The variety offered, the facilities provided, the fact that so few students are cut in most sports are all credits to the athletic side of the school. This year has seen its high and low points, from the garnering of first place in the National Catholic Swimming Championships to the disappointing loss of the track team at the Inter-Ac Finals (despite Malvern's monopoly on running events). It has seen standouts: Brian Kolmer and Brian Ameche in football, Rick Caron in cross-country and track, Charlie Ryan in basketball, Timmy McKee in swimming, Dan Howley in wrestling, and Fran Shannis in hockey. And of course there were more.

The following pages can hardly begin to tell the story of each individual contest, but for the athletes involved it should serve as a basis for remembering the glories and disappointments of the year.























Brian Kolmer breaks for big yardage against Penn Charter.


Football

In the words of Head Coach McGuinn, "Football was a tremendous disappointment in that we had a very experienced team back again to defend the Inter-Ac championship, which we failed to do. . . . All in all, some fine games, some tremendous individual efforts, there were high points of the season . . . , but with this, mediocre performances." Of course, success is relative, and if this season was not successful, it was partly due to the high standards set by coaches and the team. But while many breaks went Malvern's way in 1969, almost none turned out its benefit this year.


With only three weeks training before the first game with Valley Forge, a disappointing 6-6 tie ensued. The following 14-0 defeat of Pius X still did not indicate a team capable of taking the Inter-Ac by storm.

The next game, a 48-7 massacre of Germantown, was particularly satisfying, since G. A.





Above, right: Soph Don Dougherty proved himself a skilled signal caller in tight situations. Left: John Leahy takes a pass from Dougherty against Episcopal.




Brian Kolmer breaks for big yardage against Penn Charter.

had been the only Inter-Ac team to defeat Malvern in 1969. The disaster that followed, a 21-0 loss to Episcopal, was one of the mediocre performances mentioned by McGuinn. This loss certainly dampened spirits, yet McGuinn pushed the team harder than ever in preparing them for the next game with Haverford. There the Friars rolled up over twice the Ford's yardage, and outplayed Haverford throughout. Yet, leading 6-0 on the Haverford 29, on second down the Friars threw an interception which resulted in a runback to the Malvern 36. The Fords scored and kicked the extra point, winning the game 7-6. Despite the emotional let-down, Malvern came back with decisive victories over Chestnut Hill and Penn Charter. The Friars ended the season on a high point, a valiant win over the powerful Salesianum team, 8-7. It was here that Brian Kolmer went over the 1000 vard mark in vardage.


Malvern's defensive line in the Haverford game, where they held the Fords to seventy-seven yards, is watched intently by the ref, himself a graduate of Haverford (State).









Left: Ameche blocks for Leahy. Below, left: Shields shows the running ability which often aided Malvern.










Cross Country

Although the Friars again failed to produce a league championship this year (finishing the season with a 3-2 Inter-Ac log), the season had its share of excitement, as Rick Caron swept every meet he was in, setting several records in the process.

Malvern produced its first victory when Caron, John Clarke, and Paul Fickinger took the top three spots in the 46-17 crushing of Germantown. The next meet saw the high point of the fall season, when Rick Caron broke the Malvern course record with a time of 12:41, as P. S. D. went under 39-17. Following two defeats at the hands of Episcopal and Haverford, and a second place berth in a meet with Kennedy and Kennrick, Malvern scored wins over Chestnut Hill and Penn Charter. Out of over one hundred participants, Caron and Clarke finished fifth and sixth respectively in Class "C" at the Catholic War Veterans meet. Caron was not able to compete at the Penn Charter Invitational, but Clarke and Fickinger finished fourth and tenth out of fifty runners.









Basketball

Each year, the basketball team, despite a good deal of of raw talent, has some trouble fulfilling its potential. In recent years, its record in Inter-Ac play has been somewhat disappointing. 





















SAMILACE DESIGNATION OF THE PROPERTY SWIMMERS

Tim McKee, All-American, Most Valuable Swimmer at the National Catholics, and so on, was the athlete at Malvern this year.

Swimming

The omega point of the '70-'71 sports year came in late February when Malvern took first place in the National Catholic Championships. Except for two losses (to the Navy Plebes, and Hill School), the Friars had no trouble rolling over the opposition, breaking team and pool records throughout the season.

The season was expected to be a good one, since fourteen lettermen returned from the year before, including five All-Americans. Naturally, most people outside the school register "Malvern Prep swimming" as synonymous for "Tim McKee." Although this is unfair to standouts Steve McDonald, Steve Jakabowski, Chris McKee, Harry Hurley, and the rest of the team, one can understand the strong identification of McKee with Malvern, considering his accomplishments, especially his representing Malvern in the Pan American Games in Columbia.

Holder of the National Prep School Record in the 100 Yard Backstroke, outstanding swimmer in the National Catholics, and All-American in more than one event, McKee is the kind of swimmer who can start in any event and win it.

To praise McKee is not to put down the rest of the team. It took more than Tim to win the National Catholics; at the Inter-Ac Championships the Friars took seven of eleven gold medals. In fact, the depth of the team has led Coach Hornsleth to predict an even better squad in '72, despite the loss of McKee.








Senior Harry Hurley gets warmed up before the \mbox{meet} with Episcopal.






Harry Hurley congratulates Chris McKee.







