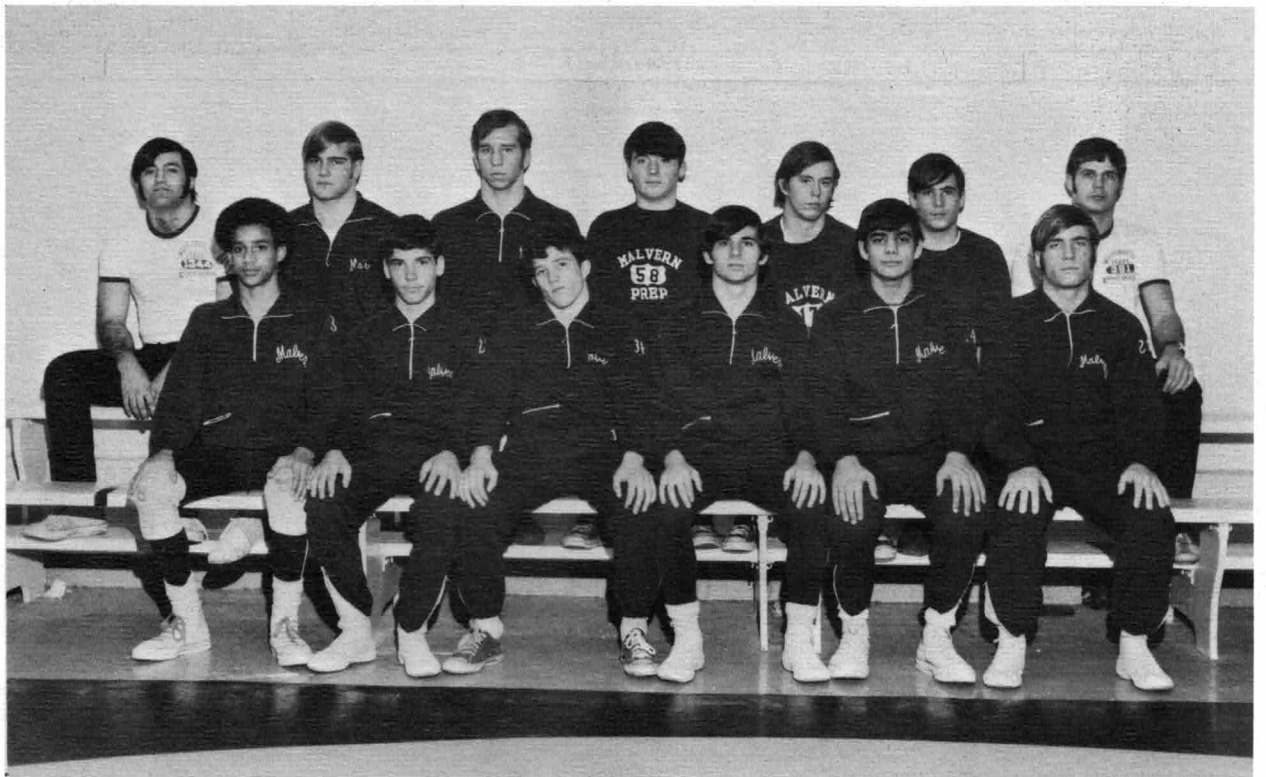
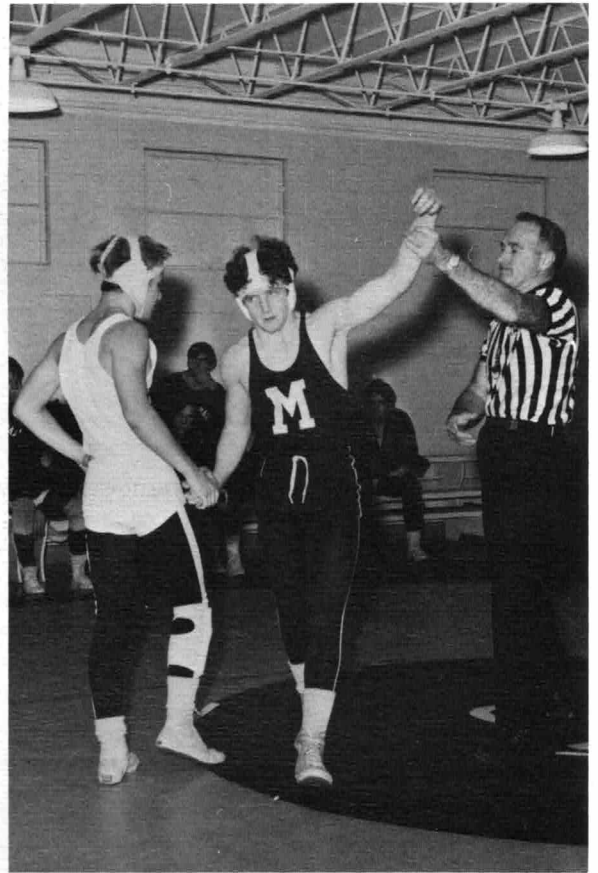


