## Vision Statement for TREK Teen Council

"Youth engagement is about empowering all young people as valuable partners in addressing and making decisions about issues that affect them personally and/or that they believe to be important." (Walking the Talk 2016, [www.yetoolkit.ca/content/what-is-youth-engagement](http://www.yetoolkit.ca/content/what-is-youth-engagement)) Youth engagement builds and strengthens youth adult relationships and promotes personal growth and development. Research shows that youth engagement results in healthier outcomes like reduction in substance abuse, decrease in suicide risk, improvement of academic performance, and development of coping techniques, self-care, critical thinking, and resilience. TREK Teen Council is a youth advisor group that is part of Mountain Youth Network. TREK is fully dedicated to practicing youth engagement. TREK activities are created by and for youth to promote skill-building and community involvement. We want students to "Be Heard" and "Give Back."

TREK Teen Council gives youth an opportunity to "Be Heard," amplifying their voice in our



community. The fresh perspective and unique insight from young people can be valuable; as one seventh grade student stated during a "What is TREK" presentation, youth voice is important because "we have good ideas" and "we are the future." TREK has a "Presentation Committee" for students who want to deliver important information to their

peers and their community. To date, TREK youth have spoken in front of county commissioners, City Council, Board of Education and multiple classrooms.

As a follow up to the Community Mapping Project, students were surveyed on possible improvement projects for youth-friendly environments within Clear Creek County. Youth evaluated ideas such as a new skate park, landscaping outside the Idaho Springs Public Library, a mural at Citizens Park, and a brand new youth space. Feedback was collected from students about which projects would be most meaningful to them and which projects they would volunteer to work on!

These potential projects, as well as many other events where TREK members are mobilized as volunteers, represent the "Give Back" component emphasized by TREK. Through TREK, students are connected to many opportunities to earn service hours. Following their participation in a recent project, feedback was collected from youth through a post-activity impact survey. Students stated they would do the activity again because "I liked helping my community" and "it made me feel better about myself."

This kind of involvement enhances community connectedness which is proven to build social-emotional skills resulting in positive mental health outcomes in youth. TREK encourages civic engagement, leadership and authentic relationships with adults... some of the cornerstones of youth engagement.
