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## Zoom Meeting with Fr. Alphonse, Regarding St. Pierre Medical / Dental Clinic and Mirebalais Haiti, June 28, 2021

Present: Dominique, Bill & Valerie, Mark, Tom, Jan

Purpose of this Zoom meeting was to learn more about the current conditions in Mirebalais and how our friends and clinic were faring in these troubled times. We also wanted to discuss with Fr. Alphonse what their current needs were and how we could assist.

#### General

- Fr. Alphonse that his family and the clinic staff were well. The clinic has soap, bleach and products for disinfection as well as face masks.
- He reported that two priests known to Dominique had died. Father Fritz Lafontant died from COVID-19. (He founded a medical clinic in Cange, Haiti and later was joined by Dr. Paul Farmer and developed Zanmi Lasante) and another from Port au Prince.
- Violence has not been as much of an issue in Mirebalais but there has been some gang activity and reports of people trying to get to Port au Prince have been shot at.
- Re: Rate of Inflation Current exchange rate is 91.04 Gourdes/US dollar. A gallon of gasoline when it is available is 1000 Gourdes (\$10.98 US). Motorcycle taxis charge 100 Gourds for a ride = about a dollar US.

#### **Generator Building Construction and Clinic Re-organization**

- There will be two rooms as they wanted a one room for the generator and compressor (used in the dental suite) and a room to store extra medications. While we are happy that they have extra medications but expressed concern that the exterior building would be safe for drugs. Father assured us that the room would be locked and the reinforced windows would provide the needed security.
- The power supply boxes have been mounted for the generator and compressor.
- There is adequate room between the new construction and the stairs leading to the second story of the clinic.
- The generator is working well and is used frequently as the local power supply is not stable. A man from the parish is paid to come monthly to do the routine maintenance.
- The pediatrician is currently occupying the room next to the pharmacy which used to be the laboratory. The laboratory is now located in the back room which previously was the first dental room and then medication storage area.

The clinic now has a water supply from the well in the courtyard! The toilet flushes and the bathroom sink and shower work!

The clinic as been helpful to the community by seeing additional patients when the hospital has had strikes or closures.

The clinic charges 50Gds (US 0.55) per visit. If a person is unable to pay, they are seen anyway. Children from Sts. Pierre & Louis are seen free of charge as are the priests and nuns. Children from Desvarrieux are not often seen at the clinic, but when they come, they are not charged for treatment.



#### **Clinic Employee Compensation**

- All employees have been there for at least 5 years except for the pediatrician who has been there for 2 years.
  - O ACTION: HOM EC agreed to include ALL employees when considering pay increases.
- Discussion of options: One time bonus payment vs. percentage increase
- There are currently 15 employees (including the pediatrician). Fr. Alphonse gave their names and job titles to Dominique.
- We do not know why Dr. Cadet has never received a raise.
- Fr. Alphonse related that the staff would like to have a paid lunch. He thought it would cost approximately 50 Gds/day/person.  $\{(50 \times 5 \times 15)/91\} = $41/\text{week}$
- Currently the staff take a 20-minute break and usually purchase their lunch at a nearby market or the Micah food project in the courtyard.
  - O **ACTION: HOM EC** agreed to review our budget and see what we were able to do.

Fr. Alphonse requests that we not forget him in considering funding. Gas for his missions and cost of living is very high.

ACTION: HOM EC suggested that we consider a donation to his Discretionary Fund. He
was agreeable to this suggestion and we said that we would consider the budget and what we
could afford.

#### Medications

The medications that we sent were wonderful and badly needed. They would love to have another shipment but traveling to Port au Prince is not an option and very unsafe at the current time.


We suggested that Father see if there was a way that we could have medications delivered to the hospital in Mirebalais under his or Dr. Cadet's name. He will check out that possibility.


They are currently buying some medications in Mirebalais and some are brought in from The Dominican Republic.

This email is to thank you for your two ways donation. I want to let you know that this time as Christmas was at hand, I did not buy food. I made the decision to give directly the money to the people of the parish, and I chose the Christmas day.