Wrestling

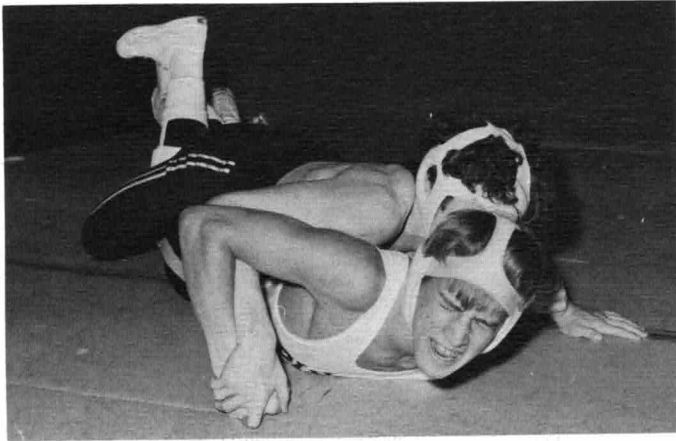

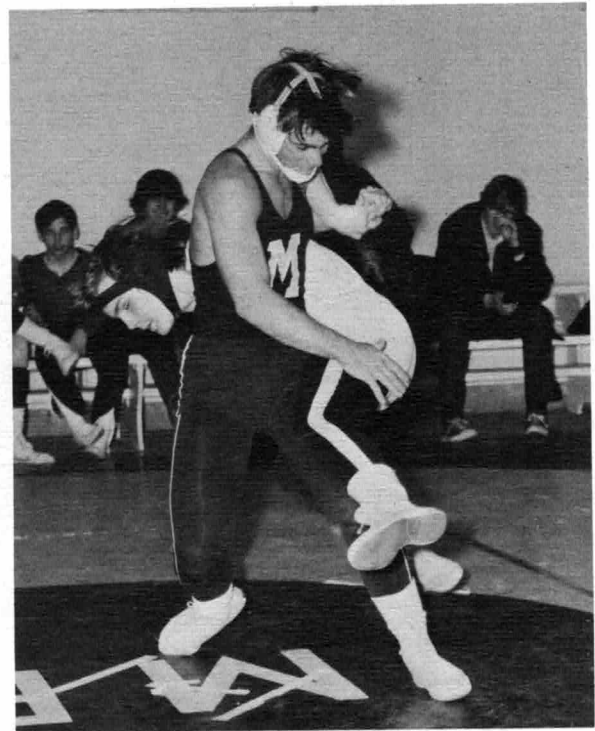

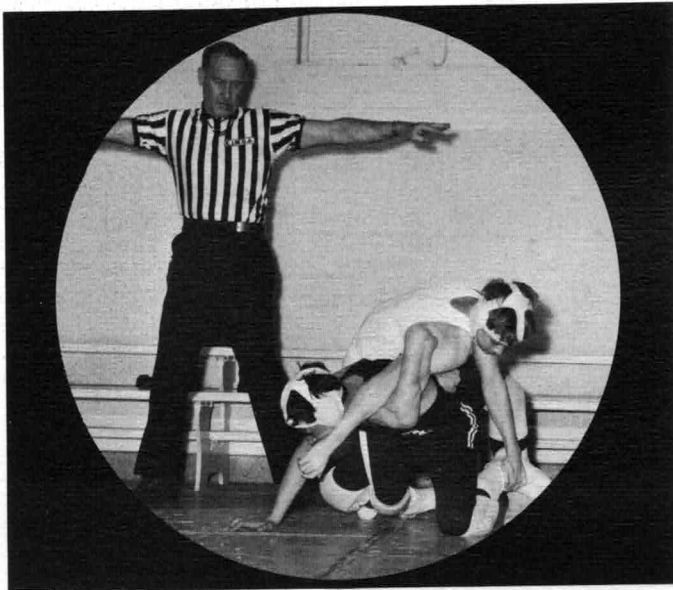

Mike Collins breaks free from his foe's hold, and picks up points.

