seem like that's going to be an option at this particular time
- because of the actions unbeknownst to us that took place before the beginning of our retreat on the
- 2060 evening of March 1st.
- 2061 So at this point, I'm completely baffled and I'm being extremely transparent. While many of us
- were open and sincere, transparent with our concerns about the negativity and divisive activities
- and the serious implications that these actions have on our great city and our citizens, others had
- 2064 ulterior and nefarious motives, which is painful. But nevertheless, our great city will continue to
- 2065 grow and thrive. And I personally thank Dr. Natasha Gresham for working with us through this
- 2066 effort and I hope that we will be able to complete the parts of the process that we missed due to
- 2067 mayor's early departure. I too am looking forward to both DC trips along with learning and
- 2068 networking and continuing to advocate for the citizens of College Park.
- 2069 So moving on to some upcoming things, activities in Ward 3. The open volunteer position for the
- 2070 planning board for Ward 3, will close on March 7th and I will begin hosting conversations with
- the applicants on March 8th. If you are a resident of Ward 3 and an alum of Clark Atlanta
- 2072 University, please reach out to my office and provide your name, address and telephone number.
- 2073 And I have the number here, but you all know how to reach the city. And I am also seeking 10
- Ward 3 volunteers for community activities and engagement and more information will be shared

- And those are all of my updates. Thank you.
- 2078 MAYOR MOTLEY BROOM: Thank you. Councilmember Arnold. Councilmember, Gay.
- 2079 **COUNCILMAN GAY:** I'll be brief, y'all. My colleagues, y'all had great notes and information so
- 2080 I was pleased to listen. I just want to start off by thanking my alumni, Frederick Douglass High
- 2081 School for visiting the GICC for the Annual Breakfast. And that brings Mayor Keisha Lance
- 2082 Bottoms and Michael Bunn and just a host of elected officials who attended Douglass. So
- 2083 Mercedes, I heard you did an amazing job once again for Douglass High School breakfast.
- I want to also echo on the retreat. Everybody has talked about the retreat. I came away from the
- retreat like reset. That's what we came back with, a reset. I cannot thank my colleagues for, I
- 2086 thought I liked them, but I really like them now. If you didn't get it out of the retreat, you had a
- 2087 missed opportunity, they say in the church because the love was there doc. The love was there.
- And I don't want to talk too much about it, but I will say this respectfully, a lot of energy was put
- 2089 on trying to bring harmony and peace, more so I was ready to go back to my room. I'm like this is
- 2090 too much time for one person, but they tried hard but we are going to keep praying and keep
- 2091 praying.
- 2092 Anyways, I would like to ask that we bring the Lifeline back this springtime on Sullivan Road.
- They do the neuter and spray clinic and shots. We had it a few years ago, but it is really needed not
- just the neuter and spray but the shots and bring that back to College Park please for the spring.
- 2095 Councilman Carn, you were spot on with the workforce folks with the letter. I will tell you that
- 2096 they are asking for an increase, so we need to talk about how we can add that to our budget because
- 2097 they want more money. But if it wasn't for them, I don't know what we could do because the amount
- of litter that we get. But I absolutely want to consider adding Herschel Road, I think they do
- 2070 of fitter that we get. But I absolutely want to consider adding Herselier Road, I think they do
- Herschel Road actually, Riverdale Road. And if any of my colleagues have any streets that they
- 2100 notice hot spots or litter, talk to the Dr. Emmanuel about maybe adding your streets.
- 2101 Scratch that off. I wanted us to talk about the recycle bin and Joe, you talked on it. You and I must
- be kindred spirits tonight. You talked about the recycle bin, but I need my colleagues as well as the
- community and this could be something for the Brownfield grant. We are conflicted, we're towing
- on the recycle bin on the 18 acres. I mean we love it and we hate it. I mean it is a great asset for
- 2105 the community I'm talking about, but it has become a site for illegal dumping. It has also become
- 2106 a site where people bring -- just like a goodwill, I mean people come over there every morning,
- 2107 you'll see pickup trucks picking out furniture.

2108	So we got to figure this out and I don't have the answers on what we can do to either make that
2109	sustainable or not. And maybe Joe, like you said, maybe the glass people can come and talk to us
2110	about that. Councilwoman McKenzie, maybe the door-to-door recycling. But we got to figure this
2111	one out because the sanitation people were there every day and that's not a good use of y'all's
2112	resources.
2113	It is time to start talking about KidsFest and the 8th Annual Ward 4 Citywide Festival. It's that time
2114	of these people telling you these budgets. It's that time, start early. And I will tell you last night I
2115	watched Unsung and they had Vanessa, what's her name the lady at our festival, what was her
2116	name? Vivica Fox. She was on Unsung. If you haven't seen Unsung, they featuring Vivica Fox. I
2117	love her even more now. She has an amazing story and for her to come to College Park, I mean
2118	just to watch her journey and to say she came to College Park to visit with us, that says a lot about
2119	College Park and not to mention she got a brother that lives here too.
2120	So this festival and KidsFest time to start talking about the budget. Dr. Emmanuel, we would like
2121	to know when the sidewalk construction is going to start. The main council agreed to it so we need
2122	to get that started. Dr. Emmanuel, we also need to know when the Jack Longino scholarship funds
2123	are going to go to One Talent. Do you know?
2124	DR. ADEDIRAN: It's already gone.
2125	COUNCILMAN GAY: It did?
2126	DR. ADEDIRAN: Yes.
2127	COUNCILMAN GAY: Okay, see how easy it is. All right, just a couple more. Dr. Emmanuel and
2128	I had breakfast. We came up with a conversation about, and this is just a conversation y'all, putting
2129	the cameras on certain employees' phones because as you know, there's cameras all over the city
2130	and then we council people can watch their phones. But could you imagine that's approximately
2131	10,000 screen time hours of employees on their screen. Now imagine if just some of that time
2132	could be to look at deficiencies in real time, maybe the recycle bin, maybe whether it's loitering
2133	and maybe we could come up Because we had the technology to put those cameras on certain
2134	employees phones and maybe you could incentivize them.
2135	I was at Mayor Dickens office. I went there to talk about how he administered his mayor's
2136	scholarship, I really did, to learn how he does it. But I noticed the police in his office has cameras
2137	all in front of him and he watches the city hall. So we got officers and we got an opportunity to put
2138	more eyes on the city and make a better use of our resources, that's all. I would like for you to start
2139	maybe looking at that. And I think that's about it.

One thing I want to tell you, when y'all did the Brownfields grant, and this is a lot about what Dr...
I call him Freedom Initiative. But anyway, Dr. Chisulo it is a lot about why? What he said, when
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2142	we did it's about change,	when they	did the Brownfield g	grant, it hurt me that	there was nothing on

- 2143 there that represented anything that I've asked and envisioned for since 2015 for my ward. Nothing.
- Not one thing. It took change just to have that conversation. It took change to have an equitable
- 2145 conversation.
- Nothing. And then I'm so kindhearted, I started talking about how they use it in other people wards.
- But I say that to say this, I would love to see some of that Brownfield money look at Camp Truitt
- as a conservation natural center, center for environmental education. Bring those kids back on
- buses to Camp Truitt and let them watch indigenous plants, indigenous animals. So let's make
- 2150 Camp Truett a real thing. I love Flint, but let's make Camp Truitt, bring that conversation back.
- 2151 And we are having a town hall meeting March 21st and our special guest is Pat Labat. Sheriff
- 2152 Labat is going to come and talk about his vision for our city and for his county amongst other
- 2153 guests are coming. They're not confirmed, so I won't call their name just now. So I'll be sending
- out more information. And that's all I have this evening.
