Homegrown Talent Initiative

Clear Creek High School (CCHS), Red Rocks Community College and community leaders are coming together to support our students in finding their passions and developing skills for their future. This will happen through a program called the **Homegrown Talent Initiative** (HTI). HTI is facilitated by both **Colorado Succeeds** (CS) and the **Colorado Education Initiative** (CEI). By encouraging community collaboration to support students, HTI aims to provide a better and brighter view for their future.

The goals of this project are to help CCHS students find their interests and strengths, provide exposure to different career pathways and give them opportunities to gain actual work experience. "It's all about improving opportunities for our students, which is the point of public education." stated Mitch Houston, the school board president.

Clear Creek School District was selected to participate in Phase One (design) of HTI. Already, the design team has begun testing ways to expand career exploration. Career Panel Discussions and Career Talks have been organized at CCHS, including interaction with local FBI Special Agent, Retired, John Lipka. He talked about what it takes to be in the FBI and how to prepare for the future. Also as a result of HTI efforts, there are plans to install "**Project Bike Tech**" at CCHS; a high school elective that will be technical and experiential. Using the bicycle as a platform, students study math, geometry, physics, history, the environment, city planning, life skills and more (go to **projectbiketech.org** to learn more).

HTI should provide that very thing and help students prepare and plan for their future.

A very special community partner stepped up to support a significant work-based learning opportunity. Students in the Clear Creek School District have been asking for hands-on learning experiences that might help them pursue a career in an industry profession (while earning class credits). Thanks to the Homegrown Talent Initiative, Clear Creek High School got connected with Project Bike Tech (PBT). PBT is a program that prepares youth for career opportunities through bicycle education. The start-up of the program is a bit costly, however, our local Rotary Clear Creek 2000 generously donated \$5,000 to assist. Robert Smith, president of our Rotary stated, "Rotary Clear Creek 2000 has one main focus, the youth of Clear Creek County. This focus is absolutely critical to our future. By providing avenues of vocational training like Bike Tech, we help shape their future with options." PBT will launch in the fall for the 2020-2021 school year.
