Our 'all silver' fundraiser for June has 3 Morgan dollars (1884-O, 1896, 1921-S), a Columbian Exposition half dollar from 1893, 3 Peace dollars (1922-D, 1923-S, 1924), a 1941 Walking Liberty half dollar, a 1977 Mexico 100 pesos 72% silver coin, and a 2010 one ounce silver eagle!

We will also have some fun door prizes to give away.

Several manufacturers have announced new metal detector releases this summer. This seems to be the year of moderately priced machines with features that were previously only available on top of the line, considerably more expensive models.

On June 18th Garrett announced the 'Vortex' series of 3 Simultaneous Multi-Frequency detectors. To my knowledge this is the first series of detectors that can be upgraded to a more fully featured model just with a software download. No need to buy a new detector as you progress in the hobby! Early availability beginning in July.

Minelab has released the Xterra Elite, which appears to be a slightly simplified Equinox 700 at a very competitive price.

Nokta has added the Triple Score to their recently released 'Score' line. The Triple Score appears to be quite similar to their Legend detector but is slightly simplified and aggressively priced for its performance and features.

Man discovers hundreds of gold coins buried in his cornfield that could be worth millions

A man in Kentucky found 700 rare golden dollars from the Civil War era in his

cornfield that are estimated to be worth millions.

The loot, dubbed the "The Great Kentucky Hoard", could be worth a "six-figure price," according to <u>GovMint</u>, an authorized coin dealer. <u>Numismatic Guaranty Company</u> (NGC) certified the coins' authenticity and graded them.

"The importance of this discovery cannot be overstated, as the stunning number of over 700 gold dollars represents a virtual time capsule of Civil War-era coinage," rare coin dealer Jeff Garrett told NGC.

The coins are dated between 1840 and 1863, and include \$1 Gold Indians, \$10 Gold Libertys and \$20 Gold Libertys, according to GovMint, noting that the lattermost — a \$20 Gold Liberty from 1863 —c ould be worth millions.

The cache also includes "1863 Gold Liberty Double Eagles, a super-rare date that is scarce in all grades," the authentic dealer noted.

The discovery could also provide new insight into a bygone era.

Ryan McNutt, a conflict archaeologist and associate professor at Georgia Southern University, told <u>Live Science</u>: "Given the time period and the location in Kentucky, which was neutral at the time, it is entirely possible this was buried in advance of Confederate John Hunt Morgan's June to July 1863 raid."

Next came a huge surprise: a hidden room. The couple and their friends found a room when they moved some shelves in the basement.

"There was this piece of metal that's bolted to one of the stones," Mr. Krasnesky said. "We suspected that it probably went into a crawl space ... we pulled the metal off, and it turned out to be an entire room."

Mr. Krasnesky and his friends have since sifted through 6 inches (15 centimeters) of the room's 3 to 4 feet (0.9 to 1.2 meters) of dirt, using a homemade motorized sifter, to make sure no treasure goes undetected.

One of Mr. Krasnesky's most recent discoveries came after one of the couple's foster cats led them to a scattering of pennies under the floor after losing a toy mouse.

Mr. Krasnesky pulled out two jars of silver coins. Under another floorboard, he found a quarter from 1916 and a dime from the 1890s.

"Probably it was some little kid, 100 years ago, dropping pennies down through the floor," he said.
