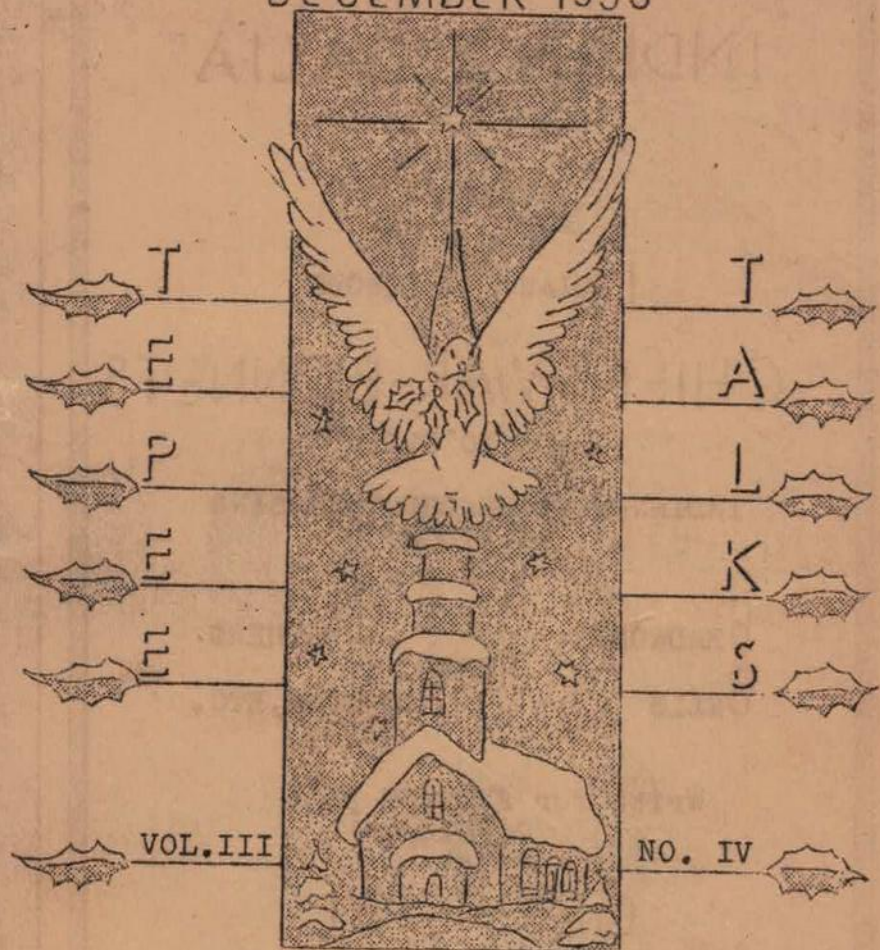

Oct. 23 found us in Plymouth where we enjoyed another very fine supper with Contought Council #44. We were pleased to hear that they had won a \$20.00 prize in the parade. HAMMONASSETT TRIBE #1, New Haven, by-passed their 67th Birthday on Nov. 1. However, it being an odd year, they will make it up in deeds. Currently, they are busy on our 3rd precept, Charity. Sachem Joe Vollano has appointed a committee of five, headed by PGS. Phil K. Hekeler, to scout and train an amateur show to perform on the March of Dimes Anniversary. Other committee members are; E.E. Raffone-Lewis Scarpa, Jr. - Thomas Vollano and Harold Finck.

Hammonasset's Degree Team, not only are famous in this Reservation, but they have also achieved National fame. Long before their Flag Drill history was evolved by the late PGS. St. Clair T. Corson, they made a mark in Binghampton and Rochester, N.Y. During the 1950 Great Council Session of the U.S., in Atlantic City, their Flag Drill was heralded as an epic rendition in that memorable Pageant in Convention Hall, augmenting the fine performance of Konckopotanaught Tribe and Kyeta Council of Bridgeport. Past Sachem George Schmittgall narrated the Flag history. His retentative memory has enabled him to take several parts of the various Degrees, notably that of the sanguinary Senior Sagamore.

On Nov. 20, the team trailed to Okenuck's (#49) newly purchased wigwam at 707 New Stratford Road, where they exemplified the All-American Degree, under the direction of Harold Finck, Tribal Junior Sagamore, who is the new Sachem of the Team. Few men have taken the Sachem's part in the All-American Degree, all being specialists. (see next page)

Up to the merging of Ninigret-Ansantawe with Hammonasset in Aug. 1936, P.S. Clair H. Newton had filled that part; then came Geo. B. Mullett until 1947, followed by Noah Weiner to Mar. 1952, when August Ghirardini took the post. His removal to North Carolina, brought about the training of the present Degree Sachem, Harold Finck. The Flag Drill, now in its 25th year, has been narrated by Geo. Schmittgall and Joe Vollano. Bro. Schmittgall has also filled the role of Metamora.

