

Indiana Governor's Awards

This From Wikipedia: "The Governor of the U.S. state of Indiana can bestow five types of awards: the *Sagamore of the Wabash*, the Circle of Corydon, the Distinguished Hoosier, the Honorary Hoosier, and the *Sachem Award*."

Ken Toler sent off some information about Indiana awards with names that are familiar to our Order. He notes that Indian/Native American values are still recognized in the political-social system of our state today!

The Sagamore of the Wabash Award is Indiana's "highest honor, which the Governor of Indiana bestows. It is a personal tribute usually given to

those who have rendered a distinguished service to the state or to the governor. Among these who have received Sagamores have been astronauts, presidents, ambassadors, artists, musicians, politicians, and ordinary citizens who have contributed greatly to our Hoosier heritage." The award was started by Indiana governor Ralph Gates (1945-49) in response to being made a Kentucky Colonel. They are awarded at the discretion of each governor. The Sachem Award is more exclusive with only one awardee per year. It was stated with Governor Edgar D. Whitcomb in 1970 to recognize "a group of business, industry, publishing, banking and legal leaders, who served as state hosts, welcoming visitors to Indiana and promoting the state's culture and economy." It was dissolved in 1989. Governor Mitch Daniels revived the award in 2005. Last year's winner was Clay Robbins, Chairman and CEO of Lilly Endowment. In 2022, the Endowment pledge up to \$85,000,000 to improve reading skills for students (Kindergarten - Grade 2). Another Degree of the Improved Order of Red Men

RAINMAKERS OF AMERICA.

A call for a special session of the Haymakers' Association was held at the Great Council office March 13, 51 representatives responding. On vote it was unanimously agreed to change the name of the organization to "Rainmakers of America." The Committee on Ritual and Ceremony in a lengthy report established an entire new ritual, signs, passwords, etc., very ably compiled by Thomas K. Donnalley, Richard Tongue and Harry Harmer. Lewis List presided, Charles J. Foulkes was secretary and John Esher, treasurer. Among the gathering were Brothers J. L. Keiser, of Pittsburg; Brown, of Lancaster; Troxel, of Allentown; Dillsher, of Catasauqua; Tindle, of Reading; Reifsnnyder, of Pottstown; Stroh, of Berwyn; Culathar, of Stroudsburg; McIntyre, of Doylestown; Corson, of Willow Grove, and many local Red Men. Lancaster sent a delegation of six past chiefs. The new ritual will be distributed to all loyal lodges.

The new degree of Rainmakers is taken from the beautiful legends and work of the Mondamin Indians, which will instill, it is claimed, more patriotism and advancement due the parent body. Several representatives to the Great Council were present and heartily approved the exemplification of the new order as clean, God-fearing and patriotic. The district deputies have arranged the degree teams and many incidentals to further the work.



Just when you thought that the Improved Order of Red Men had come up with *enough* different "side degrees" another has come to light.

As you can see the Rainmakers of America was in the works in 1915—enough that "an entire new ritual, signs, passwords, etc." were in hand when brought before the Pennsylvania Great Council of Haymakers. An offshoot of the Haymakers, the initiation of new members is buffoonery, meant to humble new initiates and have fun. There is little of the "beautiful legends and work of the Mondamin Indians" to be found. Like the Haymakers, it was associated with a tribe and carried the designation of "½" associated with the tribe number.

Why they felt the need to create *another* "fun" side degree isn't clear.

Pennsylvania was always a hotbed of tribal activity. Did this degree ever get traction outside of that reservation? I don't know. It seems that the degree dried up in the early 1940s.

P. G. I. Thomas K. Donnalley (1890-91) had a hand in the crafting of the ritual in 1915. He had been a member since 1860 as well as a member of side degrees: Chieftain's League and Degree of Pocahontas. He was also a member of the Grand Army of the Republic (serving in the Union), Odd Fellows, the Elks, Knights of Pythias, Knights of the Golden Eagle, and Free and Accepted Masons.