We distributed envelopes with 500 gourdes to everyone who participated to the feast at the Eucharist. They where Surprised to receive the money and some of them made the decision to contribute when they are able to support others. After the distribution to the ladies and men at church, in the afternoon I went to some vendors and motorcycle taxis drivers around the rectory and I did the same thing for them.

A) Gift From the Heart

Money received from HOM: US 2000 for Gift from the heart @ 65 Gourdes for US 1 = 130 000 Gourdes

Distribution of money for Christmas

At church: 220 people @ 500 gourdes to one person = 110 000 Gourdes

In the streets: 40 people @ 500 gourdes to one person = 20 000 Gourdes

#### Dear McNeece Dear Guva Michel

I apologize for the delay of transmitting this report because I was too busy with the patronal feast, August 16 to August 25<sup>th</sup>. Thank you for the money, you Guva and HOM sent so "Le Don Du Coeur" (LDDC) can feed 500 families from the parish. The last distribution was August 7. I gave kits to 500 families and I helped some of the poorest parishes.

Through this feeding week at a very difficult moment for my people, we showed the presence of the Church for those who are suffering and we showed our fraternal solidarity to them. Thanks to God and thanks to you, we really supported our vulnerable families in the parish. You count a lot for me and for the mother Church. I do not find words to translate or to explain how I appreciate your solidarity and your generosity. The only thing I can do is to pray for you so God can bless you.

The political situation in Haiti is becoming worse. Many families in Mirebalais are really in need. Most of them are not natives of Mirebalais. They are people who flee the misery of the countryside in search of a better being in Mirebalais. They struggle day after day to live and keep their families alive. After one month, people are still coming to ask for food kits but we done.

My dream is to extend, one day, this feeding program to the rest of the country. Solidarity inside and outside is required so that everyone can eat one's fill. Let's give a hand to warm the hearts of the needy. Let's go for the greater glory of God, for the dignity and joy of Humans!







## Skyrocketing prices, roaming gangs complicate local outreach to hard-hit Haiti

Southfield-based group can't send missionaries to Caribbean nation, hit by political upheaval and natural disaster, but can send aid

**SOUTHFIELD** — It's been a rough year for Haiti — a country that's had its share of rough years.

Following the shocking assassination of its president, Jovenel Moise, on July 7, the small, impoverished Caribbean nation experienced a 7.2-magnitude earthquake centered on the country's southwest peninsula on Aug. 14.

Amidst the country's hardships, the Haiti Outreach Mission, a Southfield-based charitable organization that operates out of Mirebalais, a town that's an hourand-a-half drive northwest of the Haitian capital Port-au-Prince, is continuing to collect donations from parishes and individuals.

Though the earthquake did not have the same impact at the 2010 quake that struck Port-au-Prince, Haiti's capital and main population center, the aftereffects will be felt throughout the country, including in Mirebalais, said Dr. Dominique Monde-Matthews, a member of Corpus Christi Parish in Detroit and Southfield-based pediatrician who helped found the mission more than two decades ago.

"The major impact is going to be people migrating from the area that was affected toward Port-au-Prince and toward Mirebalais, where we work," Dr. Monde-Matthews, president of Haiti Outreach Mission. "The hospital Partners in Health (a Boston-based nonprofit) has in Mirebalais may be overflowed with patients as well."

Partners in Health, a nonprofit health care organization founded by Dr. Paul Farmer, has done extensive work in Haiti since 1987. The organization's hospital is the primary care facility in Mirebalais and the Centre Department of Haiti, with the Haiti Outreach Mission operating a 15-person staffed clinic in town

While the earthquake didn't directly hit Mirebalais, it's possible refugees from the area will go to Mirebalais, overwhelming the hospital, which in turn will send more people to the Haiti Outreach Mission clinic.

Haiti Outreach Mission continues to finically support the clinic, Dr. Monde-Matthews said, raising \$70,000 to \$100,000 a year to buy supplies and support on-the-ground operations.

