History of First Ladies on U.S. Currency!

Martha Washington is the first and only woman to grace the primary portrait of U.S. paper currency. Martha Washington's image appears on the \$1 Silver Certificate. The certificates were first printed in 1886, six years after the first legal tender dollar bill featuring Washington was issued, a slightly re-designed Martha Washington also was produced in 1891.

It was the nation's second-longest issued paper money and as the name suggests was backed by the U.S. Government's silver deposits and could be redeemed at any time for silver from the U.S. Treasury.

## Editorial

Our By-Laws require that all officer positions are limited to two consecutive terms. This has presented problems in the past and may very well do so in the future.

If the younger members of the club are unwilling to serve in these positions, maybe it is time to amend the By-Laws to provide longer terms or to allow more than two consecutive terms. This could either be without qualification or could require a "super majority" (either 2/3 or 3/4) vote of the members.

Amending the By-laws is more difficult than most motions but is not onerous.

Of course, the simplest solution is for more people to step up to responsibility and agree to serve. Ask the guy sitting next to you when he served – it might surprise you to learn that some of us have served in both elected and appointed positions. As Will Penny said in the TV show of the same name, "No brag; just fact.", I myself have served both as president and VP as well as newsletter editor – twice.

The President shall preside at all meetings, conduct meetings, appoint committees, call for reports at monthly meetings, have final authority to settle all disputes, and shall answer directly to the membership.

The Vice-President shall preside over and conduct meetings in the absence of the president, recognize and greet visitors and new members, and introduce the speaker at each meeting. [by default, the VP actually recruits speakers]

The Secretary shall be responsible for the taking and reporting of official minutes of each meeting, accepting new memberships, and updating the membership list, keeping it current for any mail-outs. The Secretary shall sign all forms or papers requiring signatures including membership cards and certificates.

The Treasurer shall be responsible for all financial matters of the club, including the deposits and withdrawal of funds from club account(s), the payment of debts, and shall make a financial report to the membership at each club meeting. A written copy of the financial report should be available at each meeting for the membership to view. [By default, the Treasurer shops for and buys the prizes for the fundraiser raffles]

# Remains From 14th Century Shipwreck Discovered in Israel Contain Hundreds of Artifacts

A discovery made by Israeli archeologists truly sounds like it could be the plotline for the next [Pirates of the Caribbean](#) movie. Late in 2021, archeologists discovered the remains of two [sunken ships](#) filled with a trove of Roman treasures off the Mediterranean coast.

The ships' cargoes and their remains were found during an underwater survey conducted by the Marine Archeology Unit of the Israeli Antiquities Authority. Over the past two months, hundreds of Roman [silver and bronze coins](#) were discovered, dating back to the third century. More than 500 silver coins from the Middle Ages have also been found scattered around.

The ships and coins were discovered in shallow water, at a depth of about four meters. The finds were made near the ancient city of Caesarea, and can be dated to the Roman and Mamluk periods- around 1,700 and 600 years ago, respectively.

A number of ancient items were also discovered along with the coins. A bronze eagle symbolizing Roman rule was found in the sediment, along with a figurine of a Roman [pantomimus](#) in a comic mask, pottery vessels, and a number of bronze bells that were thought to help ward off evil spirits.

Metal items from the [hull of a wooden ship](#) were also uncovered. These finds include numerous large bronze nails, lead pipes from a bilge pump, and a large iron anchor that's been broken into many pieces.

[Jacob Sharvit and Drop Planer](#) of the Israel Antiquities Authority Marine Archeology Unit explain that the ships were probably ruined in bad weather: "The ships were probably anchored nearby and were wrecked by a storm. They may have been anchored offshore after getting into difficulty, or fearing stormy weather, because sailors know well that mooring in shallow, open water outside of a port is dangerous and prone to disaster." The fact that the large anchor is broken attests to the forces it withstood until it inevitably snapped in this storm.

Jacob Sharvit believes the Roman ship [originally came from Italy](#), based on the artifacts. However, it is unclear whether any sort of remnants of the original wooden ship could still be intact beneath the sand.

One of the most surprising treasures found beneath the surface is a Roman gold ring with a green gemstone carved with a figure of a shepherd carrying a sheep on his shoulders. Robert Cole, the head of the authority's coin department, called this ring "exceptional." He went on to explain that "on the gemstone is engraved an image of the 'Good Shepherd,' which is really one of the earliest symbols of Christianity.

## 800-Year-Old Medieval Chain Mail Vest From Norman Period Discovered in Longford, Ireland

A link to [Ireland's medieval](#) past was located in a shed after a chance encounter during Granard's Heritage Week this summer.

That find consisted of an authentic, stunningly well-preserved 800-year-old chain mail vest—called a hauberk—discovered fully intact.

Bartle D'Arcy, general manager of local heritage center Granard Knights & Conquests, was wearing a replica hauberk mid-August when some locals approached him and said they had one just like it in their shed.

"I was wearing a chainmail coif when some people from the locality in Longford approached me and said they had some of that in their shed, which utterly amazed me," D'Arcy told The Epoch Times.

"I said 'what do you mean you have some of that in your shed?'"

Three days later, they brought the vest in, which had been kept in a bucket for two years after it was found by an excavator doing drainage work.

“We thought we had a fragment, but we have the entire hauberk,” he said in a [statement](#) published by Longford Leader.

The chainmail vest is believed to date back to 1172 when the Normans arrived in Longford, linking it to Risteárd de Tiúit and construction of the timber-frame castle on the Motte in 1199, said the center’s education officer Déirdre Orme.

“We think it’s related to the Motte because chain mail is expensive,” D’Arcy added.

“Because it is a historical artifact, it is the property of the state and is now in the National Museum of Ireland.”

Danish archer Rolf Hammer, a re-enactor and medieval weapons expert at Knights & Conquests, examined the chain mail vest. He found no plier or saw marks on the ringlets, which means it could even predate the Normans.

“It could be older than the Norman period as it was found in the vicinity of a Ring Fort,” D’Arcy told The Epoch Times.

The hauberk was not found in Granard or on the Motte, said D’Arcy, but somewhere “close to here.” The person who found the hauberk is also being protected.

He believes that the water is what preserved it so well for so many years.

“It only rusts if you have water and air and if its only in water it survives,” he said, reported [Thejournal.ie](#). “When the digger brought it up it was in peat.”

The National Museum will take the artifact to work on it, but D’Arcy hopes to have it brought back to Longford to allow locals a rare glimpse into their heritage.