The highlights of the Taylor-Hummel testimonial Dinner on Nov. 14th, was the presence of Cecil R. Holden, Great Sachem of Massachusetts, his charming wife; Great Senior Sagamore Wm. J. Pettipas of Gloucester; Great Junior Sagamore S. LeRoy French of Lynn; Great Chief of Records and PGS. Frank E. Henry (also ye Editor) and P.G.S. Hector G. Langlois of Attleboro. All of Massachusetts. From "Little Rhody", were Great Sachem Charles Goodheart and Great Junior Sagamore, Geo. E. Millington. Also present were the entire board of Great Chiefs of the Degree of Pocahontas, Great Pocahontas Adolina Gorham and her suite. Great Sachem Harold Horn, his Great Chiefs, and his Extension & Organization Committee, were jubilant in the success of their efforts. Over 250 crowded to capacity, the beautiful ballroom of the Stratfield Hotel. A dynamic Address was made by PGS. Walter T. Gross, G.C. of R. of Pa. and Dep. G.C. of R. of the U.S., who represented the Great Inchoonee. He gave a graphic summary of what is expected of the membership of our Order. 68TH GREAT COUNCIL SESSION

The kindling of the Great Council Fire at Middletown, Rhode Island, on Oct. 24, 1953, was somewhat delayed, due to the lateness in the arrival of its members. Some of them would have grumbled audibly when they were Sachems of their respective Tribes. 10 A.M. means 10 A.M. in the morning, an ALL Hunting Grounds.

D.G.I. Harry B. Albro, (native Rhode Islander and adopted Cape Codder), was heartily welcomed when introduced, after being escorted into the Wigwam by the Past Greats, present, together with PGS Hector Langlois, acting as Great Tocakon; Gt. Sr. Sagamore William C. Villemaire of N.H.; Gt. Sachem Harold Horn of Conn.; G.J.S. Andrew M. Andrejski, of Conn., and others received a welcome when they arrived, later. Most of those, who would have been interested, have no doubt, already been informed of the business transacted. The following Chiefs were raised to their respective stations: Gt. Prophet, Henry E. Williams; Gt. Sachem, Charles Goodheart; G.S.S. Frank Foster; G.J.S. Geo. Millington; G.C.R. Chester Staats; G.K.W., John E. Bassett. At the time of nominations, P.S. John Francis, candidate for G.J.S. sprung a surprise by renouncing his candidacy in favor of Geo. Millington. This gesture brought forth hearty applause and gave George a unanimous vote, for the record.

DGI Albro called PGS Seddie Williams to the Stump and surrendered to him, the honor of presenting the P.G.S. Jewel and the Great Inchoonee's lapel button to his son, Henry. This rare honor was first bestowed on Seddie when he nominated Henry to the Stump of G.J.S. and has continued each Great Sun. The final proud duty was performed mid a moment of emotional silence which was followed by thunderous applause. (see next page).

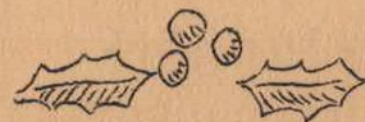

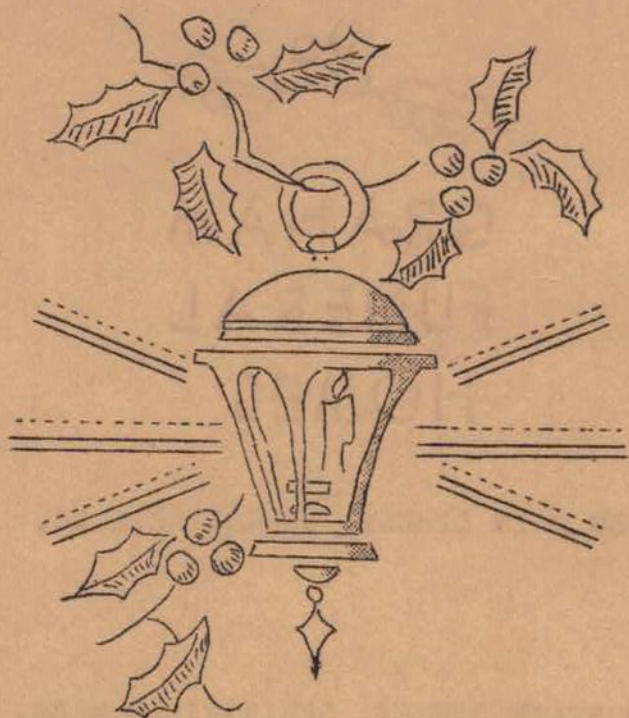