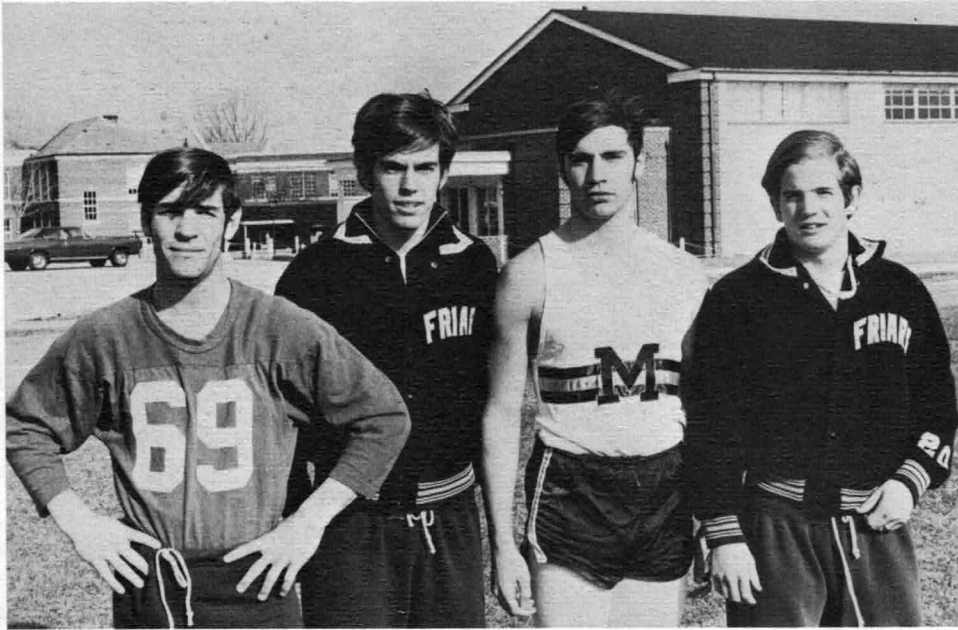

Malvern's winter track team has discovered that being a varsity sport and being a crowd puller are not the same thing. Lost amidst basketball, wrestling, hockey, and swimming, winter track has a hard time getting new participants or even spectators. Still, Malvern took at least one medal in every meet, proving that it could win despite the lack of support. Rick Caron, fresh from the cross-country season, started things off right by setting a fieldhouse record in the 1000 Yard Run at West Chester State, while Steve Klug took second in the 600 Yard Run. The four-lap relay team consistently showed its ability.

Next year the loss of Caron, Kincade, and Fickinger should be offset by improved performances by the underclassmen, but without more student support, the team will still be limited in what it can do.