Ritual of the Rainmakers Degree (1916)

A Quirk with a Degree of the Improved Order of Red Men

In Issue 2 (page 6) of *Following the Hunt*, I wrote about the side degree, “National Haymakers Association.” I had thought that they fizzled out but past Great Incohonee Avery said that there are a few left.

I ran across a contemporary reference to the “Permanent Haymakers Association,” a side-degree of the Order. It was formed at the same time or could be the same organization with another name. The earliest reference to the Permanent Haymakers Association that I can find is an 1880 newspaper.

The National Haymakers' Association appears in newspapers in 1882, but was incorporated on January 4, 1890. Later on March 18, 1893, the Pennsylvania reservation, which always seems to be in the middle of things, created the “State Haymakers' Association of Pennsylvania” as a subservient organization. The state association went into abeyance and attempted to charter itself as a separate, independent organization in 1915. Their petition was rejected by the state of Pennsylvania.

Indiana’s Haymakers state association first formed in 1893 in Frankfort (see right).


**A State Organization Effected at Frankfort
—Election of Officers.**

FRANKFORT, June 18.—[Special.]—In response to a call issued by George W. Poague, D. S. P., of the national haymakers' association of the United States, an organization for members of the Improved Order of Red Men, the representatives and past chief haymakers of the state met in convention last evening in the wigwam of Dakota association of this place and perfected a state association.

Representatives were present from all over the state and a jolly time was their lot. The officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows:

Past State President—George W. Poague of Flora.
State President—Miles K. Moffett, Connersville.
Vice-State President—Harry C. Keeler, Richmond.
State Secretary—Charles E. Nobes, Flora.
State Treasurer—Perry Barr, Muncie.
First Farmer—D. G. Niblack, Anderson.
Second Farmer—C. M. Leisure, Frankfort.
Guard of Barn Door—A. J. Barrack, Clay City.
Guard of Hay Loft—O. M. Gardner, Mellott.
Trustees—J. W. Mitchell, Lafayette; C. C. Brown, Pendleton; A. N. McNees, Farmland.
State Representative to National Association—George W. Poague.

After the installation the state association adjourned to meet at Anderson the 3rd Wednesday of May, 1894.

Red Men's Hall, Franklin, Indiana

NEW HOME FOR MINEOLA TRIBE, I. O. R. M.



The members of Mineola Tribe, I. O. R. M. will have one of the finest lodge homes in the state upon the completion of the new building now in process of construction to replace the former business room and lodge hall destroyed by fire in January. The contract for the building is held by Roy Bryant, local contractor, and the building is

to be ready for occupancy sometime in December.

The lower floor of the new building will be occupied by the offices of the Interstate Public Service Company, a lease for ten years having already been signed. The entire second floor will be used for lodge purposes. This floor has been specially designed for various lodge

functions.


The building is of structural steel and concrete construction and will be absolutely fireproof throughout. The girders for the walls and second floor have already been placed and the concrete floor on the street level has already been laid. When complete and equipped the building will represent an investment of \$65,000.

Red Men's Hall, Franklin, Indiana

A Mineola Tribe No. 37 was formed by 1875 in Urbana(?). However, the Mineola Tribe No. 86 we are interested in was formed in Franklin during November 1889 at Hulsman Hall. It and chartered (evidently) on December 26 of that year. By 1914, the tribe had 425 members and at one time boasted between 750 and 1000 members.

In 1914, the Mineola Wigwam Association was created to sell \$30,000 in preferred stock (\$100 par) paying 5% every April and October. Another \$30,000 in common stock (\$100 par) were reserved by the tribe. All of this paid for the new wigwam, the first floor of which was rented out.

The tribe seems to have survived World War II but disappeared from newspapers after 1946.

Membership Pocket Medallions

One item created for members was a membership medallion. It does not depict any of the official symbols or seals of the Order, but has a generic profile of a native with arrow, spear, peace pipe, wampum belt (?), tomahawk, and warclub.

This particular medallion was made in at least two styles. The first is in bronze and the second is in brass (or gilt white metal).

This reverse of this medallion of the bronze medallion has the small inscription "IN THE WHITEHEAD & HOAG CO. NEWARK, N. J." The other is blank. Both were meant to allow you to engrave your name and tribal information.