"We are still supporting our mission by sending money so the clinic can operate," Dr. Monde-Matthews said. "So there has been no stoppage in operations."

The issue, Dr. Monde-Matthews said, has been getting that money where it needs to go — particularly to the two priests who work with the clinic, who haven't had an easy time getting to the bank.

"There were some issues with gangs," Dr. Monde-Matthews said. "With so much happening, it is hard for people to go about their routine, because they don't know what's going to happen."

The assassination of President Moise has added to the instability in Haiti, with rogue gangs patrolling highways and making travel between towns in Haiti a challenge.

"I've been in contact with Fr. Rommel, a Catholic priest on the ground there. About once a month we communicate," said Bill McNeece, vice president of Haiti Outreach Mission. "They are still trying to figure out how many people were killed or injured in the earthquake, but I'm happy to report it's not at the level of the 2010 earthquake, because the area that was hit was not as heavily populated."

McNeece serves on the executive committee of Haiti Outreach Mission, which coordinates with six churches — Corpus Christi in Detroit, St. Blase in Sterling Heights, Our Lady of Victory in Northville, St. David Episcopal in Southfield, St. Clare Episcopal in Ann Arbor and St. Bernard in Billings, Mont. — to raise money to support the mission.

Haiti now. The clinic staff, especially the dentists and physicians, haven't gotten a raise in some 10 years, so recently we decided to give them a raise to help them keep up with everything that's gone so high."

Normally, the nonprofit organizes one mission trip a year, sending volunteers to assist with the clinic. But travel restrictions and COVID-19 have barred the organization from sending a delegation to Haiti since 2018.

In lieu of a physical trip, the organization has been gathering donations to assist the mission, which is dealing with an increased caseload and rising prices; recent instability and disasters have decreased resources and increased prices.

"We sent the Catholic priest \$2,000 so he could buy food, but the problem is, Port-au-Prince has gotten too dangerous with what's going on politically, so he has had to travel to the Dominican Republic to buy food," McNeese said. "It's better to give money for them to buy food locally, as opposed to sending them food, which tends to suppress the rice market in Haiti. Since Port-au-Prince is getting dangerous, he has to drive an hour to the Dominican Republic to get rice and beans."

The dual crises of political upheaval in the wake of the assassination and the migration of people from the site of the earthquake has led to an increased scarcity and higher costs of goods needed to run the Haiti Outreach Mission clinic

The mission works with Broken Arrow, Okla.-based Blessings International to make bulk purchases of the medical equipment for the clinic, and the cash deposits to Haiti Outreach Mission's bank accounts help procure more local supplies. But roadblocks, roaming gangs and breakdowns in social structures have made everything more expensive in a country that was already economically depressed.

"The needs will always be financial, because recently there has been such an increase," Dr. Monde-Matthews said. "Everything has become so expensive in

On the ground in Mirebalais, the situation is less tense than in the capital or the countryside, but in early August, the town experienced an attack on its police station as gang members tried to spring members from jail.

The Catholic church in Mirebalais is a half block from the police station, and Mass was suspended for three weeks.

"They just began having Mass again on (Aug. 15)," McNeese said. "Clearly there are major concerns about the political stability and the infrastructure; there has been for three years."

The political upheaval has also weakened the infrastructure in the country, which has experienced sporadic power outages, spurring the need for the Haiti Outreach Mission to acquire more generators.

"We just received some pictures from priests who are having trouble with their generator now, because they are seven or eight years old and have been in use so much," Dr. Monde-Matthews said. "That would be something to add the list of things we need."

But above all the items Haiti Mission Outreach needs — from generators and antibiotics, to bandages and dental supplies — there's one supply that can't be held up by customs or stolen by street gangs: prayer.

"The one thing I would like to add for people is, please send us your prayers," Dr. Monde-Matthews said. "Haiti always needs prayers. I can't begin to tell

people about that. They have been hit so many times, by so many things. If anything, please keep Haiti in your prayers. I just feel so powerless sometimes, but I know if we have their prayers, we can do something."