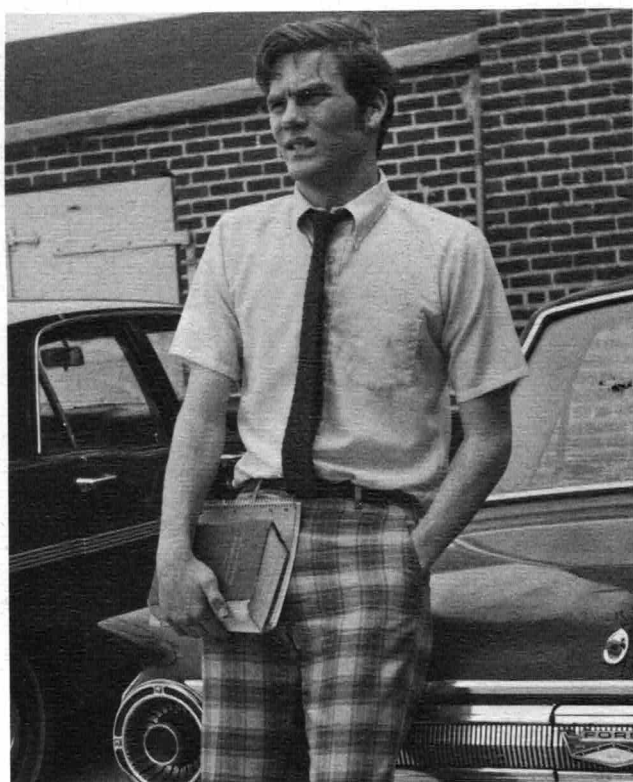

Rifle

For the past two years, the rifle team has not managed a single win. In his three years as coach, Fr. Havener admits that the first season (with a 3-7 record) was the best. In '69, however, almost the entire team graduated, making for a totally unexperienced squad in 1970. This year, with a little more experience under their belts, they scored an average of ten points higher than the previous season. Despite this improvement, they lost every match, although they dropped one meet by only one point (481-480), and two by four.

Fr. Havener points out that in choosing the team, he has gone by shooting scores alone. This has resulted in the loss of potentially good shooters, who do poorly in the beginning simply because of inexperience with a gun. Starting in 1972, he will pick the team by means of visual perception alone. Expertise with the gun will come later with practice.

The year had one moment of glory. In the SPIRA Individuals meet, Malvern was the only school to place two shooters in the top ten, with Jack Kennedy (third) and Paul Maschmeyer (sixth).

Ice Hockey

Compared to last season's team which did not cop a win in eight meets, the present squad has done wonders; the results reaped by this year's rink rats rate nothing short of miraculous, finishing with a 6-6-1 record, and second place berth in the Western Division of the Inter-County Scholastic League. The gutsy and spirited play displayed in 1970 was still to be seen, but with a great deal more skill and ability. The early morning hours for practice were still ungodly at times, but it was a sacrifice that the team seemed perfectly willing to make.

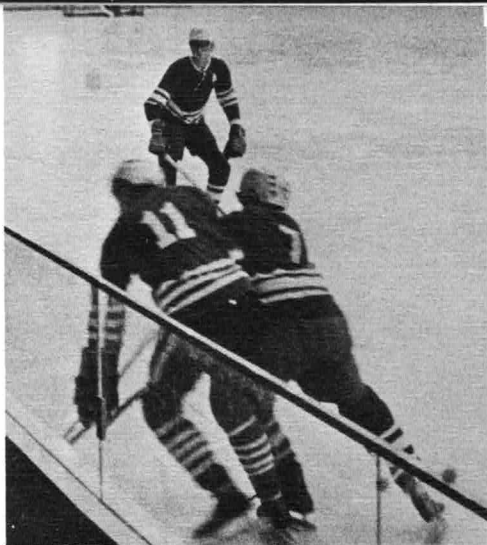

Baseball

Although, as Coach Ryan expressed it, Malvern "could have done better," the 1971 baseball squad was still somewhat improved over the '70 team. Despite the disheartening 4-7 record, the Friars maintained a great attitude all season. Moreover, there were standout players, most of whom will be returning next year. Charlie Sullivan was the outstanding pitcher of '71, with three of the four wins. Ed Sirhal kept the opposing fielders on their toes with his fine batting abilities on defense, second baseman Mike Murray showed considerable talent and even more potential. As for overall performance at the plate and on the field, Seniors Chris Clair and Rick Hoberg consistently aided the Friars.

The team had been expected to finish with a better record than it did. There was a good deal of raw talent which never was tapped. The Friars never really got off the ground. At the same time, however, the JV finished with nine wins and no losses. With most of the varsity returning and members of the JV moving up to varsity, the outlook for next season is good.

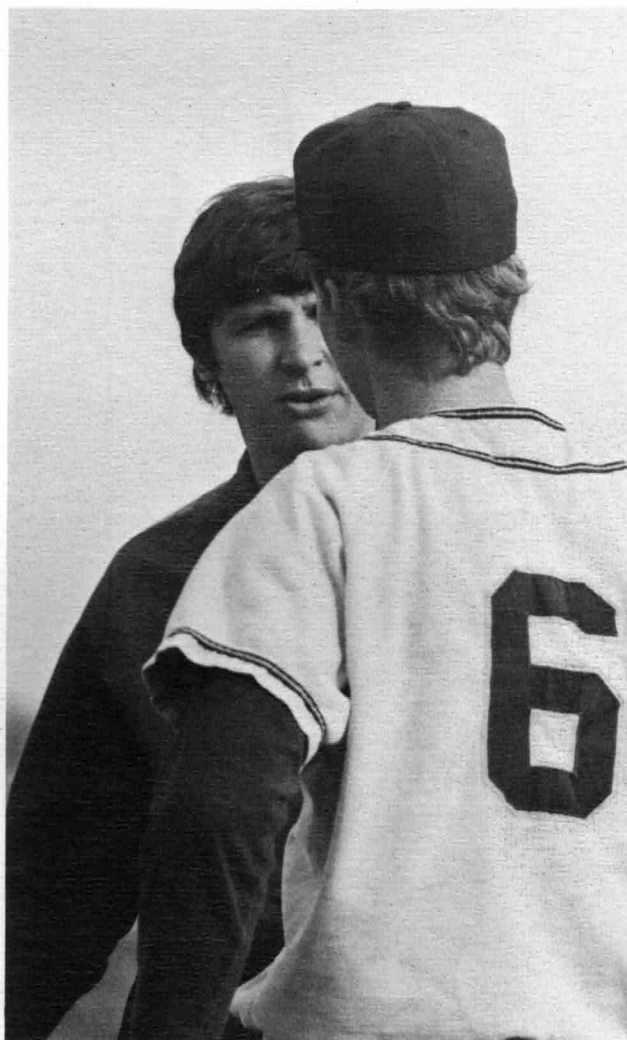
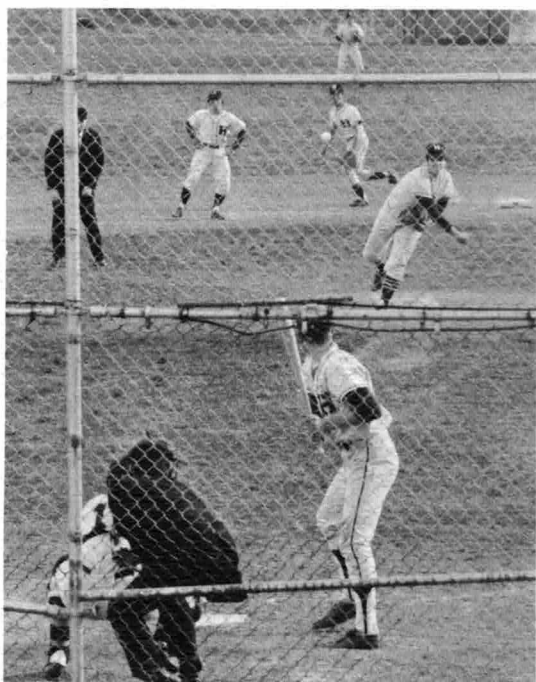


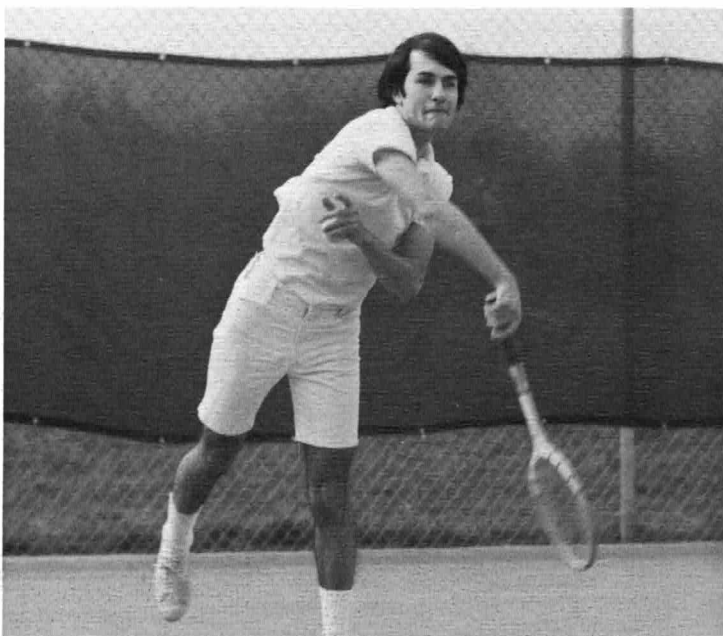

TD: Thanks, Mr. Lotstein.



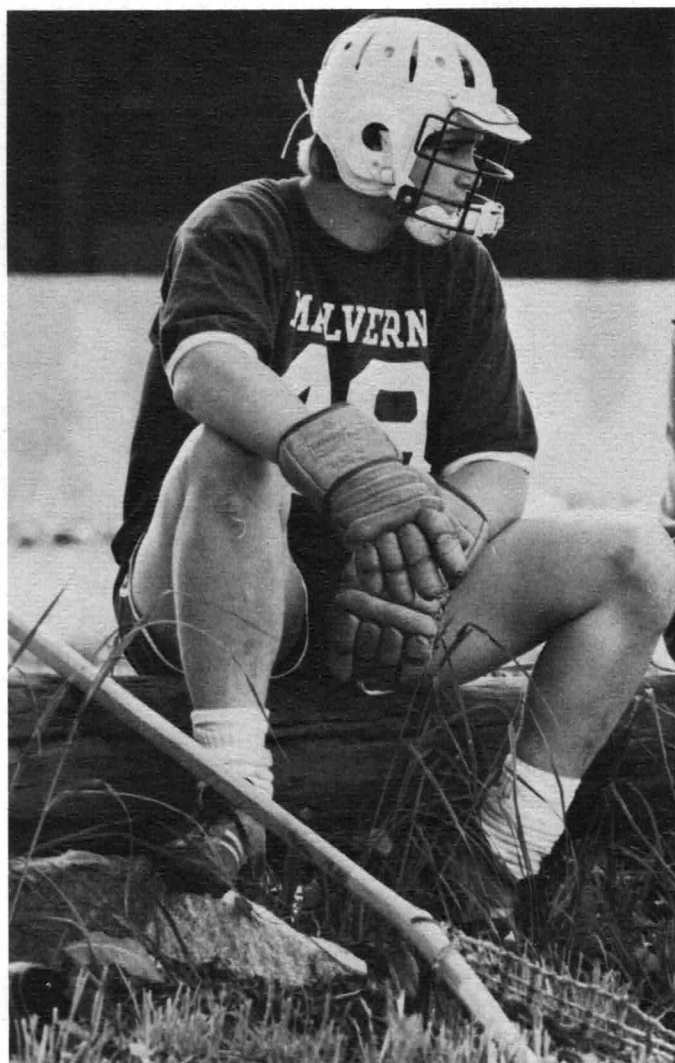
Lacrosse

This spring, in a rather bold statement, Athletic Director McGuinn stated that, despite the swimming team's outstanding performance, the team Malvern should be proudest of is the lacrosse team. To be sure, many would take exception to this evaluation, but it nevertheless brings out an important point. McGuinn's reasoning is that, even more so than hockey, lacrosse is an alien and strange sport to Malvern students, and yet the members of the team were willing to overcome their unfamiliarity, and did an admirable job against much more experienced teams.

There was some mid-season trouble when Bob Hall left the team as coach, and McGuinn, assisted by Dan Howley, took on coaching duties. Still the team endured. Senior John Corcoran was the leading scorer by far with fourteen goals, followed by Alan Ameche with five. Although the leading point-getter was a Senior, out of a list of nine Friar scorers, six were underclassmen.

Next year, as all the lacrosse players become more used to the sport, and more adept in its execution, the spirit of the team could result in the compiling of a much better record.

With the Spring, Brian Ameche began the lacrosse season, having finished with football and wrestling.

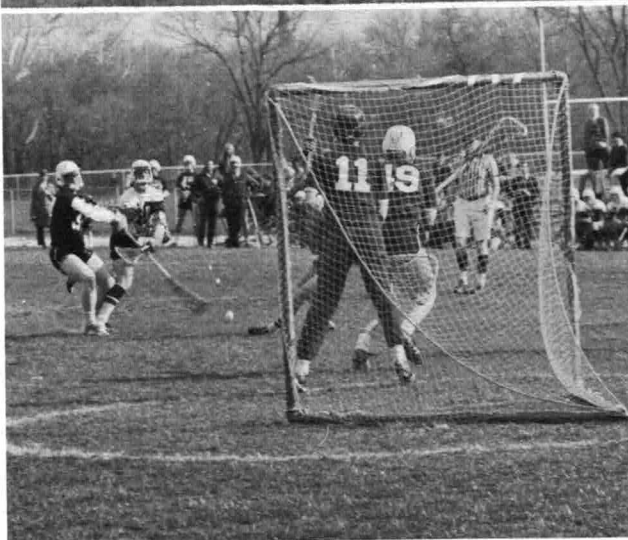

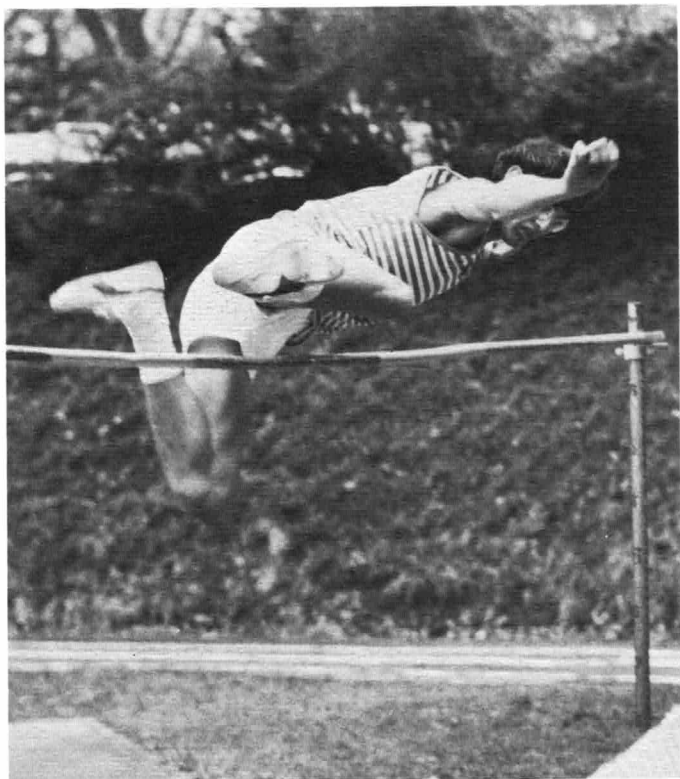

Lack of depth ruined the '71 track team's chances of being one of the best in Malvern's history, but it did not mar the fine individual records and efforts of many runners. Perhaps if Brian Kolmer had not been injured early in the season, and with a few more men in the field, Malvern could have finished with an exceptional win-loss record. As it was, the Friars ended the season with a 2-2 dual meet record, and second place in the Inter-Ac Finals, but achieved greatness in several individual performances.

At the start of the season, Ed Kincade tied the school record for the 100 Yard Dash (10.0 seconds) at a practice meet on March 30. At the Penn Relays, Malvern captured the Inter-Ac mile relay for the second straight year (with Kincade, Caron, Pickering, and Klug running), and took fifth in the National Prep School 440 Yard Relay (the same team ran, with Simpson in for Caron). The dual meet season itself was a mere preparation for the Inter-Ac Championships.

There the Friars dominated almost every running contest. Kincade took first in both the 100 Yard Dash, and the 220 Yard. Steve Klug grabbed the top spot in the 440 and the 880. Rick Caron won the one mile, while John Clarke got first in the two mile race. Mike Hobson tied for first in the high jump. The mile relay team of Pickering, Cooney, Leonard, and Hobson also picked up a gold medal. But the depth of Episcopal was enough to defeat Malvern, 65-57. Despite the disappointing loss, the Friars could be justly proud for their fine effort on the track.

Golf

With five out of six starting golfers graduating last year, and only two veterans returning in '71, Mr. Hoffner did not expect an especially successful golf season, but rather planned for a "building year." Actually, the record shows a respectable performance by the team, even if it was a drop from the 8-4-1 log of the year before.

In the extremely competitive Inter-Ac contests, Malvern won three matches. Fine performances at all times were handed in by Denny Pilotti, Sam Forese, and others. Forese, Dan O'Sullivan, Bob Morse, and Bill Gibson will all be returning next year, and should set the links afire. According to Hoffner, despite the loss of Pilotti, with the mortality rate of the other teams, Malvern should better that 6-6 record considerably.
